From Father George's Desk...No, our volunteers didn't run out of steam before they got finished taking down Christmas decorations. The wreaths and the greenery around the church were left up on purpose. There is an old custom still celebrated in many parts of the Church "to keep at least a remnant of the Christmas season's greenery and lights 'til [February 2] in order to keep the old Christmas to Candlemas Season". [Catholic Sourcebook, p. 284] In fact, if you ever visit the Vatican at this time of year you will see that the tree in St. Peter's Square remains up until February 2, the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord, or Candlemas Day. There is a continuity between Christmastide and these first weeks of Ordinary Time. "[T]he Church lives in the light of the birth of the Messiah, and enters a new calendar year with a renewed hope that the world will know that peace and justice are truly possible." The readings of these weeks "serve to announce that a new time of salvation has once again entered the lives of all the people of God. The time has come to leave the gentle comfort of Bethlehem and answer the call to discipleship with the Lord, who invites us into his mission to bring the kingdom of God to the ends of the earth." [2013 Sourcebook: The Almanac for Pastoral Liturgy, pp. 58, 66] So, yes, it is Ordinary Time but the remnants of the Christmas finery remind us that we dwell always in the gladsome light of Christ, not just at Christmas.

On Monday the nation honors the **memory and the legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.** on the 93rd anniversary of his birth. Much work remains until Dr. King's dream enunciated so powerfully on the steps of the Lincoln Memorial nearly 60 years ago are realized: *"I have a dream today that my four little children will one day live in a nation where they will not be judged by the color of their skin but by the content of their character."* May we, the Church, never tire in our prayer and work for justice, for peace, and for understanding in our communities, across our nation, and around the world that one day we may live in a world where all people will not be judged by the color of their skin, nor by the faith they profess, nor the language they speak, nor any other human factor but truly by the content of their character.

The bishops of the United States have declared that January 22 should be observed as a **day of prayer for life**, marking the anniversary of the Supreme Court's horrific *Roe v. Wade* decision. While the National March for Life in Washington, DC has become a major focus of this anniversary, it is a time for all Catholics to **reflect upon our call to proclaim the gospel of life and to join in prayerful solidarity for the cause of life**. The Church teaches clearly and forcefully, that while the cause of protecting the lives of the unborn is an essential element of the Church's teaching on the sanctity of human life, the gospel of life is much more expansive. Every person is made in the image and likeness of God, therefore, all human life, from conception to natural death, is sacred and worthy of protection. *I invite you to make a special effort to make this Saturday a day of prayer for life*.

The following prayer from the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops is one you may want to clip and recite frequently, as one small way of keeping prayerful solidarity for the cause of life:

Father and maker of all, you adorn all creation with splendor and beauty, and fashion human lives in your image and likeness. Awaken in every heart reverence for the work of your hands, and renew among your people a readiness to nurture and sustain your precious gift of life. Grant this through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God forever and ever. Amen.

This Wednesday is our monthly day of Eucharistic Adoration, from 8:30AM-Noon. It would be a perfect opportunity to spend some special time in prayer for the cause of life.

With the festivities of Christmastide behind us, it's time to get back into the swing of things around the parish, including **planning for our Parish Festival**. Our next planning meeting will be Tuesday, January 18 at 6:30PM in Gillen Hall. The primary item on the agenda will be looking for parishioners to take the lead in coordinating the various festival areas and an overall festival chair. The festival is set for July 31.


