

Weddings - Saturdays at 1:30 pm or earlier. The engaged couple should contact the office at least 6 months in advance to schedule.



Prayer—The church is open daily 8am-4pm for private prayer.



How to Carry Your Cross



My participation in cancer has changed my life! From the diagnosis, through the 35 treatments of chemotherapy and the challenge to fight to remain healthy through it all taught me that we do nothing alone nor for the soul purpose of our own will. Now as I enter the observation stage of my journey I can see that my experience was just a test run for what it will take to embrace the cross at the end of my life and to willingly enter, with total submission, into the glory of the promise of eternal life. I have been blessed to walk this journey thus far and believe that through the constant prayers of love of you and the examples of the Saints I will be further transformed by the all-consuming love of Christ.

Stages of Grief vs. Stages of the Cross


My first "observation" of the journey of cancer was clearly seen as stages of the "acceptance" of the cross rather than stages of Grief. Stages of grief are based on the human response to suffering loss and death. The Stages of the cross are based on the spiritual nature and the purification of the soul and the longing for purification necessary to enter into eternal life. Here, in this article, I would like to share thoughts on the carrying of the cross that comes from Carolyn Berghuis' book: "<u>Understanding the Jesus Code</u>" along with my additions. I



think you will find them helpful and challenging as we desire to do God's will and be transformed by the cross into souls worthy of heaven.

To carry your cross comes with a promise. You will experience a joy that only Jesus can offer, true life itself. Yet, many find it difficult, if not impossible to carry their cross. Further, many others misunderstand what it means to carry their cross altogether and they experience needless suffering as a result. Yes, when you carry your cross you will experience struggle in your life and the journey will at times be challenging. However, when you carry your cross in a manner that resembles Jesus you are promised entry into some of the most beautiful places Jesus has for you – places where life abounds.



You know that Jesus carried the cross and endured its pain as atonement for mankind's sins. The purpose for such atonement is our reunion with the Father. You also know that Jesus did not carry the cross in vain – his pain had a purpose. You also know that you are called to carry your cross and follow Jesus on the road to eternal happiness. And yes, your cross is a vehicle back to God.

"...looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is seated at the right hand of the throne of God." – Hebrews 12:2

Given this, your pain, your trials and your challenging life experiences all present unique opportunities to move back to God. However, you must take the steps necessary so that your heart grows in love, forgiveness, and acceptance as a result of the trials. There is a saying that comes to mind here – *"Become better, not bitter"*. These life experiences become the total sum of your cross only when you use them for their proper purpose – **reunion with God**. If they serve any other role in your life you have missed a golden opportunity for happiness and peace. However, remember, due to your fallen nature you will fall short of perfection (unless you become a saint – a worthy endeavor!) and, given this, there will always be work to do.

We know that those who believe in Jesus share in his glory for the sole intention of unity as God desires. In light of this what does it mean to share in Jesus' glory? This question begets another question, namely, what is Jesus' greatest glory? Triumph over sin and the salvation of the world – salvation for you and I! And how did his glory come to be? He achieved victory over sin and death. How did he gain victory over sin and death? This is the story of the cross and all that comes with it– the painful and the joyful.

"The glory that you have given me I have given them, so that they may be one, as we are one, 23 I in them and you in me, that they may become completely one, so that the world may know that you have sent me and have loved them even as you have loved me." – John 17:22-23

Companions on the Journey

The greatest comfort and value that comes in accepting to walk with Christ under the weight of the cross is that you do not need to do it alone. Many of the great Saints suffered incredible trials in their



earthly lives but they embraced it with an all-consuming love which allow them to embrace it as a share in redemption and the salvation of souls! Such love compelled them to sacrifice freely for the sake of Jesus. This love calls them to carry the weight of humanity in a very unique way – in a way that helps others carry what they cannot carry. They become so consumed with God's love that they can withstand any trial – even the trials of others.

They become equipped to carry the burden for others through trials. Saint Theresa of Calcutta, Padre Pio, and countless other


holy saints have reached the gift of consuming love. They became so consumed with love for Christ that this love called them to die to themselves so that others can live. They became a perfected portion of Christ' body. They became a light for the world to see. Through their intercession we too can gain this consuming love of God that changes our pain as an infliction to being a gift of sharing in the depth of Christ love that leads us to the Father.

To do the will of the Father is to follow Christ under the cross and come to the joy and peace of everlasting life!



The Feast of St. Blaise is celebrated on February 3 with the blessing of throats. This is done to ask God to protect the faithful from diseases of the throat and other illnesses. According to legend, a mother approached St. Blaise and begged him to help her son, who had a fish bone lodged in his throat. Blaise prayed, and the bone was dislodged. The blessing of the throats will be done at the morning mass on Friday, Feb 3.

A general blessing will be given at the weekend masses February 4th &5th.

Feast of the Presentation of the Lord

February 2nd, the Church celebrates the feast of the Presentation of the Lord which occurs forty days after



the birth of Jesus and is also known as **Candlemas day**, since the blessing and procession of candles is included in today's liturgy. According to the 1962 Missal of St. John XXIII the Extraordinary Form of the Roman Rite, today is referred to as the "Purification of Mary." This is known as a "Christmas feast" since it points back to the Solemnity of Christmas. Many Catholics practice the tradition of keeping out the Nativity creche or other Christmas decorations until this feast.

Christmas Decoration Removal—Immaculate Conception Cemetery: If you wish to retain your Christmas decorations from your loved ones graves, please remove the decorations by March 6, 2023. Anything left in the cemetery past March 6, as a courtesy to you, will be discarded by cemetery staff. Thank you for your cooperation.

KNOW HIM: The Last Supper and the Gift of the Eucharist set March 9 at Christ Our Shepherd Center, Greensburg



WHY DO WE DO THAT? -CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED Saint Vs. Blessed

Question:

What is the difference between a "Saint" and a "Blessed"? **Answer:**

The process of proclaiming someone as a saint in the Catholic Church has evolved over the course of many centuries. In the beginning, those honored as saints were almost exclusively biblical figures or martyrs. However, after the legalization of Christianity in the fourth century, new holy women and men came to be honored as saints, and this was often done by popular acclaim or by the local bishop or abbot.

It was Pope Gregory IX (who was pope from 1227 to 1241) who officially proclaimed that only the pope had the authority to add someone to the official list (the "canon") of saints. This is the meaning of the word "canonization."

Today, the saint-making process includes several steps, including detailed studies of the person's life and a recognition that they died as a martyr or lived a life of "heroic virtue." Once someone is recognized as a martyr or if a miracle is attributed to their intercession, they will be beatified and honored as "Blessed." This means that they can be celebrated by Catholics in a particular country or region or by the members of certain religious community. If another miracle occurs and is approved, then the "Blessed" is canonized and honored with the title "Saint," meaning that they are now officially recognized as a universal model of holiness and an intercessor. ©LPi


Father John A. Moineau
