



DIOCESAN LENTEN APPEAL: "All Coming Together"



Every year The *Diocesan Lenten Appeal* challenges us as stewards of the "works" of both the Diocese and the parish. The Diocese sets a goal for us to fulfill for the direct work of the Bishop in ways for the poor (Catholic Charities), Formation of priest and procurement of missionary priest from the Philippines, as well as formation of Catechist and children and many other important missions. These works of the Diocese trickle down to the parish level providing us tools to evangelize on a local level. This alone is enough reason to support the Lenten appeal.

But part of the Lenten appeal has always been to help the needs of the parish to provide services and a safe environment for the people of God. Since I have been here, as pastor, we have developed case statements that accomplished or aided in the accomplishments of a new parish center; the painting of the exterior of the church; new carpeting and ceiling tiles in the narthex, the purchase of the receptionist desk and many other facility needs. The big project which we have saved monies for from past DLA campaigns was to **PAVE THE PARKING LOT!**

Because of the immensity of the project and the ongoing increase in price this project continued to stall. Two years ago we used the parking lot as our case and goal to accomplish. With the pandemic and supply problems the project seemed to continue on that path of no return. But this spring, with monies saved from past donations, the parking lot will be paved! I am so excited to get this project completed and I know that you will be as well!

Last year, we had planned to remodel the restrooms in Mack Hall and give the confessional some sound proofing. Unfortunately that project also was delayed. HOWEVER last week the project was started and should be completed soon giving us better handicap access as well as a new and clean environment. We will also complete the work on the confessional as well.

This year our case is to replace the 4 original air condition units and provide for cool and comfortable spaces to worship (sanctuary) and hold events (Mack Hall) during the summer months. I am happy to say that with monies saved for this project over the years and trusting we will reach of DLA goal we have already started the work!

We are the Body of Christ: The diocesan campaign motto this year reminds us that accomplishing the works of both diocese and parish, we serve Christ and His church as His body as He remains the head! Everything we do resonates with the stewardship that leads to building the kingdom here as the stepping stone to sharing in the eternal kingdom in Heaven.

So I thank you ahead of time for your participation and support, through the Diocesan Lenten Appeal, for our Bishop and the works of the parish. Every time we receive Holy Communion (the Body of Christ) we become one in Truth and mission! The source and summit of our lives is the Eucharist and fed on Christ we become strong and focused on spreading the Kingdom of God. Your generosity allows our parish to remain strong and vibrant in a time that world needs the example of God's presence.

THE TRANSFIGURATION



Pastors Note: My Goal in this Lenten (Bulletin) Season is to find worthwhile articles to share a further reflection on the Sunday Gospel. There are so many talented writers and I feel that we can benefit from their insight. The "Crossroads Initiative" reflections are often very insightful... such as the one by Dr. Marcelino D'Ambrosio posted here today.

One of the bible's names for the God is "El Shaddai" or "God of the Mountains." And from the very beginning of salvation history, we see that mountains are a special place to communicate with Heaven. Abraham ascends Mount Moriah to sacrifice his son (Gen 22). God reveals his name and to Moses on Mount Sinai (Ex 3). Moses later receives the 10 Commandments on that very spot (Ex 31:18). Elijah returns to the same mountain, also known as Horeb, to hear what God's "still, small voice" has to say (I Kg 19:8).

So, it is no surprise that Jesus brings His "pillars" (Gal 2:9) with Him up a high mountain to experience a special moment of communion with the Most-High. It is this event that is commemorated by the Church each year on August 6. This Sunday's gospel tells the story. As tradition has it, Mount Tabor is the place. Rising from the plain of Jezreel, its summit provides a spectacular view of all of Galilee. But, what Jesus intends for Peter, James, and John to see is not the countryside. He wishes to provide them a glimpse of who He really is. Jesus is a carpenter from Nazareth, true. He must have looked much like any other Jewish craftsman of that time and place. That much could be seen by the naked eye.

But this exterior appearance of His ordinary humanity was a veil hiding something more extraordinary–His glorious divinity. So, on Tabor, God pulls back the veil. Moses and Elijah appear. These heroes of old had long since passed out of this world and gone to God. So, what does it say about Jesus' identity that they appear on His right and His left?

