

From the Pastor's Desk...



Today is the Thirty-third Sunday in Ordinary Time. As we approach the end of the liturgical year, these Scriptures remind us that we live in the final stage of humanity's story, the stage that began with Jesus' death and resurrection. This apocalyptic reading aims to display God's consistent involvement in all creation, including political and international affairs on earth. Earthly kingdoms rise and fall; God's kingdom is eternal. The author of Daniel writes about signs that will mark the end of time, including earthly and cosmic upheavals and the persecution of those who remain faithful to God. A figure called Michael will play an unspecified role in these events. This reading includes one of the few Old Testament references to life after death.

The author of Hebrews presents Jesus as the high priest and contrasts his ministry to that of other Jewish high priests. This passage focuses on Jesus' one-time sacrifice and his enthronement at God's right hand. There he waits until his enemies "are made his footstool," an image from biblical art which depicts a king resting his feet on the heads of his vanquished foes. As the baptized live out their life according to Christ, they are "being made holy, different or other."

In the verses preceding this passage, Jesus' disciples marveled at the construction of the Temple in Jerusalem. It was the tallest building in the city and Jesus' announcement that not one of its stones would be left atop another would have been hard to imagine. When he arrives at the Mount of Olives, which even today provides a splendid view of the Temple complex, his disciples ask him when the destruction of the temple will begin. Chapter 13 of Mark is called his "apocalypse" chapter because its themes, images and symbolic language are like those found in Daniel. Jesus announces that the sun, the moon and the stars will be darkened and stars will fall from the sky. Amid this upheaval, his disciples will see the Son of Man coming in the clouds with great power and glory. Jesus uses a fig tree as a visual aid. Unlike evergreens, the fig tree changes seasons. When people see the leaves start to

blossom, they know that summer is near and that their figs will ripen. Just so, when we see the signs that Jesus announces, we will know that the return of the Son of Man is at hand. His teaching that "this generation will not pass away until all these things have taken place" is unclear. What is clear is that no one—even Jesus—can know when this will happen; only the Father. He reminds his disciples to watch constantly for his coming, that is, to live like he will return later in the day or at dawn tomorrow.

A synod is underway in Germany, the first in the Catholic world, and recently they voted 168 to 28 to adopt a draft statement on sexuality saying that "same-sex partnerships who want to take the risk of an unbreakable common life...should be able to see themselves placed under the blessing of God. A recent ban on such a blessing by the Vatican was seen by Bishop Georg Batzing, head of the German Bishops Conference, as causing "indignation and head-shaking among many people, provoking incomprehension among many theologians and exemplified the inner discord of the Catholic Church." Another proposal on the role of women in leadership positions in the church passed with a 92% approval rate.

Pope Francis has again cautioned bishops about wading into politics as U.S. bishops question whether or not to deny communion to pro-choice politicians such as President Biden. "I have never refused the eucharist to anyone," he said. He stressed that bishops should be pastors, not politicians and referred to Communion as a "gift" and not "a prize for the perfect." The American bishops are considering a document on the Eucharist and debating whether to include a ban on communion for pro-choice politicians. Earlier this year, the head of the Vatican's Congregation for Doctrine wrote a letter to Archbishop Jose Gomez, head of the American Bishops' Conference cautioning that bishops should avoid politics and stick to being pastors.

Bishop Joseph Strickland of Tyler, Texas, issued a stinging rebuke of Nancy Pelosi, saying that if she does not repent on her position on abortion, she will end up in hell. The same day, Pope Francis received Pelosi and her husband in a private audience at the Vatican and never raised the issue. The pope also met with President Joe Biden. Some of these bishops think they are more Catholic than the pope!!

Seminary enrollment in Poland dropped dramatically this year with the enrollment down by slightly over 20 percent. This year there are only 356 men in priestly formation in all of Poland. Just five years ago, there were 828. The drop in numbers come in the shadow of sexual abuse scandals that have violently shaken the Church in Poland. A recent government report reveals that 30% of sexual abuse cases involving minors committed between 2017 and 2020 had been committed by members of the clergy. In the past year alone, the Vatican has taken action against nine Polish bishops who are accused of having covered up cases of abuse by their clergy.

The Pew Research Center found that 82% of Catholics adults said they were at least partially vaccinated against COVID, data that includes 86% of Latino Catholics and 79% of white Catholics. Among Protestants, 74% of white nonevangelicals and 70% of those who are Black said they had received at least one dose, but the share among Evangelicals was much lower at only 57%. Similarly, Latino Protestants also fell short of the vaccination rate among Latino Catholics with 67% having received at least one dose.

Congratulations to parishioner Gary Winschel who was recently re-elected chair of the Millcreek School Board. It's nice to see people who are so dedicated to public education. Without that dedication, our children—and us—we would suffer.

