

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



Saint John of the Cross, master of the spiritual life and doctor of the Church, expresses the soul's longing for God as a living flame of love. Saint Thomas Aquinas, great theologian and doctor of the Church, speaks of an infusion

of essential goods into the soul of each person that leads them on the quest of Heaven. These two great saints, coming from different approaches, share a three-step progression to holiness

outlined by God's design. To awaken the soul to the Divine call, one must be aware of these gifts and desire them above all other pursuits.



THE LENTEN PATH TO HOLINESS

Lent is more than a time of self-discipline and austere practices to test our will and prove our desire to be holy. Lent is a time, **through** self-discipline and austere practices, to make us Holy. Holiness is a disposition of a lover seeking God. The three-step program of Saint John of the Cross and of St. Thomas Aquinas is Lent's goal for all souls to journey towards Easter Joy. That Joy is the promise and hope of the fullest life in God!

Here are the three steps that we outlined last week at Mass...

1. LOVE OF GOD

On Ash Wednesday we were marked with the sign of our mortality *(ash)* and the path that leads to immortality *(cross)* as the minister spoke: "Remember you are dust and dust you shall return." Without the breath of God, we have no life within us! That breath *(soul)* is eternal and aches for perfect union with Him; who created us and formed us in His own likeness. The reminder of our mortality calls us to take an account of pursuits that are worldly and self-centered rather than pursuits that are heavenly and God centered. Stepping aside and seeking a greater love is the first step. To pursue the Love of God is to

pursue life in its fullness. Love of God is the call to know perfection and to desire it as a virtue. Love of God is a call to be the best version of our self that shines forth in our interior life. Prayer allows us to seek the "other" as the center and the answer to the basic questions of life:



Who am I? Where díd I come from? Where am I going?

Prayer moves us from the center of the universe and places the Creator of the universe into our heart, mind and soul. The Ash Wednesday Gospel reminded us that outward acts are rewarded in the world while interior acts, that are hidden, are rewarded with eternal life. That "eternal life" begins the moment we fall out of love with ourselves and in Love with God.

2. UNION WITH GOD

In the first week of the Lenten journey, Jesus calls us to recognize our shared nature of humanness. The gift of the incarnation (the Word becoming flesh) afforded God to become like us in all things but sin. He became like us so that we can relate. In the flesh He is like us so that we can see its intrinsic value. Yet, He is unlike us in "sin" so that we can desire to live without sin and its devastating consequences. Union with God starts on the level of our human nature and in the lives we are to experience day to day. We must remember that our Human nature is the vehicle to holiness and fullness of life. In learning to long for that which is above worldly appetites by way of the virtues, we are predisposed to the essential good of the soul that desires to be one with God. Jesus, while weakened by fasting in the desert, overcomes the temptations of Satan to show us the flaws in the pursuit of instant gratification. These flaws are the subject of every advertisement and worldly pursuit. I need it ... I want it ... and I got to have it NOW! Wealth, prestige and power lead to an exterior happiness and an interior starvation. Seeking Union with God begins with the desire to "fast" from the promise and hope of self-fulfillment and to "put on Christ" as the Flesh (man) for which you were created to know and to experience. This Union is an inseparable love that heals, mends and transforms the soul to the higher heights of Love!!!

3. ASCENT TO GOD

The Second Sunday of Lent (*Transfiguration*) leaves us in Awe and Wonder of what we shall become. We know death and its tragic effects on the lives that we have built. We know the cause of

death *(sin)* and the destructive effects on the life that we try to overcome. We know the Crucified Lord, who offers Himself as the sacrifice, destroys both sin and death. We are very appreciative of this act of Love and thus, claim Him as our Savior. Yet, we are not very much in tune with the effects of this victory as it comes to us in the Resurrection. Jesus is *transfigured* before His apostles Peter, James and John so that they may realize that their love of God and intimate union with His son calls for a higher goal and experience. The Ascent to God is an interior one. As Jesus took on flesh to become like us, we too need to seek an interior transfiguration of our lives so that we may become like Him in all His Glory. "Come to me all you who find life burdensome... and I will give you rest." The ascent to God leaves the human life behind *(...its temptations, anxieties, fears and emptiness)* and replaces it by the experience of heavenly bliss. The ascent to God is in the Resurrection now...the ascent to God is seeing the least of my brothers...

The ascent to God is the fulfillment of the soul eternally in Heaven!

St. Oscar Romero | March 24



When St. Oscar Romero was appointed Archbishop of San Salvador in 1977, his country was in chaos. Many people in El Salvador were living in poverty, while a smaller elite group controlled all political and economic power. In 1980, El Salvador broke out in a 12-year civil war that left over 75,000 people dead. St. Oscar Romero set up pastoral programs to assist the victims of oppression. He also became an outspoken advocate for human rights, appealing to the Salvadoran military to stop killing their own citizens.

On March 24, 1980, St. Oscar Romero was murdered while celebrating Mass in El Salvador. A car pulled up outside, and a gunman fired a single shot straight into St. Oscar Romero's heart.

Calling him a "a martyr for the faith" nearly 40 years later, Pope Francis canonized him in 2018. For the occasion, Pope Francis chose to wear the same blood-stained belt that Romero was wearing at the altar when he died. ©LPi