Jesus' clothes suddenly appear dazzlingly white, "whiter," notes Mark, "than the work of any bleacher could make them." The first reading tells us the significance of this. In a vision, Daniel sees a vision of the "Ancient One." How does He appear? With clothing that is snow

bright. Then one like "a Son of Man" comes on the clouds to receive dominion, glory and kingship from the Ancient One.

On Tabor, a cloud comes and overshadows Jesus and a Voice from the Cloud proclaims that this particular Son of Man happens to be the beloved Son. What we have here is what is called a "theophany," a manifestation of God. It is revelation, first of all, of the divinity of Christ. What the Creed says about Him could be viewed as a commentary on this very episode: "God from God, light from light, true God from true God." But it is also a manifestation of the entire Trinity. The cloud that overshadows the apostles is the same one that overshadowed Mary. It is the glorious cloud of the Holy Spirit out of which the Father's voice resounds. Father, Son, Holy Spirit, one God in three persons, prefigured in Daniel's vision, revealed in the Transfiguration. Suddenly, after a brief prostration, they get up and see only Jesus, looking the way He had always looked. The veil was now back in place. The five senses are wonderful gifts from God. But they are limited nonetheless. Often, we make the mistake of thinking that reality is nothing more than what our senses perceive it to be. So, God gives us occasional mountaintop experiences, glimpses into realities that our senses can't normally detect. Jesus is always divine, regardless of His everyday human appearance. Jesus is always accompanied by saints and angels even when He appears to be alone. It was the entire Trinity who opened the eyes of the man born blind, even though it was only Jesus' hand we could see touching the man's eyes. Faith is remembering such moments of revelation and building our lives upon them. But it's so much easier to forget such things and live according to what everybody can see.



EAGLE SCOUT PROJECT



Bishop Kulick announces dispensation for Catholics in the Diocese of Greensburg from obligation to abstain from meat on St. Patrick's Day, Friday, March 17, 2023 Lent is a 40-day season of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving that began on Ash Wednesday (February 22, 2023) and ends at sundown on Holy Thursday (April 6, 2023). It requires Catholics over the age of 14 to abstain from eating meat on Fridays during Lent.

Saint Patrick's Day, or the Feast of Saint Patrick, falls on a Friday this year. The memory of this missionary apostle to Ireland recalls his preaching of the faith and encouragement to live authentic Christian lives. Lent does not disappear with the festival celebration of St. Patrick. Rather, in the Diocese of Greensburg, Bishop Larry J. Kulick will permit Roman Catholics to fittingly observe March 17th this year with another choice of penance rather than to abstain from meat.

Views on Vocations

Who Receives a Vocation?

In our last article, we learned that "vocation" means a calling from God. Now we're going to consider who is on the other end of the line to answer. Guess what? All of our "phones" are ringing! God calls each and every one of us - you, me, your cousin Stan, your Aunt Bev, and your neighbor down the street who you really don't care for.

You're probably thinking now, "What would He be calling me for?" or "I didn't even hear it ring!" We are all called as members of Christ's Body and to be holy. This is our "universal call to holiness." Through the grace imparted to us by our Baptism,

- ♥ we are made sharers in God's divine life (reread that statement... we SHARE in His life, it is much deeper than a quick read might let on)
- \clubsuit we become children of God,
- heirs of salvation,
- sharers in Christ's three-fold mission of priest, prophet, and king.

There is so much that could be unpacked in that long run-on sentence!

The main idea I want to emphasize right now is this – our basic call from God is to be holy. Peter speaks to us in his first letter, "As he who has called you is holy, be holy yourselves in every aspect of your conduct." (1 Peter 1:15) This references Leviticus 11:44 where God says "For I, the LORD, am your God. You shall make and keep yourselves holy, because I am holy."

Holiness can't be thought of as something just for others, it is for us all. It is a journey and certainly not something that will happen overnight. With the help of the grace we receive through the Sacraments (which is our participation in the life of the Church), we can grow in holiness and towards the goal of Christian perfection – the virtue of charity (love). This is a pretty tall order... so let us thank God for his endless love, mercy, and forgiveness!
