

Baptism of the Lord. On January 9 the Church celebrates the Solemnity of the Baptism of Our Lord. This brings to an end the season of Christmas. The Church recalls Our Lord's second manifestation or epiphany which occurred on the occasion of His baptism in the Jordan. Jesus descended into the river to sanctify its waters and to give them the power to beget sons of God. The event takes on the importance of a second creation in which the entire Trinity intervenes.

In the Eastern Church this feast is called Theophany because at the baptism of Christ in the river Jordan God appeared in three persons. The baptism of John was a sort of sacramental preparatory for the Baptism of Christ. It moved men to sentiments of repentance and induced them to confess their sins. Christ did not need the baptism of John. Although He appeared in the "substance of our flesh" and was recognized "outwardly like unto ourselves", He was absolutely sinless and impeccable. He conferred upon the water the power of the true Baptism which would remove all the sins of the world. "Behold the Lamb of God, behold Him Who takes away the sin of the world".

The Mask Mandate and the Body of Christ

Here we are just having begun the Year of Grace 2022, and to our disappointment, are still dealing with Covid 19 and the inconvenience of safety protocols that come with it. I'm sure that news of the reinstatement of the mask mandate left many of us displeased, especially after we thought it to be over and done with. In response, some parishioners have asked if we can forgo this mandate, and others have refused to wear the mask at worship. Others have refused to attend Mass as long as the mandate is in effect, and still others have expressed their objection in less prudent ways. While it can be admitted that none of us enjoy wearing the masks, it must be noted that this mandate comes from the Diocese of Buffalo and applies to all parishes, and is therefore not negotiable at the parish level. As Catholics, we sometimes have the duty to challenge civil lawmakers in defense of our morals, but we must respect Church governance.

While there are some among us who resent the mandate, there are also some who have greater cause for concern regarding the health of themselves and those with whom they are in frequent contact. Such parishioners have expressed feeling uncomfortable at Mass, and some have been deterred by those refusing to wear masks. Observing this reveals a greater pastoral concern, one not only dealing with protecting our bodies from viruses, but with protecting the Body of Christ from divisiveness and other attitudes that sadden its communion. It goes without saying that we are enduring a time of frustration, fear, mixed information, tension and many other things, but we cannot forget that it is our duty to be Christ to our fellow members of His body, and to sustain our communion with them. This is a higher priority than winning scientific arguments or making our positions known through impactful gestures. Only through compassion and solidarity can the Body of Christ remain unified, and this unity is crucial at a time when there are many things driving us apart. As we tire of wearing our masks, and some of us feel confident in the face of the pandemic, we must remember that also in our family are those who have more serious vulnerabilities and those who have lost loved ones to the pandemic. It should not be expected that they be on the same level of comfort and confidence, and it is our duty to be mindful of their concerns, and to help them to feel welcome at the Eucharistic table.

Remember that when Jesus was about to undergo His passion He prayed to the Father that the unity among all of His people would be brought about by His sacrifice (John 17:21). We also know that Jesus is our Good Shepherd, always seeking out those who stray from the flock. It is our duty to have the same concern for keeping the flock together. Jesus, being completely without sin, underwent a brutal punishment to heal the divisions that sin has caused. I'm sure we'd agree that wearing a mask is a much smaller imposition then what Jesus endured.

Mindful of our duty to maintain compassion, solidarity, and communion, I ask that you respect the current requirement. Of course, while some of us may have breathing difficulties, or might need little "breathing breaks," this is understandable and permissable, but may our unity remain our greater concern. In solidarity and compassion, let us assist each other in moving beyond this tough episode with Christ as our guide.

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


