





First Reading:



Pastor Notes

SOLEMNITY OF MARY, MOTHER OF GOD



Today the Church celebrates the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God, our Lady's greatest title. This feast is the octave of Christmas. In the modern Roman Calendar only Christmas and Easter enjoy the privilege of an octave. According to the 1962 Missal of Bl. John XXIII the Extraordinary Form of the Roman Rite, today is the Solemnity of Circumcision of Our Lord.

"Mary, the all-holy ever-virgin Mother of God, is the masterwork of the mission of the Son and the Spirit in the fullness of time. For the first time in the plan of salvation and because his Spirit had prepared her, the Father found the dwelling place where his Son and his Spirit could dwell among men. In this sense the Church's Tradition has often read the most beautiful texts on wisdom in relation to Mary. Mary is acclaimed and represented in the liturgy as the "Seat of Wisdom." — *Catechism of the Catholic Church* 721

The Eighth Day of Christmas



Mary the Mother of God

On New Year's Day, the octave day of Christmas, the Church celebrates the Solemnity of the Holy Mother of God. The divine and virginal motherhood of the Blessed Virgin Mary is a singular salvific event: for Our Lady it was the foretaste and cause of her extraordinary glory; for us it is a source of grace and salvation because "through her we have received the Author of life" (127).

In the West, 1 January is an inaugural day marking the beginning of the civil year. The faithful are also involved in the celebrations for the beginning of the new year and exchange "new year" greetings. However, they should try to lend a Christian understanding to this custom making of these greetings an expression of popular piety. The faithful naturally, realize that the "new year" is placed under the patronage of the Lord, and in exchanging new year greetings they implicitly and explicitly place the New Year under the Lord's dominion, since to him belongs all time (cf. Ap 1, 8; 22,13) (128).

New Year greetings also include an expression of hope for a peaceful New Year. This has profound biblical, Christological and incarnational origins. The "quality of peace" has always been invoked throughout history by all men, and especially during violent and destructive times of war.

The Holy See shares the profound aspirations of man for peace. Since 1967, 1 January has been designated "world day for peace."

THE HOLY FAMILY

The Keyword: HOLY

As we celebrate the Feast of the Holy Family, Mary, Joseph and Jesus our focus is on how they can be an example to us living out our Faith in the modern world. We face everyday decisions that either compliment God's will in our lives or distracts us from the building of the Kingdom. One may argue that the "Holy Family" is an unfair model to try and follow.... **Mary** was *conceived without sin*, the Child **Jesus** was both *God and man*... and with this being the case, **Joseph** could easily steer away from arguments, anxiety and even sin living with *his* wife and child.

It is not quite the same scenario that we find ourselves living in our own household. So how do they become the model of "faith" for us an example of Christian Life?

The Key is in being **Holy**... not acting Holy but living in holiness.... The State of Grace.

When one is in perfect union with God one has a different temperament, focus and purpose in living life.

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TEMPERAMENT - Mary's life of humility (being the handmaiden of the Lord) teaches us that it is not about our will but God's will. Humility teaches us that we are the servant to others in the name of God's love and law... that is what it means to be holy... Humility allows the focus always to fall on the needs of others and not our own selfish desires.

FOCUS - Joseph's focus teaches us how to give of our whole life for the safety and prosperity of others. When the angel told Joseph that "His name shall be Jesus and he would save us from our sins," he knew that he was responsible to protect and provide for the Salvation of the people of Israel. Joseph acts out of hope for the long-awaited Savior. Joseph's focus is beyond his worldly desires....

PURPOSE - Jesus was purpose driven.... Obviously. To accomplish His (Heavenly) Father's will.... To teach the good News and to bring the promise of the kingdom...

This model then can be applied to us for we, too, should have the same temperament, focus and purpose in our family life.... Doing God's will and sharing in salvation.... So, remain always in the state of "Grace" and be a holy family!!!



A PERSONAL CHECK - UP

Here are some questions for private reflection concerning yourselves and the people with whom you live. They can be used at any time, but particularly as we begin this New Year.

Perhaps you could spend some time in your place of prayer or in the car on the way to work, etc., thinking of one or many of these questions. The important point is to make time as we begin the New Year to examine your conscience and to pray and reflect on the following points.

1. What's my best time of day?
2. What's my worst time of day?
3. Would I like to live with "me" at my worst time of day?
4. What's my tone of voice when I talk to my family, my friends, people I want to impress?
5. Am I generous in sharing my possessions with my spouse, siblings, children, relatives, friends and neighbors?
6. After work, am I eager to get home? Why? Why not?
7. How do I welcome family members when they come home? Would they know I'm glad to see them?
8. When was the last time I hugged a member of my family for no particular reason except love?
9. How do I feel when I think about hugging my spouse, children, siblings, or parents?

