



Jesus spoke to the crowds about the kingdom of God, and he healed those who needed to be cured. As the day was drawing to a close, the Twelve approached him and said, "Dismiss the crowd so that they can go to the surrounding villages and farms and find lodging and provisions; for we are in a deserted place here." He said to them, "Give them some food yourselves." They replied, "Five loaves and two fish are all we have, unless we ourselves go and buy food for all these people." Now the men there numbered about five thousand. Then he said to his disciples, "Have them sit down in groups of about fifty." They did so and made them all sit down. Then taking the five loaves and the two fish, and looking up to heaven, he said the blessing over them, broke them, and gave them to the disciples to set before the crowd. A great devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary was very much in evidence among the people during the first year of the parish. They now had a temporary church building: they were now a resulveformed congregation. . . but without a name.

At the end of the year 1941, Father Herbert asked for suggestions to name the new parish. The results were: Blessed Virgin — 40; St. Theress — 6; St. Christopher — 4; St. Ann — 3; St. Herbert — 3; St. Patrick — 3.

On Wednesday, February 4, 1942, His Excellency, Bishop Boyle gave the parish the beautiful title "The Church of Our Lady of Peace". The following Sunday, Father Herbert told his people: "Yours still be the first parish in the diocese to receive the name. It is your place to build a beautiful church in honor of the Queen of Peace".



A MESSAGE FROM THE BISBO

Intertwined with so much of the history that includes Old Economy and antesiating many of its neighbors, the early story of the parish of maint jobs the Baptist in Baden gives the historian an interesting picture of the "missionary" efforts of early Pittsburgh Catholicism. Few parishes of our diocese can match it in this respect.

The first growth of Smint John parish was nurtured by two sources - pioneer priests for whom sacrifice was not a word but a way of life, and Sisters for whom the Providence of God who a clear and as compelling as highway direction signs.

In the subsequent hundred years Saint John parish has seen the Beaver Valley open its arms to people from the old world seeking a new life, willing to work hard for it and devoutly grateful for opportunities.

In the beginning, an Econopy home was the scene for the first Mass offered for the parish; a bandful of God's people gathered to give Him worship. Since then two church buildings have served for that same worship. Today, more than three thousand souls are care for in the third parish church. That care continues to be given by priests and disters with the same spirit and mest for God's service as marked their pioneering predecesors. They are sided by a laity no less dedicated to the work of the Kingdom of God than were less privileged forebears in the faith.

A century has been witness to how Saint John the Emptist parish follows the woestion of its patron in announcing God's Kingion; may and grant it grace to continue to do so for generations to com-

A MESSAGE FROM FATHER JAY

ELEBRATIC

ur dear families of Conway and Baden are asked for the greatest of sacrifices by our Church... the yielding of our church buildings from weekend to devotional use. As one parishioner said, "if these bricks could talk..." The memories made within the blue Marian church in Conway and the reddish wood church in Baden are grace-filled. Tears mixed with fears are appropriate because they reflect hearts full of love for our Catholic way, our connections in our Catholic family, and our Lord's loving actions in our Catholic sacramental life.

I wonder how can we cherish personally the goodness of God working in us as easily as we fondly remember all the "thin" moments when heaven touched earth in these churches. I was at a Capuchin retreat center and read about "thin places" from Celtic traditions in Ireland. In Irish Celtic lore, "thin places" are those locales where the veil between this world and the otherworld is porous. The space here on earth takes on the hue of the sacred among peoples whose connection to a place is heartfelt (kevinkochdriftlessland.net/the-thin-places---ireland--the-driftless.html). Traveling in the Holy Land, this is most apparent when you see all the sites of Jesus' life as the ultimate thin places, because right here is where Jesus was conceived; or right here Jesus was born; or right here Jesus was crucified; or right here Jesus rose from the tomb!

This is not the same as going to the site of Three Rivers Stadium, where the feet of the Steelers' Franco Harris touched the turf as he caught the Immaculate Reception—but there is a connection. Places hold meaning: cheering on great moments or crying through losses. But when Jesus is the reason—the "why" for our emotions—then they get connected from this earthly space to an eternal place. So, let us enter these "thin" churches for our final parish celebrations, confident that Jesus, who made these moments grace-filled through His eternal love, continues to connect us to His place in heaven. Heaven is where Jesus is preparing a "mansion" with hues of joy and sounds of friendships, with the memories, people, and love that we have felt from 1866 for Saint John the Baptist parish, and from 1941 for Our Lady of Peace parish.

Saint John the Baptist, Pray for us! Our Lady of Peace, Pray for us! Saint Luke the Evangelist, Pray for us!

TRUE PRESENCE

oday is Corpus Christi, the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ (otherwise known as the Eucharist), and for this special day the Church offers us a second reading that is so familiar that most of us can recite most of it from memory (who says Catholics cannot cite Scripture?). The familiarity brings a great challenge: how can we hear this reading with open hearts and minds when we already "know" it so well?

