Pastor Notes

Take a Look at Your Inner Self!!

Matthew Kelly's book, "Rediscover the Saints", in his Chapter on "Saint Ignatius of Loyola", he asks the question "Are you




an emotionally intelligent person? The question is one of introspection calling us to take a deep look at yourself to discover who we are **spiritually**, **mentally** and **emo-tionally**. Matthew Kelly continues by calling to mind that over the past several years it has become very popular to speak about the concept of Emotional Intelligence (EQ) in large part because it is disappearing from our culture. So much of modern culture promotes a numbing unconsciousness rather than the vibrant consciousness that God wants us to live in each moment.

EQ, by definition, is a (notional) measure of a person's adequacy in such areas as selfawareness, empathy, and dealing sensitively with other people. It could be something as simple as recognizing that we pray, play and serve better on a good night's sleep. It is the ability to recognize when someone is sad by their disposition or that their glass

is empty and you ask if they would like another drink! Matthew Kelly explains that emotional intelligence is not only an awareness of what is happening within us and around us, it is ultimately an awareness of what is happening with the people around us and the effect our words and actions have on their own self-esteem and spiritual worth.

EQ Factor as 20/20 Vision – The emotional intelligence test of our vision with an "inside eye" so we become aware how clearly, we see and react in various situations. These include:

- Stressful or frustrating
- Failures or discouraging situations
- Leadership positions and methods for achieving success
- Methods for managing the emotions of others of various ages
- Methods for assessing various personality traits in others
- Dealing with diversity and culture sensitivities





St. Ignatius, as Matthew Kelly persists, is the spiritual guru of EQ evaluation! Saint Ignatius created a process of prayer and meditation engaging the sacred Scriptures that draws us to a deeper love of God and in turn a true understanding of our ability to respond to the challenges of our call to be disciples. Putting ourselves within the accounts of Jesus' life gives us perspective and self-awareness that aids the process to discern the greater good in our daily encounters. The process allows us to imagine being Jesus, or the Apostles, or the subject of the story (i.e. Blind man) or just a passerby. In each scenario we imagine the perspective and the ability to act. It is in this process we find sympathy for the victim patient for the disciple, mercy from the Christ and a challenge for the bystander! All in all,

our inner vision (soul) melts away our desire to be *lazy, prejudice, self-centered and judgmental* and gives us clear vision through the use of the virtues and the gifts of the Holy Spirit excel in spiritual awareness!

On These Things for Lent...

- making time and space to remember what it means to be Christian, by remembering the life, death and resurrection of Jesus in a special way.
- remembering the life and message of Jesus-recommitting to living as followers of Jesus in today's world.
- giving up the negative in our lives to make room for more positive.
- being open to change of heart and habit—to deepening our relationship with Jesus and with each other.
- taking time out from the usual daily routine to focus on what is most important in our lives.
- acknowledging the parts of our lives that need forgiveness and changing, and working to make them right again.
- clearing out some space in our lives so that God can enter and fill it; and taking time to discover where God has always been.

The Three Disciplines of Lent: Fasting, Prayer, Almsgiving

Facting: Facting is an integral part of Lent	Dravar	Almegiving (Acts of Charity)
 Fasting: Fasting is an integral part of Lent. Traditionally it has included reducing the amount of food we eat and abstaining from meat. We fast to allow our physical hunger to remind us of our spiritual hunger, our need for God. The purpose of fasting is to turn our attention to both God and others. Things to fast from watching television foul language, sarcasm, and put-downs. buying new things: clothes, music, magazines, jewelry, etc. snack or junk foods spending money on entertainment being angry at other people holding resentments gossiping being dishonest Feasting: The dictionary defines a feast as "something that gives unusual or abundant pleasure." Jesus tells us what gives us the most real and lasting joy: it is sharing ourselves in love for others, for our friends, our family, and also for our neighbors in need. During Lent, we pay attention to feasting on joy, compassion, service, and hope so that we might grow in faith all year long. Things to feast on prayer acts of kindness to others forgiveness participating at Church participating in liturgy and Eucharist giving our time in service receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation acts of service and charity giving money or personal possessions to people who are hungry or in need 	 Prayer Read the story of the Last Supper of Jesus in chapter 13 of the Gospel of John, verses 1-15. Read the story of Easter chapter 20 of the Gospel of John, verses 1-9. Pray the "Our Father" three times today—in the morning when you get up, at noontime, and when you go to bed. Say a prayer for someone who is sick today. Pray for a forgiving heart and ask the people you have hurt to forgive you. Participate in Ash Wednesday services with your family. Participate in the Stations of the Cross during Lent. List three blessings you have been given. Say a prayer to God, giving thanks for the blessings in your life. Pray for the children and families who are homeless, and think about ways you and your family might help them. Pray the Rosary. Go to a website like Catholic Online for specific Lenten prayers: www.catholic.org/ prayers/prayer.php?s=27 	 Almsgiving (Acts of Charity) Show an act of kindness to each family member today. Show an act of kindness to a friend and to someone who is difficult to like. Together with your family, spend time serving others during Lent. Work at a soup kitchen or homeless shelter. Visit elderly people who are in nursing homes or shut-ins. Bring food or clothing to the parish or community food pantry, food bank, or homeless shelter. Do someone else's chores one day this week. Donate a new item of children's clothing to the local homeless shelter or clothing center. Go through your closet and find some clothes in good shape to give away to others who are in need. Write a letter or create a card for someone who is sick or might be lonely. Buy a can of food to give to a food bank or homeless shelter.







First of all, what is a "vocation"? The word comes to us from Latin – the verb "vocare" means "to call." So, if it is a verb, it is an action. An action that involves two parties, the one doing and the one receiving. Vocation therefore involves a "caller" and a "receiver." In secular use, we oftentimes equate the word vocation with a job or profession and indeed many do feel very much called to be in the line of work that they are in. However, as we are using it, vocation means something much more substantial. As you might guess, the "caller" is God, but who is on the other end of the line to answer the call? 