NEW YEAR RESOLUTIONS

We all make them... We always take them seriously.... At least for the first few weeks. Most of the time they benefit us personally and let's be honest... we like who we are.... Right?

Well let me make a few easy suggestions that we can all do together that would take less than 10 minutes a day without a need to reduce our calorie intake... PRAYER.

Let's add to our prayer time everyday these particular petitions:

- For our Pope Francis
- For our Bishop Larry Kulick
- For our priests and an increase in priestly vocations
- For all those preparing for the Sacrament of Marriage
- For those seeking initiation into the Catholic Faith
- For those who experience the Hour of death
- For the poor souls in purgatory

This might not seem like much but believe me these few minutes will raise your minds and hearts each day to what is most important on the journey of faith.

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WHY DO WE DO THAT? - CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED

History of the Rosary

Question:

What is the history of the rosary? Where did this prayer come from?

Answer:

Although a longstanding tradition attributed the rosary to Saint Dominic and the Dominican Order, the practice of using beads to count prayers predates the Dominicans by a few hundred years. In fact, it seems that what we now think of as the rosary (which means “garland of roses”) was first developed by illiterate peasants and religious brothers and sisters as a way of offering 150 “Our Fathers” to replace the praying of the 150 psalms in the Divine Office.

The practice of reciting 150 Hail Marys (which was later subdivided into 15 decades of 10 Hail Marys) arose during the late Middle Ages. Devotion to the rosary began to flourish in the nineteenth century, especially as new devotions to Mary began to spread throughout Europe and the New World. An annual liturgical celebration of Our Lady of the Rosary was introduced into the Church calendar in 1573 and it has been observed on the date of October 7 since 1913.

In the apostolic letter On the Most Holy Rosary, Pope Saint John Paul II not only added five new mysteries to the traditional fifteen, but he also reminded Catholics that the rosary is, at its core, an opportunity to go deeper into the life of Jesus: “The rosary, though clearly Marian in character, is at heart a Christocentric prayer ... It has all the depth of the Gospel message in its entirety, of which it can be said to be a compendium. It is an echo of Mary’s prayer, her perennial Magnificat ... With the rosary, the Christian people sit at the school of Mary and are led to contemplate the beauty of the face of Christ and to experience the depths of his love” (no. 1).

20 + C + M + B + 23.



YWCA offers tutoring for reading and writing



St. John Neumann is the patron saint of educators, immigrants, and, due to the miracles that secured his canonization, sick children. This is a fitting patronage as he was a lover of education and learning from a very young age. In fact, when he was a child, his mother called him “my little bibliomaniac” due to his preoccupation with reading. Born in 1811 Bohemia, in what is now the Czech Republic, he attended the university in Prague preparing for ordination. However, his local bishops were not ordaining new priests at the time because Bohemia was overstocked with priests. He inquired about ordination all over Europe but received the same answer everywhere. Not one to be deterred, John then applied to several United States dioceses. Receiving no immediate responses, the saint took a leap of faith and decided to just immigrate to the United States in 1836, during his 25th year, with only \$40 in his pocket. This risk paid off when he was ordained in New York a month later.



Early in his priesthood he worked primarily as a missionary to German immigrants in Buffalo. His missionary work also created an opportunity for him to spend time in Maryland, Virginia, Michigan, and Ohio. When he was 29, he joined the Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer (Redemptorists), a congregation of priests and brothers dedicated to helping the poor and most abandoned. He was their first member to profess vows in the United States.

In 1852, at the age of 41, Neumann became the fourth Bishop of Philadelphia. During this time, he organized the individual parochial schools in his region into a diocesan system. This change allowed Catholic schools to quickly increase the number of pupils enrolled by almost twentyfold. Over the course of his ministry, St. John expanded the number of Catholic schools in his diocese from 2 to 100! His passion for education extended to immigrants, like himself, and his love for learning languages made it possible for him to hear confessions in English, Spanish, French, Italian, Dutch, and Gaelic!

A man of the people, he could often be found outside the church walls visiting people who were sick, staying in taverns and public houses to teach, and celebrating Mass in people’s homes at their kitchen tables. He was canonized on June 19, 1977, following three miracles, two of which regarded the healing of youth from grave illnesses. St. John Neumann was the first American man to be canonized a saint.

Prayer for St. John Neumann’s intercession

O St. John Neumann, your ardent desire of bringing all souls to Christ impelled you to leave home and country; teach us to live worthily in the spirit of our baptism which makes us all children of the one Heavenly Father and brothers of Jesus Christ, the firstborn of the family of God.

Obtain for us that complete dedication in the service of the needy, the weak, the afflicted, and the abandoned which so characterized your life. Help us to walk perseveringly in the difficult and at times painful paths of duty, strengthened by the Body and Blood of our Redeemer and under the watchful protection of Mary our Mother. May death still find us on the sure road to our Father’s house, with the light of living faith in our hearts.
