TODAY WE BEGIN HOLY WEEK

Throughout the world, in every Catholic Church, we will celebrate three great days. Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday, called the Triduum, is our annual retreat as a community.

I encourage you to participate...Make time...Bring your children. These are the days when we tell the full story of how we came to be and who we are as Christians.

Holy Thursday (6:30 pm – Mass of the Lord's Supper) is reserved for one celebration of our Lord's Last Supper. We hear the command of Jesus to wash each other's feet, to be humble servants of one another. As servants, we are invited to join in the sacrificial meal that makes present Jesus in this world, in this time and in this place. The Mass of the Lord's Supper ends with a procession of the Blessed Sacrament from the church to the Eucharistic chapel of reserve to signify Christ time in the garden and captivity.



Tradition on this night calls us to return to the church to spend time with Jesus recalling the great sufferings he is about to undertake for us.

On Good Friday (1:00 pm ~ Good Friday Service) we remember our Lord's passion and death. Each year we hear the story from Saint John's Gospel. We pray for all the needs of the world and then we are invited to come forward and venerate the cross, showing our gratitude for the suffering of Jesus and uniting our suffering to his.



Holy Saturday night (8:30 $pm \sim Easter Vigil$) is the holiest of all nights of the year. The service lasts longer than most because it is the night we tell our whole story. It begins with the lighting of the Easter Fire and the blessing and lighting of the Easter Candle, a sign of the presence of Christ. All worshipers are given a candle, lit from the one candle. Then the Easter Proclamation is sung, an ancient song so holy it




is sung only once a year. It is on this night that new members of the community are baptized, confirmed, and received into our church. We join them in the great renunciation of sin and profession of faith. This service is longer, but it is so filled with imagery and the triumphant proclamation of the truth, that even small children are interested. And if they fall asleep on mom's lap or dad's shoulder—how lovely.



PAGE 4 | PASTOR NOTES

From a sermon by Saint Leo the Great, pope contemplating the Lord's passion:



True reverence for the Lord's passion means fixing the eyes of our heart on Jesus crucified and recognizing in him our own humanity.

The earth – our earthly nature – should tremble at the suffering of its Redeemer. The rocks – the hearts of unbelievers – should burst asunder. The dead, imprisoned in the tombs of their mortality, should come forth, the massive stones now ripped apart. Foreshadowings of the future resurrection should appear in the holy city, the Church of God: what is to happen to our bodies should now take place in our hearts.

No one, however weak, is denied a share in the victory of the cross. No one is beyond the help of the prayer of Christ. His prayer brought benefit to the multitude that raged against him. How much more does it bring to those who turn to him in repentance.

Ignorance has been destroyed, obstinacy has been overcome. The sacred blood of Christ has quenched the flaming sword that barred access to the tree of life. The age-old night of sin has given place to the true light.

The Christian people are invited to share the riches of paradise. All who have been reborn have the way open before them to return to their native land, from which they had been exiled. Unless indeed they close off for themselves the path that could be opened before the faith of a thief.

The business of this life should not preoccupy us with its anxiety and pride, so that we no longer strive with all the love of our heart to be like our Redeemer, and to follow his example. Everything that he did or suffered was for our salvation: he wanted his body to share the goodness of its head.


First of all, in taking our human nature while remaining God, so that *the Word became man*, he left no member of the human race, the unbeliever excepted, without a share in his mercy. Who does not share a common nature with Christ if he has welcomed Christ, who took our nature, and is reborn in the Spirit through whom Christ was conceived?

Again, who cannot recognize in Christ his own infirmities? Who would not recognize that Christ's eating and sleeping, his sadness and his shedding of tears of love are marks of the nature of a slave?

It was this nature of a slave that had to be healed of its ancient wounds and cleansed of the defilement of sin. For that reason the only-begotten Son of God became also the son of man. He was to have both the reality of a human nature and the fullness of the godhead.