St. Paul wrote this very familiar passage in the mid-50's A.D. as part of his broader response to questions from the Church in Corinth, Greece, a large metropolitan center of economy and pagan culture. It is very likely the earliest written record of Jesus' words during the Last Supper when he instituted the Eucharist. It is interesting that Paul points out that he got these words not from the Apostles but directly from the Lord himself. Jesus saw his own instructions on consecrating the Eucharist as so important that he gave them to the Apostles at the Last Supper and then again, in nearly identical fashion, to Saul of Tarsus, soon to be St. Paul, a few years later.

Another interesting feature of these very familiar words is the repetition of the command, "Do this in remembrance of me." Why does Jesus say this twice? He certainly is emphasizing the importance of what he is telling them to do, but there is more going on. Jesus said these words in the context of a Passover meal, a liturgical remembrance for the Jewish people. In their minds, they were not just looking back fondly on events of the past, our common understanding or remembrance. Jewish liturgical rites were a way of making a past event mystically present now.

During the Passover liturgy, a child would ask, "Why is this night different from all other nights?" The leader of the liturgy responded, "Because of what the Lord did for me when I was a slave in Egypt." Not because of what the Lord did for our ancestors, but because of what he did for me, more than a thousand years before I was even born. By performing the liturgical rites, they made the past event present now. They participated in it. When Jesus commanded the Apostles, the leaders of the liturgical rites of the New Covenant, to perform a certain rite "in remembrance" of him, and then he said it again, the message was clear: "Do this to make me present." In this context, of course they would have taken his words as literally true when he said, "This is my body...This is my blood."

And so even today when the successors of the Apostles (the bishops) and the ordained men who share in their ministry (the priests) perform the liturgical rites explained by Jesus at the Last Supper, something mystical happens. We do this to make him present. And what exactly is made present? Not merely a lively memory of the one who died for us, but, according to his own words, his body and blood, indeed his soul and divinity. These very familiar words still have much to tell us.

I DON'T KNOW HIM!

In the musical, Jesus Christ Superstar, these are the words that Peter screamed in the scene of his denial of Christ in the courtyard of the high priest.

"At that he began to curse and to swear, 'I do not know the man'" (Matthew 26:74).

This is a feeling that most if not all Catholics have had at some point in their spiritual journey. Not the feeling of denial or even ignorance but more a feeling of wonder, a feeling of missing something, a sense that something is not complete.

We know all about Jesus, where he was born, the flight into Egypt, His getting "lost" as a kid when he was actually in the Temple sort of teaching the Pharisees. We know of his miracles of healing, casting out demons, and raising from the dead. We know of his passion, death and resurrection ...

We do know all ABOUT Jesus, but:

Do we truly know the Man-God Jesus Christ?

Does He have a living relationship with us?

Does He want to?

The first three questions are individually subjective and purely personal. They are all "Do we?" ...or even more specific, "Do I?" questions. The last two are split.

Does He want to? He is dying to... and he has made himself present for us to spend time with Him, personally and physically. He is here for you in Eucharistic Adoration. Here to listen, speak, laugh and weep.

We have a duty to God, our families, and society not only to take care of our health but to take precautions that will maximize the chances of a successful outcome if we become seriously ill. I can tell you from professional and personal experience how valuable accurate medical condition, medication, and allergy information is to emergency medical personnel, as well as the doctors and nurses who would take care of you in the hospital.

And think of the comfort it would give your loved ones if they didn't have to be rummaging through your cabinets and paperwork to figure out your medical conditions and medications when minutes count. The Vial of Life simplifies this process and makes it more reliable.

Please consider participating in this worthy program. Think of it as a gift to your family and yourself.

PURPOSE: The *Vial of Life* makes it easier for people to have medical information available in one place so family and rescue workers can locate it in an emergency.

WHAT IS THE VIAL OF LIFE?: It is an empty prescription bottle containing the following:

- 1. A form to list your prescription and over the counter medications as well as vitamins, minerals, supplements, herbal remedies, etc. Topical medication should also be listed.
- 2. A form to provide important medical information such as health conditions, allergies, surgeries, health insurance, doctors, emergency contact information, etc. Please update as necessary.
- 3. A Vial of Life participant sticker

WHO IT IS FOR?: It is useful for seniors, those with chronic health conditions, those with special needs, or anyone who feels they can benefit by it.

WHY?: Being a participant allows Emergency Medical Service (EMS) personnel who are familiar with the program and family quick and easy access to important health information in an emergency situation when time is of the essence. Having this information in one place prevents scrambling to gather it under stressful circumstances which can lead to a delay in obtaining necessary medical attention. The information will alert rescue workers of any allergies, chronic health ailments, or health conditions they need to know about to treat you effectively.

WHERE THE VIAL SHOULD BE STORED: The vial should be stored on the top shelf of the refrigerator and be visible at all times. It also can be placed in a glove compartment of your car.

WHERE THE STICKER SHOULD BE PLACED: The sticker should be placed either on your front door, if the vial is placed in your refrigerator, or on your car windshield if the vial is placed in your glove compartment indicating to EMS that you are a participant in the program. They will know the Vial of Life is in the refrigerator or glove compartment upon seeing the sticker.