Dr. Michael Nazie-Ali, retired Anglican Bishop of Rochester, England, was recently received into full communion in the Catholic Church. He will eventually be ordained to the Catholic priesthood. A native of Pakistan, he is both a Pakistani and British citizen. He holds academic degrees from Oxford, Cambridge and the University of Karachi as well as a Lambeth Doctor of Divinity. He ministered in England and Pakistan before being ordained a bishop of Rochester in 1984. He is married and the father of two adult sons.

An elderly man was having a hearing problem and went to see a specialist. The doctor fitted him with some hearing aids that brought his hearing back to full strength. 306 DAYS TO THE 2022 ERIE IRISH FESTIVAL



OH, DANNY BOY.

Elvis Presley said he thought the angels had written it and it was played at his funeral, and at John Kennedy's, and at so many others and here at St. Pats on all souls day. It's one of the most beautiful and recognizable songs in the world, perhaps the greatest of Irish songs. But *Danny Boy's* lyrics were written by an Englishman and the tune, which was probably composed in the 17th century by a blind Irish harpist, was brought to him from the Colorado gold fields by his immigrant sister who had supposedly heard it being played by some Australian prospectors in the early 1900's. It's quite a song, and it has quite a story--many competing stories actually--more than we can fit here, but we'll give you the flavor of them.

In the early 1600's, the English were bent on confiscating the land of the Irish nobles who opposed them in Northern Ireland and snatched some property from the O'Cahan clan, one of the descendents of which was Blind Rory Dall. O'Cahan, a virtuoso and composer on the harp, who lived near Derry, or Londonderry as the English called it. There are two stories about the composition of the "Londonderry Air," (not to be confused with a London derriere), which would become the music for *Danny Boy*. One is that the land grab enraged Blind Rory and he wrote the tune. Another is that Blind Rory, staggering home drunk one night, passed out and heard the fairies playing a haunting melody, which, when he sobered up, he remembered, and played for friends on his harp. We prefer to believe the latter.

It was another blind Irish harpist, a fellow named Denis O'Hampsey, born in the late 1600's, who brought the tune with him into the early 1800's, where he died at the age of 112. But the music was not actually written down, it seems, until later in the 19th century when an English woman, herself a composer, heard it being played by a blind fiddle player (there's a pattern here) named Jimmy McCurry. It then made its way to America with the great wave of Irish immigrants fleeing the potato famine. Long story short (too late), Frederic Weatherly, an English lawyer who also wrote songs, had written *Danny Boy* but with different music. The song was a flop until his sister heard *Londonderry Air* being played in the Colorado Rockies by Australian gold prospectors and brought him the music. The resultant marriage of Blind Rory's tune and Weatherly's lyrics became a phenomenal hit—perhaps because it coincided with the outbreak of World War I and it speaks so movingly to separation and loss.

When you come to the 2022 Erie Irish Festival, and we know you will, there's a good chance you will hear *Danny Boy* once or twice, and, if you also sample enough Irish whiskey, you may even hear it, as Blind Rory did, played by the fairies as you stumble home.

The pipes, the pipes are calling. You call too.

DECREE

REVISING THE PRACTICE OF THE FAITHFUL DURING THE COMMUNION RITE OF THE MASS

WHEREAS the current edition of the *General Instruction of the Roman Missal* was promulgated in Latin by the Holy See in the year 2000, and the English translation of the same was approved by the Holy See in 2003, together with adaptations approved for use in the United States of America;

Whereas among the approved adaptations for use in the United States is the following: "In the Dioceses of the United States of America, they [the faithful], should kneel ...after the *Agnus Dei* (Lamb of God) unless the Diocesan Bishop determines otherwise," (paragraph 42);

Whereas in 2003, the then Bishop of Erie, the Most Reverend Donald W. Trautman, determined that the faithful in the Diocese of Erie would stand instead of kneel after the *Agnus Dei* and throughout the Communion Rite;

Whereas the practice in the Diocese of Erie differs from the practice of most dioceses in the United States, and it is increasingly difficult for many parishioners to stand for long periods of time during the distribution of Holy Communion, and across the diocese countless parishioners – often the majority in many parishes - on their own accord have already returned to the practice of kneeling after the *Agnus Dei*;

Whereas in light of the above, I judge it pastorally expedient and an effective sign of our communion with our neighboring dioceses that we return to the practice approved by the Holy See for use in the United States;

THEREFORE, in accord with paragraph 42 of the *General Instruction of the Roman Missal*, I direct that the faithful in the Diocese of Erie shall kneel at Mass following the conclusion of the *Agnus Dei*. Those who receive Holy Communion may, upon returning to their place, either kneel or sit according to their choice until the beginning of the prayer after Communion, at which time all stand.

I direct that this Decree be published and take effect on the First Sunday of Advent, which begins at 4:00 p.m. on November 27, 2021, anything to the contrary notwithstanding.

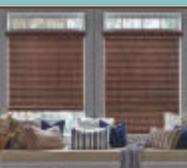