The body that lay lifeless in the tomb is ours. The body that rose again on the third day is ours. The body that ascended above all the heights of heaven to the right hand of the Father's glory is ours. If then we walk in the way of his commandments, and are not ashamed to acknowledge the price he paid for our salvation in a lowly body, we too are to rise to share his glory. The promise he made will be fulfilled in the sight of all:

Who ever acknowledges me before men, I too will acknowledge him before my Father who is in heaven.



Blessing of the Easter Basket

The blessing of the Easter Food Basket has been a cherished Catholic ritual for centuries among



families of Eastern European origin and adopted by people of all ethnic backgrounds who enjoy this richly symbolic custom.

On Holy Saturday, families would prepare their Easter Baskets to be later blessed at church. After Easter Sunday's Resurrection Mass, the family and guests would share this blessed fare and exchange good wishes. The Christian significance of Easter is symbolized in the foods used for the Holiday feast. Baskets are lined with a white cloth and decorated with ribbons and greenery to symbolize Spring, renewal, and the Resurrection.

Traditionally, the baskets would include: decorated hardboiled eggs (representing Christ's Resurrection), lambshaped butter or sugar (representing Christ as the "Lamb of God"), bread (symbolic of Jesus as the "Bread of Life"), ham (symbolic of great joy and abundance), sausage (symbolic of God's favor and generosity), smoked bacon (symbolic of the overabundance of God's mercy), some prefer lamb (representing Christ as the "Lamb of God"), salt (symbolic of prosperity and justice and to remind us "You are the salt of the earth"), cheese (symbolizes the moderation Christians should have at all times), horseradish & pepper (symbolic of the Passion of Christ and the bitter herbs of the Passover). A white candle is often inserted into the basket to represent Christ as the "Light of the World." Lastly, the basket is cover with linen symbolizing the covering of Christ's shroud.

This deeply rooted tradition is as richly symbolic as it is heart-warming. Children are eager to help prepare and decorate the family basket and later, proudly carry it into church on Holy Saturday for the blessing. Some families with small children have their "little-ones" carry their very own decorated basket filled with fruits, a chocolate bunny or some other treat to be blessed. The foods included within any basket can be easily personalized.

Please join us with your unique baskets for a brief blessing on **Holy Saturday at noon** as we share this beloved tradition with our parish family.



Faith Formation continues on April 10th. Please join us for 8:30 AM mass beforehand and class afterwards!







on Holy Thursday at 6:30 pm. Following Mass, there will be Eucharistic Adoration before the Blessed Sacrament until 11:00 pm. Come spend some quiet time of prayer and adoration before the Lord.

Good Friday (April 15)

Good Friday is a day of Fast and Abstinence. Fasting involves eating only one full meal that day, with two smaller meals possible. Those between the ages of 18 and 59 inclusive are bound to FAST.

Abstinence means not eating meat or meat products. All Fridays during Lent are days of Abstinence. Abstinence is to be observed for everyone over the age of 14.

The Liturgy of the Lord's Passion (also known as the Mass of the Presanctified) will be held at 1:00 pm on Good Friday. This is not a Mass at all but an old name for the Good Friday service which includes Communion "presanctified" (consecrated the night before). Good Friday remains the only day of the year without a celebration of the Eucharist ("The Eucharist - Jesus - has died").

Vigil Mass—Did you know...... Easter is so special that we even have to wait for the heavens to be just right. It happens once a year on the first Sunday after the first full moon after the first day of Spring. The Easter Vigil is a special Mass that is the



start of Easter. It begins after sunset when it's dark on the night before Easter Sunday. This is the night when the Church baptizes adults.

During the Vigil Mass, we recall God's saving actions throughout history. There are as many as seven readings from the Bible. They recall the seven days of Creation, the Israelites crossing the Red Sea, the prophets pointing the way toward the Messiah, and Christ's Passion, death, and Resurrection.

The Vigil Mass here at SEAS begins at 8:30 pm. We hope that you will be able to join us for this very special liturgy.
