REFLECTIONS

SCRIPTURE REFLECTION

Despite the appearances of the Risen Christ to Mary Magdalene and the news that the Lord had risen and was alive, the disciples were slow to believe. Today's Gospel relates the appearance of the Risen Christ to the disciples who were locked up in fear in the upper room. "Peace be with you!" he proclaims on meeting the disciples. He breathes on them the Holy Spirit and sends them out to proclaim the Good News of God's saving love to the ends of the earth.

The Acts of the Apostles speaks of the "many signs and wonders" that were performed at the hands of the disciples, curing the sick and expelling demons. The work of Jesus continues to be made manifest in and through the disciples and the Church that has been born from the outpouring of the Spirit.

That same Easter proclamation is given to us. Jesus has risen as he said, Alleluia! Alleluia! Jesus invites us to have faith in the Resurrection and desires for each of us to know his peace, his joy, and his love. The Risen Christ desires for us to have that same experience recounted in the Book of Revelation in our second reading: "He touched me with his right hand and said: Do not be afraid. I am the first and the last, the one who lives. Once I was dead but now, I am alive forever and ever."

Easter calls us to believe in the Risen Christ, to see the signs and wonders all around us of the presence of the Living God. The danger of course is our spiritual blindness to these marvels of God's love, the ways in which God lifts us up from our human misery, the peace that comes from the forgiveness of our sins, the healing strength that we experience through our Lord in times of suffering and sickness, the loving hand of God that we feel in our hearts when we kneel in prayer before the Blessed Sacrament, or the overwhelming sense of God's majesty that can come from the magnificence of a sunset, the spring time or the waters on the beach. The Gospel speaks directly to us this week as Jesus proclaims to disciples: "Have you come to believe because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed."

Faith is the gift of this Easter season. We are called to reflect on what has been recorded in the Sacred Scripture and what has been lived out in the Living Tradition of the Church so that we may come to believe "that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that through this belief you may have life in his name." Faith is a gift from God, but also a response of the human heart. What does faith in God mean? It means coming to know God's greatness and majesty. It means living in thanksgiving for gifts received. It means knowing the unity and true dignity of the human person. It means making good use of created things to the glory and honor of God. It means trusting in God, even in adversity. As Saint Paul instructed the early Christians, "Now faith is assurance of things hoped for, a conviction of things not seen." May this Easter season strengthen our faith and trust in God so that we can be led through this faith to possess the things of heaven.

neighborhood, workplace, dormitory, or school. We all know someone who used to come to Mass but is no longer participating. Maybe some are disillusioned with the changes in the parish or the struggles in the Church. Maybe some have left because of an experience where they did not feel welcome. **Each of us has a responsibility to reach out and to be an Easter witness.** The work of bringing people back to Church is the work of each and every one of us – not someone else. **Take the EASTER CHALLENGE this year and identify one person whom you know who may not be coming to Mass any longer or who may have stepped away from involvement in our parish and do what you can to reach out and to invite them back.** God will not judge us on whether or not the person responds – that is up to them. But we will be judged on how hard we are trying to reach out and share the Good News of our faith with others. **This is the true work of EVANGELIZATION and each of us must be an EVANGELIZER.** Make an effort to reach out to someone and invite them back. If everyone in our parish could bring just one person back to Church what a blessing that would be for them and for us. Here are a few tips on how to engage in the **EASTER CHALLENGE**:

- Reach out to someone by a phone call or visit and let them know they are missed.
 - Share your experience of what the Church means to you and how coming to Mass makes a difference in your life.
 - Ask the person why they may not be coming to Mass and ask if there is anything you can do to help.
 - Invite them to come to Mass with you.
 - Offer to pray for them and their family.
 - Be a friend and companion who is willing to listen but never judge.
 - Extend hospitality, kindness and welcome.
2. **Hospitality and welcome are the foundations for our parish community.** And each of us are charged with being those ministers of inclusion, kindness, welcome, and joy. It isn't good enough to simply say that you don't feel welcome. Do something about it. Everyone should make an effort when coming to Mass at either the Saint Rosalia site or Saint Paul Cathedral, or participating in any activity, ministry, or event of our parish, to go out of your way to extend welcome and hospitality. That is something everyone can do. Smile at those around you; extend a word of welcome (Great to see you; Glad you are here; Please come back again). How often do we make others feel like we want them to part of our parish community? Sourpusses, complainers, angry people chase other people away. Reach out to those around you, especially strangers whom you may not know. We need everyone in our parish to make others feel like they are a special part of our parish community. All are welcome; all belong; all are important to our parish. Please don't just complain about not feeling welcome. Please don't treat others badly or ignore them; Do something about creating a spirit of welcome, hospitality, and

inclusion. If we all did that better, our parish would grow and increase as people want to be where there is kindness, respect, and joy.

