

### ***From the Pastor's Desk...***



Today is the last Sunday of the church year and is always celebrated as the Feast of Christ the King. The Book of Daniel reminds people that earthly kingdoms vie for power and territory, but that God reigns over all of them to accomplish his divine plan. Today's passage presents Daniel's vision of the throne room of the "Ancient One," which is a title for God. As he watches, someone like a "Son of Man" enters. The identity of the figure is unclear. While the "Son of Man" denotes a human being, some scholars find that Daniel gives the title a supernatural meaning. In the Synoptic Gospels (MT, MK, LK), Jesus uses "Son of Man" as a self-designation, and for the evangelists, it is a title which recognizes that Jesus is the one who received from God "dominion, glory and kingship" over all.

This reading calls Jesus the firstborn of the dead and the ruler of the kings of the earth. In Exodus, Moses declares that Israelites who are faithful to God's covenant will become a "kingdom of priests" and Isaiah 61 announces that after the Lord brings Israel back to the land from Babylon, the people will be called "priests of the Lord," and "ministers of our God." For the author of Revelation, and in the baptismal rite, all the baptized are anointed "priests" and thus called wherever they are. In the writings of the early church, Christians are called to be other Christs through whom God's grace flows into the world around them. Their faithful witness manifests his kingship on earth. The Lord is the "alpha and the omega," the first and last letters of the Greek alphabet. God was, is and will be active in every time and place.

Often the reason people give for an action—the truth behind it—is not the real reason. As in this passage, the real reasons that the religious authorities want to get rid of Jesus are that his interpretation of Torah often undermines their own teachings and the comfortable lifestyle they have adopted. They tell Pilate not the real reason, but that Jesus claims to be King of the Jews, a claim which marks Jesus as a rebel with whom Pilate must deal. Though Pilate recognizes their deceit, he does not challenge them for fear of political

repercussions. Ironically, he does not realize that he is one on trial here, on trial before God. Pilate is guilty of not acknowledging the truth to which Jesus bears witness, namely that God loves all human beings and that Jesus came to lead them to eternal communion with God. Pilate also refuses to see that he has no power over Jesus. Jesus will die, not because Pilate condemns him but because Jesus chooses to lay down his life. Jesus' kingdom is not sustained by violence. He tells Pilate that if his kingdom were earthly, his followers would be fighting to maintain it and to stop him from being handed over. Jesus' kingdom is spiritual.

The parish office will close at noon on Wednesday and be closed Thursday and Friday for the Thanksgiving holiday. There is no Mass nor Communion service on Thursday or Friday of this week.

Fiske Company has been doing the exterior work on the rectory and have now been at it for a couple of months. I spoke with them recently and they are hopeful they can finish all of the work this fall. They cleaned the brick which hasn't been cleaned since the house was built in 1915 and I think you can see the results. They have to put a sealer on it which should preserve it for a long time to come. In many places they had to chisel out the mortar between the bricks because it was crumbling and falling out. There were places where there was simply no mortar left at all. Next spring we can touch up the lawn in the areas where it's been damaged and then hopefully we're done with this work for awhile. This project has cost almost \$275,000!!! These hundred year old buildings are cash cows, but they have to be maintained or else. I remember when I came here 12 years ago, I lived at St. Hedwig's for 3 years because it was impossible to move into this house. There simply wasn't the money to maintain it properly and it had been let go. Thanks to the growth in the parish and thanks, in particular, to your generosity, we're able to tackle these problems today and hopefully this building will be here for another 106 years.

The Erie Philharmonic Concert which was presented in St. Patrick's Church earlier this fall will be televised on Thanksgiving Night on WQLN at 7 PM. The concert not only presents their outstanding music, but also a piece on the pipe organ by our own Mark Alloway.

There was originally a large wooden home here that was the original Casey family home. Fr. Casey was pastor here from the late 1870s until he was named the first rector of St. Peter's Cathedral in 1892 when the cathedral was dedicated. Father Casey's father was Canadian and built the Welland Canal and the Canadian Pacific Railroad. Father Casey used his large inheritance to build up the church in our diocese. He gave Bishop Tobias Mullen almost all of the money to build St. Peter's Cathedral, gave a great deal of money to build the original Sisters of St. Joseph Motherhouse on West 8th and Liberty Streets and did a multitude of other charitable works for the poor and destitute. He is the only non-bishop to have his bust in St. Peter's Cathedral along with the busts of all of the bishops of Erie. If you're ever driving south on Peninsula Drive between West 8th and West 12 Sts., look into Trinity Cemetery directly across from the McDonald's and you'll see an incredible elaborate set of tombstones. That is where all of the Caseys are buried.

The first St. Patrick's Church was on German St. just north of East 4th Street on the east side of the street. There is a parking lot there now. When they built the second St. Patrick's Church in 1849, they moved the rectory so that the church could be built on this site. That original rectory had been the Casey family home and it was given to the parish. When they built the second St. Patrick's Church, the entire house was put on rollers of some type and moved to East Third St. directly behind the new church. After the present St. Patrick's Church was dedicated in 1906, the second church remained until about 1912 when it was demolished to make way for the building of the present St. Patrick's Rectory in 1915.

The four Cauley brothers who were here from 1892 until 1954 built the present rectory and paid for it themselves. There are 34 rooms, 10 bathrooms and 12 working fireplaces. And they spared no expense in building it. The dining room has absolutely beautiful built-in cabinets to store the china, etc. The chandeliers are all Waterford crystal. If you ever want to see the building, stop and we'll be glad to show it to you.

## 299 DAYS TO THE 2022 ERIE IRISH FESTIVAL THE LITTLE KNOWN CONQUEST OF IRELAND BY AMERICANS IN THE 16<sup>TH</sup> CENTURY.



Everyone knows the story of the Spanish conquistadors who ravaged the Americas looking for the lost city of gold, and the story of the French and the English who conquered North America with a mixture of force and bribery. Well, mostly milk. The Irish loved their cows too much to eat them—so not much beef. Prior to the introduction of the potato, the Irish had a predominantly milk based diet—cultured, curdled, aged, churned, soured, and even buried in bogs for a while, and often mixed with another Irish favorite, oats. That temperate climate so good for the potato is also what makes the Emerald Isle emerald—and that emerald color? It comes from the rich grasses that cows love to munch and turn into milk. And their love of milk continues.

To this day, in fact, Ireland is one of the largest per-capita consumers of butter. And it's a sure bet that any country that loves butter that much has virtually perfected it. And that's why, when you come to the Irish Festival, we serve only 100% pure Irish made butter with our freshly baked Irish soda bread. And potatoes? Fresh chips with your fish, mashed on your shepherd's pie, fried and smothered with Guinness Beer Cheese Sauce and corned beef, or stewed in your Irish stew? You decide.

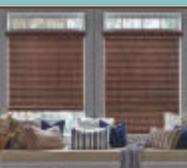
