NOTES FROM THE PASTOR

CAUTION!

“Stop judging that you may not be judged. For as you judge so will you be judged, and the measure with which you measure will be measured out to you.”



Before we get to the beam and the splinter parable of our “focus” we need to first understand what it means to “judge” another in light of moral truth and Christian conscience vs. judging a person’s character or the nature of their heart. We cannot know the level of culpability as determined by their circumstances and by their level of moral or religious instruction. Jesus revealed to Saint Faustina: “Stop judging the hearts of others for my Mercy is greater than any sin.”

This is a reminder that sin has incredible consequences that affect both relationships and our eternal soul. The greatest pain of a sinner is that they damage the “Body of Christ” (the Church) both personally and universally. The goal of pointing out any sin – helping to form another’s conscience- is to make right the whole (body) by healing its parts... one soul at a time! Jesus’ desire of Mercy is a loving approach to justice so that love may heal not scorn or ostracize any soul.



So the question to keep in mind as we move forward is to ask: How do you want to be judged? By others? By Christ? I would imagine that our answer would be universally with Justice and Love! Patient, healing love.... Gentle love instruction and forgiveness!!

Matthew 7: 3-5

*Why do you notice the splinter in your brother’s eye, but do not perceive the wooden beam in your own eye? **How can you say to your brother, ‘Let me remove that splinter from your eye’ while the wooden beam is in your eye? You hypocrite, remove the wooden beam from your eye first; then you will see clearly to remove the splinter from your brother’s eye.***



Curtis Mitch and Edward Sri, in their book on the “Gospel of Matthew” comment on this passage: “In these verses, Jesus adds a comical parable about the need for self-examination. Perhaps its basis lies in the personal experience of the teller. A carpenter by trade, Jesus probably knew what it was like to get a **splinter** or small wood chip in the eye. In any case, the imagery has been greatly exaggerated for rhetorical effect – something Jewish rabbis frequently did in order to make their teaching “stick” in the minds of their listeners. In this case, the picture of someone having a **wooden beam** stuck in his eye is downright laughable. The thrust of the parable, however, is more serious than humorous. It cautions the faultfinder, in all of us, against the tendency to overlook our own shortcomings. Many of us think we have 20/20 vision when it comes to seeing the mistakes of others; the splinter in our **brother’s eye** seems too obvious. Yet we can be oblivious to the giant plank of lumber jetting out from our own eye.

Watching over with a Critical Eye!!

This axiom is often misinterpreted as a fault finding mission to point out mistakes, inabilities and careless attention to detail. But to watch over with a critical eye really is the desire to make all things perfect! That has a different end in mind. Judging the process toward perfection comes through instruction not harsh words. The road to perfection is to mend and redirect the process towards the ultimate product and results. A “morally” critical eye must, as well, have the concept of perfection in mind not the casting away or demeaning the character and heart of the individual.

NOTE: Remember God made us in His image and likeness! Original holiness (before the fall of man) is having one mind, heart, soul and will the same as God’s!



REMEMBER: Jesus’ critical eye is the one that looks down from the cross and utters, with His last Breath: “You will be with me in paradise” and “Forgive them Father for they not know what they do.” Jesus has no need to be reminded that the character and heart of mankind is damaged by sin and the solution and healing of such brokenness comes through His cross and our Baptism into His Mercy!!!

First Me then You – Often it is true that we should put others before ourselves. Their needs, concerns and wellbeing before our own. That is the selfless way of a mother as she tends to her children and the reason why a fire-fighter runs into a burning building to pull all living souls to safety. But to truly serve another we must be trained and have a clear vision of the pitfalls, dangers and procedures of being the “mother” of a child and a truly successful First Responder. A hero is usually pitted as one with reckless abandon, who puts his/her life on the line in the face of danger. But those who are trained with clear vision see it as a “service” not a heroic act. So let’s not be heroic in showing others their faults until we have clear vision, the proper skill set, to be the critical overseer of another’s road to perfection.

“GET THE LOG OUT” – FIVE STEPS TO CLEARER CRITICALVISION

1. Take the time to ask the Lord to search your heart ([Psalm 139:23](#)). Pray and ask the Lord where there is unconfessed sin in your life. Get specific. Confessing our sin is something we should be doing on a daily basis as well as the use of the Sacrament of Reconciliation.
2. On a sheet of paper make two columns side-by-side. On the first column write, **“My Sinful Ways.”** On the second column write, **“What God Wants Me to Do About Them.”** Look at the virtues and the gifts of the Holy Spirit that can address each of the sinful areas you’re struggling with and how to erase them from your critical eye.
3. Develop a practice of awareness for each sin that blurs your vision. Each day address a different sin with the intent to practice the virtue that gives clearer vision. Use the gifts of wisdom, knowledge and courage to persevere in overcoming that narrow way to see the world and become more merciful to yourself and others.
4. Give loving instruction (of God’s merciful love and moral direction) to others who struggle and share your narrow blurry vision of self and the world. Share with them your path (steps 1-3) as a challenge to do the same.
5. Repeat 1-4 as often as it is necessary to become a minister of Mercy to yourself as well as a neighbor.

Surgical Precision Takes Clear Vision – With 2021 vision (a more perfect vision) we can act with surgical precision in leading our neighbor to recognize that a splinter is the beginning of blindness that forms as a wooden beam. One take of Jesus’ parable is to think of the beam in your eye as a well rooted tree trunk!!! It grew there over the years! Then your neighbor’s splinter is seen as a seedling that needs to be uprooted before blindness occurs. Conversion stories (the story of the removal of the beam from one’s eye) are most affective because it shows human sinfulness overcome by Mercy, love and realignment to a life in Christ that can be a warning for those who are just dabbling in the same seeds of habitual sin and carelessness. Let’s become concerned with our neighbor’s splinter as a reflection of the tree trunk (through God’s Mercy) that has been removed from our eye...our life!!



Sacramental Prep — Despite Covid and the pandemic, our students in the 2nd grade have been busy preparing via Zoom for reception of their First Confession and First Holy Communion. Kudos to Robb Hoffman and his wife Julie and to all of our teachers for adapting their curriculum to an online learning process. Our 2nd Graders will be having 3 workshops to prepare for the reception of the sacraments. Their First Confession will be on Saturday, February 27th at 9:00 am. *(Please note that anyone wanting confession that day (Feb 27) is asked to go to IC at 9:00 since the children will be here that day).*



Modifications made for Ash Wednesday - Providing for the safety and welfare of the faithful has necessitated many modifications to our ritual practices. To reduce the risk of transmitting the coronavirus, it is not permitted this year to sign the faithful with ashes in the customary fashion. Rather, on Ash Wednesday (Feb. 17), the tradition of being marked with ashes will take place in a different fashion, through a sprinkling with ashes.

The minister, using a thumb and index finger, secures a pinch of ashes from the vessel containing the ashes. Without using words, the minister then sprinkles the ashes on the heads of the recipients. Please remember that the reception of ashes on Ash Wednesday is not required. Whether participating in this ritual or not, all the faithful are urged to undertake penitential practices during these Lenten days.

Watch for an OSM video about a take home container of Ashes for those parishioners who prefer not to attend mass during the pandemic. Ashes and Lenten materials will be passed out this Saturday, Feb 13 from 11:00-2:00.