TODAY IS DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY. In 1931 Our Lord granted a vision to Saint Faustina with two rays emanating from His heart, one red and the other pale. As she gazed intently at Him, He said to her, "Paint an image according to the pattern you see with the signature: **Jesus, I Trust in You** ... I promise that the soul that will venerate this image will not perish. I also promise victory over its enemies already here on earth, especially at the hour of death. I Myself will defend it as My own glory ... I am offering people a vessel with which they are to keep coming for graces to the fountain of mercy ... I desire that this image be venerated throughout the world. By means of this image I shall grant many graces to souls. I want this image to be blessed on the first Sunday after Easter, the eighth, or octave day of the resurrection: that Sunday is to be the Feast of Mercy. The two rays denote blood and water. The pale ray stands for the Water which makes souls righteous. The red ray stands for the Blood which is the life of souls. These two rays issued forth from the very depths of My tender mercy when My agonized Heart was opened by a lance on the cross. These rays shield souls from the wrath of My Father. Happy is the one who will dwell in their shelter, for the just hand of God shall not lay hold of Him." Blessed Pope John Paul II canonized Sister Faustina and consecrated the Second Sunday of Easter as Divine Mercy Sunday. He said: "Indeed the message she brought is the appropriate and incisive answer that God wanted to offer to the questions and expectations of human beings in our time, marked by terrible tragedies. Jesus said to Sister Faustina one day: "Mankind will not have peace until it turns with trust to My mercy" (Diary, 300). Divine Mercy! This is the Easter gift that the Church receives from the risen Christ and offers to humanity at the dawn of the third millennium.

A PLENARY INDULGENCE can be obtained, under the usual conditions (sacramental confession, Eucharistic communion, and prayer for the intentions of Supreme Pontiff) to the faithful who, on the Second Sunday of Easter or Divine Mercy Sunday, in any church or chapel, in a spirit that is completely detached from the affection for a sin, even a venial sin, take part in the prayers and devotions held in honor of Divine Mercy, or who, in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament exposed or reserved in the tabernacle, recite the *Our Father* and the *Creed*, adding a devout prayer to the merciful Lord Jesus (e.g. "Merciful Jesus, I trust in you!").

INSTALLATION OF AUTOMATED EXTERNAL DEFIBRILLATORS (AED's). We have recently upgraded and installed fully operative AED's in both Saint Paul Cathedral Church, Social Hall, Synod Hall, and in the Saint Rosalia site Church. Automated external defibrillators (AEDs) are portable, life-saving devices designed to treat people experiencing sudden cardiac arrest, a medical condition in which the heart stops beating suddenly and unexpectedly. The combination of CPR and early defibrillation is effective in saving lives when used in the first few minutes following collapse from sudden cardiac arrest. The AED system includes accessories, such as a battery and pad electrodes, that are necessary for the AED to detect and interpret an electrocardiogram and deliver an electrical shock. These are **public access AEDs** that can be found in churches, airports, community centers, schools, government buildings, hospitals, and other public locations. They are intended to be used by laypeople who have received minimal training. They are clearly marked and can be accessed easily by those medical professionals and others who have been trained in the case of an emergency. We will be providing some training opportunities for those interested once the pandemic restrictions are lifted allowing us to gather in groups safely.

THE SACRAMENT OF CONFIRMATION will be celebrated at Saint Paul Cathedral parish on Monday, May 3 at 6:30 pm. All those students from our parish who are ready to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation should have been in contact with Terri Taormina, our Director for Religious Education. We have several adults who will also be confirmed with the students that evening. Please keep our confirmation candidates in your prayers.