HOW TO OBTAIN A VIAL OF LIFE: Vials are available in the narthex at Saints John & Paul.

SIX STEPS TO SANITY ...in memory of Seppe

ne of the happiest days of my life was when I gave birth to our precious son Seppe; the worst and saddest day of my life was the day we laid him to rest two years ago. It was on July 4, 2020 we received that dreadful call informing us that he had died of a heroin overdose. He died of a disease we call addiction.

Oftentimes, as families who have a loved one who is dealing with substance abuse, we are overwhelmed, lost, broken and ashamed of our loved one's addiction. We are angry and as families we feel like failures because we can't fix them or make them better, and more importantly we worry about what everyone is saying about our child or about us as the loved ones of an addict.

That is what we call stigma. It can be paralyzing and it will only stop you and keep you from doing what needs to be done; it's toxic and it's meaningless.

We learned within two years of our son's addiction that it was a force much bigger than us. That no matter how much we wanted him to stop, he was really the only one who had the ability to stop and change his own behavior. We knew very little about the disease but realized very quickly that we needed to do several things: First and foremost we needed God in our lives more than ever. Of course he had always been part of our life, but not when it came to our son's disease; we thought we had the answers, but we quickly realized we needed education on the disease we knew so little about; we then realized we needed support, to be with people who had gone or were going through the same ordeal we were going through. As a result we found a ministry called Six Steps to SANITY that provided us as a family the tools needed to learn and deal with a loved one's addiction.

We learned that what we thought was loving and caring for our addict (or prodigal, as I prefer to call them because we always have hope they will come back, like in the Biblical story), we were in fact keeping his addiction alive.

How? By enabling him; by not allowing him to face and deal with consequences of his actions; by being in denial; by not having boundaries or by being lax in our expectations of his negative behavior. By always living with the elephant in the room and afraid to say anything about it.

When we finally surrendered him to God we told him that we just couldn't be a part of his addiction anymore. We explained that we would always be there for him as long as he wanted recovery and that no matter what we would always love him. It was through that surrender that he found recovery on his own. He changed his life around and for four years worked at a rehab paying it forward, helping others. He opened up three sober homes, had a beautiful partner, Allie. They had two children—Harley and baby Joel (born 5 months after our son died).

Unfortunately, a variety of factors contributed to our son's death. During the COVID pandemic, he lost his job due to closing of rehabs, no purpose, no meetings... an operation that reintroduced him to pain pills and a host of other factors. He dropped his cross and was too ashamed to ask for help.

We are very thankful to God that he allowed us to see our son the last four years of his life in recovery, and for that we were blessed. We aren't angry at God, or even our son, because we believe everyone has freewill. Unfortunately, he also had the demon of a powerful addiction!

Addiction is ugly. It's a monster but we have to stand up to it. How? As I said: **God**, **education** and **support**!

No more shame. For those of us who have lost a loved one, let's rejoice that we will one day see them again: if I didn't believe that, there is no way I could be in a state of such peace. Of course my heart will be broken and our lives are forever changed, and we definitely have our weak moments, but we cannot allow our son's death to kill our willingness to live on. We have so much to live for and to give back and to give to others through our pain and experiences; and for those of you whose loved ones are alive but still struggling, I ask you: What are you going to do about it? I beg you, don't just do nothing! Don't allow the stigma to paralyze you.

Stand up and educate yourself, show your family you will not cower to this monster of a disease; show your prodigal that you love them enough to fight back with knowledge and that you are no longer going to do **nothing**. Empower yourself with a strong support group. Throw shame out the window and do not allow this disease to define your loved one.

They are worthy; they are sick; **they do not want to be an addict**. As long as your loved one is alive there is HOPE. In our case, our loved one is gone so we have redirected our hope to help other families who struggle with a loved one's addiction. To help them and educate them through our own mistakes.

We do that by facilitating the same ministry that helped us, only we do it at our church—Saints John & Paul—and the ministry is called *Six Steps to SANITY*. The next session begins **Wednesday, June 22, 2022** from **7:00-8:30 PM in the Lower CDC (Room 8/9)**. This will be an expedited Summer session that will only meet for 9 weeks. The only expense is the purchase of a \$10 book which we use, called, *Setting Boundaries with Your Adult Children* by Allison Bottke. (It says "children," but can apply to any loved one.)

Our mission is to spread the ministry throughout and to whomever will listen so we can help others. Our son will live on... not through shame, through brokenness or through memories of sadness. But he will live on like many other young beautiful souls who succumbed to this disease. They will be remembered for the good, for their worth to society, to their families and for all they accomplished in life. We have very little time on this earth and no one ever promised us a life without pain and sorrow. But it's what we do with that pain and sorrow that will make a difference in our lives and in the lives of others.

I heard a quote recently from a young lady who is facing death at her doorstep due to cancer, and I felt it was worth sharing: "You can't wait until life isn't hard anymore before you decide to be happy." Thank you for your prayers, support and most of all for your never-ending love for our Seppe! We miss him immensely!

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
