REGARDING THE SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE: This is the time of year when couples begin making plans for the Sacrament of Matrimony. When making wedding plans please keep the following in mind:

- NO date may be set for the ceremony until an initial meeting with the Pastor. In some cases (if the couple is under 19 years of age or if there has been a prior marriage by one or both parties) pre-marital assessment, professional counseling or an annulment may be required. This is a diocesan policy. Even though social halls, deejays and photographers are in great demand, it is far more costly to recover from a broken marriage if the best possible pre-marriage preparation process is not employed.
- 2) All couples must call for an appointment themselves. Great confusion results when other family members phone for the couple.
- 3) The minimum amount of time required for marriage preparation is six months.
- 4) The manner in which a baptized Catholic is to be married (or, the canonical form) is by a Catholic priest or deacon in a Catholic Church. Ceremonies out of doors or at other "romantic" locations are not permitted by Canon Law and diocesan policy.
- 5) Each couple is assessed a charge for church related costs that must be paid at the time of your rehearsal. The fee covers the FOCCUS pre-marital inventory, church cleaning following the ceremony, the officiant's and parish musician's fees. The details of these charges will be explained at the couple's first session with the priest or deacon. (The couple pays fees for their Pre-Cana workshop, Engagement Encounter weekend, and stipends for non-parish musicians, etc. separately.)
- 6) The goal of our marriage preparation process is not to help the couple plan for the perfect wedding. It is, rather, to assist them in establishing a life-long sacramental marriage with faithfulness to the Lord Jesus Christ and each other at the center of their life together. THE SACRAMENT OF PENANCE is scheduled for Saturday, January 18 – 3:00 p.m. (or by appointment) **BLESSING OF THE HOME ON EPIPHANY** - Here is a wonderful Catholic tradition for you to repeat at home today. Using an ordinary piece of chalk, mark your main doorway like this: 20 + C + M + B + 25. The numerals refer to the New Year of the Lord, the four crosses represent the four seasons and the initials C, M, B stand for the traditional names of the three kings, Caspar, Melchior and Balthazar or the Latin phrase "*Christus Mansionem Bendeicat*" (*May Christ Bless This Dwelling Place*). Then, bless the doorways and rooms of your home—let each of the kids bless his or her bedroom—with holy water. (I bet you still have one of those small plastic "Holy Water" bottles you picked up one Easter!)

Then, gathered around your kitchen table, offer this prayer:

Bless our home, Lord, with the peace and joy of your presence. Heal all of our family who are in need of your touch. Teach us how to offer hospitality to every guest, seeing your Face in every stranger and welcoming all who enter here as you Welcome us into your Kingdom in this life and the next. Amen.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE TO BE A SPONSOR FOR BAPTISM OR CONFIRMATION?

Before you ask anyone *or* are asked to be a godparent or sponsor consider the following requirements:

- You must be registered in the/a parish, attending Mass on Sundays and on Holy Days, and contributing to the support of the Church;
- 2) You must be at least 16 years of age and already confirmed;
- 3) If married the marriage must be a valid Catholic marriage. Divorced persons are permitted to be sponsors (and always welcome to the Sacraments!) unless they have *remarried outside the Church*.
- 4) One godparent *must* be a Catholic and meet the requirements listed above. The other may be a baptized Catholic or a Christian from another denomination. The latter will be recorded in the baptismal registry as a "Christian Witness".
- 5) If the godparent or sponsor you choose is from another parish, a "sponsor certificate" from their home parish is required. If you need a "sponsor certificate", you must signify in writing that you fulfill the first requirement (above).
- 6) Any questions? Need a sponsor certificate? Call the parish office.

(PRACTICING) CATHOLIC – THE ANSWER

Have you ever had an epiphany?

I'll confess that I've never spent much time reflecting on the term "epiphany." In my head, there has always been a strict separation of church and state when it comes to this word. I think of the religious feast of the Epiphany, when we celebrate the magi's encounter with the Christ Child, as totally distinct from our modern understanding of the ancient Greek word epipháneia, which means "manifestation" or "appearance."

"I've had an epiphany," I have said many times before, and what I mean is that I have come to a long-awaited realization. I have received the answer to a question which has perplexed me, perhaps troubled me. I now know what course of action I must take.

"Today is the Epiphany," I say to my children when we make a king cake and bring the little magi figures to our Nativity beneath the Christmas tree (which will, after today, be put back into storage, for the Christmas season has come to its fulfillment).

And I've always thought I meant I was saying two very different things.

But today, I ponder the journey of the magi, one that must have often been treacherous and uncomfortable. I think about their meeting with Herod, a situation that certainly was fraught with tension and fear. And I imagine the feeling in their hearts as they approached the young Messiah and fell to their knees. I think of the peace they must have felt. The new, vibrant awareness of what their own purpose was.

It was an epiphany for them — a discovery of truth. An answer.

It should be the same for us.