FIRST HOLY COMMUNION will be celebrated at Saint Paul Cathedral parish on Sunday, May 9 (Mothers' Day) at the 10:00 am Mass. All of those to receive first Holy Communion should have already been in contact with Terri Taormina, our Director for Religious Education. Please keep our first Holy Communion candidates in your prayers as well.

SAINT PAUL CATHEDRAL PARISH FOOD PANTRY. The former food pantries serving Saint Paul Cathedral parish and Saint Rosalia parish have been combined into one parish food pantry over the past several months. We are happy to report that the food pantry is fully operational and serving many people with need in our communities. The food pantry is now operating out of the Saint Rosalia rectory (the former Saint Rosalia parish office). Currently the pantry distributes food supplies weekly every Tuesday from 2:00 pm until 3:00 pm. We have had wonderful support from our partner, the Greater Pittsburgh Community Food Bank. We have been able to secure many food supplies, including produce, milk, eggs, cheese, butter, and other dairy products as well as frozen meats, canned goods, and dry food supplies. We just recently received a \$3,000 grant from the Community Food Bank to help the Saint Paul Cathedral Food Pantry serve our clients in these challenging times. Many thanks to the parish volunteers who are stocking the food pantry, preparing the bags for distribution and for those meeting with our patrons and distributing the food. It is a wonderful and needed ministry and those who participate are so very grateful for the kindness and assistance they receive. With more and more people being vaccinated, we are hoping that some of our regular food pantry volunteers – as well as other interested people in our parish – will consider volunteering to help us in this ministry. Financial donations – including Giant Eagle gift cards – are more helpful to us at this time in meeting the needs of our clients.

We need more young people to help with the serving ministry at both our Saint Rosalia site and Saint Paul Cathedral. Anyone in 4th grade or above is welcome to help. Training is provided. We invite our parents to encourage your children and young people to serve. High school and college age students are needed to serve as well. Please consider assisting the parish in this important ministry. Call the parish office if you are interested and Father Stubna will get back to you. God bless.

SAINT OF THE WEEK. When **Martin I** (Feast Day, April 13) became pope in 649, Constantinople was the capital of the Byzantine empire and the patriarch of Constantinople was the most influential Church leader in the eastern Christian world. The struggles that existed within the Church at that time were magnified by the close cooperation of emperor and patriarch. A teaching, strongly supported in the East, held that Christ had no human will. Twice, emperors had officially favored this position: Heraclius by publishing a formula of faith, and Constans II by silencing the issue of one or two wills in Christ. Shortly after assuming the office of the papacy – which he did without first being confirmed by the emperor – Martin held a council at the Lateran in which the imperial documents were censured, and in which the patriarch of Constantinople and two of his predecessors were condemned. In response, Constans II first tried to turn bishops and people against the pope. Failing in this and in an attempt to kill the pope, the emperor sent troops to Rome to seize Martin and to bring him back to Constantinople. Already in poor health, Martin offered no resistance, returned with Calliopas, the exarch of Constantinople, and was then submitted to various imprisonments, tortures, and hardships. Although condemned to death and with some of the imposed torture already carried out, Martin was saved from execution by the pleas of a repentant Paul, patriarch of Constantinople, who was himself gravely ill. Tortures and cruel treatment having taken their toll, Martin died shortly thereafter. He is the last of the early popes to be venerated as a martyr. The real significance of the word *martyr* comes not from the dying but from the witnessing, which the word means in its derivation. People who are willing to give up everything, their most precious possessions, their very lives, put a supreme value on the cause or belief for which they sacrifice. Martyrdom, dying for the faith, is an incidental extreme to which some have had to go to manifest their belief in Christ. A living faith, a life that exemplifies Christ's teaching throughout, and that in spite of difficulties, is required of all Christians. Martin refused to cut corners as a way of easing his lot, to make some accommodations with the civil rulers.



Close with the Sign of the Cross.
Jesus' promise to St. Faustina
"Say unceasingly this chaplet that I have taught you. Anyone who says it will receive great Mercy at the hour of death. Priests will recommend it to sinners as the last hope. Even the most hardened sinner, if he recites this Chaplet even once, will receive grace from My Infinite Mercy. I want the whole world to know My Infinite Mercy. I want to give unimaginable graces to those who trust in My Mercy...."
"...When they say this Chaplet in the presence of the dying, I will stand between My Father and the dying person not as the just judge but as the Merciful Savior."
