

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP

If you're on social media, you have probably seen a meme going around that features this quote: "God has a plan for your life. The enemy has a plan for your life. Be ready for both. **Just be wise enough to know** which one to battle and which one to embrace." There were certainly two competing plans for the Magi: God's and Herod's. And, wise as they supposedly were, it **wasn't entirely easy** for the Magi to discern which was which.

After all, **Herod posed as a friend.** He offered the Magi hospitality and kindness. Though the Gospel doesn't say so, he probably flattered them and appealed to every moral weakness he could observe in them. In his palace, they must have felt great physical comfort — rest and tables of plenty on what was an otherwise long and treacherous journey.

But if the Magi were honest with themselves, I'll bet they would have admitted that, regardless of Herod's charm, they felt a **gnawing sense of doubt** while in his presence. When they looked upon the Christ Child, born in a stable without any of the comforts of the world or protections of wealth, they probably felt the opposite. **They probably felt safe.**

The **Magi were lucky enough** to have the right plan spelled out for them in a dream, but for the rest of us, it's enough to remember this: God's plan is often the one that leads us to places of great simplicity, great humility and great love. THOUGHTS ON THE WAY UP MOUNT CARMEL

I always found the Feast of Epiphany to be a fascinating observance in our Catholic tradition. Not only do **we recall the manifestation of the Savior** to the non-Jewish world (represented by the magi or kings from the East), the Church also **associates the feast with** the Baptism of the Lord, and the miracle at the wedding at Cana. This is made explicit in the Liturgy of the Hours, which complements the celebration of the Eucharist. At first look, these three events are far apart in place and time, and few similarities are readily evident. Yet as we ponder each in the gospels, we can **begin to recognize the common** thread in the mind of the Church – **Each account records an momentous occasion** when the grace of Christ broke into the world in a new way, and He is recognized as the powerful Son of God. It's as if Jesus is crossing borders, and breaking into the human family with saving power and saving wisdom. **We can best celebrate this feast**, then, by opening up the border of our heart, and let Him enter in new ways.

Some of you have expressed your **gratitude for the return of ringing the bells** during the consecration at Mass. Some of you have politely asked, why **bring this back? While it is not required, the** ringing of bells is allowed during the Eucharistic Prayer. A recent national survey has indicated that many practicing Catholics do not fully comprehend an essential truth of our Catholic faith – that at Mass the **bread and wine truly become the Body and Blood of Christ.** We have used various terms to honor this reality – The Real Presence, Transubstantiation, the Blessed Sacrament. So it seems to me that an audible reminder (the bells) can help us **consciously affirm** what happens when the priest prays the words of consecration over the bread and wine. He is with us. He wishes to be received by us. **He wants to dwell within us** with His eternal mercy and love. He wants to work through us. A pious custom from Ireland (and other lands) is for the faithful to whisper an acclamation of faith when the Body and Blood are elevated after consecration: "My Lord and my God!" These are the words of St. Thomas as the Risen Christ called him to believe after the resurrection. They can be our words too at every Mass.

Finally, I **thank you for your generosity to the parish** and your kindness to priests and deacon over the Christmas holidays. Be assured of our prayers and gratitude.
