LIVING THE GOSPEL THROUGH INSPIRATION

God calls us to bring His Word to all corners of the earth. What does that mean for you and me? We are just simple and humble folks trying to find our way through the Gospel and our world. After all, we are not professional preachers but gentle servants. Jesus summons us to take his message on the road and bring it from the pew to the pavement. We cannot keep the joy of the Gospel to ourselves but must bring it into every aspect of our lives: our families, our schools, our work, our corporations, our politics, our social circles, and our philosophies. We cannot just accept the wisdom of the world as true and conduct our lives as if the Good News is a separate matter. They are one. Jesus never asked his friends to go and construct homes and meet them one on one, face to face. When the rubber meets the road and the message is challenging, rejection is quite possible. That's the litmus test for whether we're really doing what we have been asked. ©LPi

Jesus sent out His apostles without a lot of "things" because THINGS distract. We collect, argue about and protect our "things." We even ignore each other because we have "things" to do. What "things" are separating you from your family?

Gospel Summary & Question of the Week
Read Sunday's Gospel, Mk 6:7-13

15th Sunday in Ordinary Time - Cycle B

Gospel Summary:

Maybe the work is best left to the professionals. That's how many people view the preaching of the Gospel. That's the stuff priests, religious, deacons, lay ministers, and other professional Church people do. It has little to do with me. Well, that's not really true. The fact of the matter is that preaching the Gospel has everything to do with you, with all of us who are baptized members of the Body of Christ. Nobody gets off the hook from that job. The question is, however, how do we do it? Well, there's a safe way, which many choose, to preach the Gospel — and the risky way. The safe way pretty much keeps the Gospel in church and around like-minded people. I say my prayers, go to Mass, contribute to the food pantry, tithe, and attend Bible Study. That pretty much covers the bases, right? Wrong.

The risky way is the more challenging way and for many, the "road less traveled." Imagine those first disciples going out and into people's homes. They must have had some amazing conversations with folks about God's kingdom, changing their hearts, forgiving sins, and looking at the world differently. They must have met people who were hurting, exiled from their communities, neglected, lost, or living self-insulated lives in a society that served the rich and neglected the poor. While there were many who welcomed what they had to say and the conversations they had, there were others who no doubt rejected them and literally tossed them out on their ears! The Gospel, while being a message of joy and hope, is not always received well by those who are very comfortable keeping things as they are.

The risky way involves example and conversation. We have to take the Gospel from church and carry it with us wherever we go. What kinds of conversations do we have with others? We interact with those closest to us, in our work, social circles, institutions, corporations, in politics, and beyond. Our conversations with others reveal a great deal about how we see things and what we consider important. If we are really interested in seeing God's vision for the world succeed, then we will talk about it. It will become a part of our everyday conversation and find its way into our interactions with others. How will we preserve the dignity of human life and encourage others to have a relationship with God? We must be the example, live value centered, virtuous lives, stand against injustice, combating racism, and learn ways to resolve conflicts without violence.

If we are going to succeed going forward, we have to find a way to bring our prayer centered lives into the marketplace. Our conversations have to change. Not everyone wants to hear what the Gospel has to say. That's a risk God asks us to take.

Child Protection and Creating Safe Environments - Know the Warning Signs of a Predator:

Those who abuse children look like everyone else. They don't look like scary people that we should know to avoid. Rather, most abusers are known to the child, such as the parent, sibling, parent's paramour, parent's spouse, other relative or babysitter. One of the most important ways to ensure the safety of children in our environments is to know the warning signs of adults who present a risk of harm to children. Among these signs are when the person (1) always wants to be alone with children in areas where no one can monitor the interactions, (2) allows children to do things their parents would not permit, (3) is always more excited to be with children than with adults, and (4) discourages others from participating in activities involving kids. Dear Parishioners,

If today were not Sunday, it would be the celebration of the Feast of St. Benedict. With our Benedictine roots and heritage, then, let us ask his intercession upon our parish and the other parishes in town, which remain under Benedictine care. Let us also pray for the Priests, Sisters, Brothers, and leadership of the Benedictine Order, especially those from Saint Marys, or have served at Queen or in town, and all those in Latrobe. Let us express prayerful gratitude to them all, living and deceased, for their care for God's flock. St. Benedict is called the "Father of Monasticism" as one of the early monks who established a gathering of followers to focus on certain aspects of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. His leadership gained him many enemies; his persistence gained him sainthood. May his firm resolve for prayer, work, and community continue to be strengths in our parish and in God's Church. Two things are odd to me. First, to be pastor of a formerly Benedictine parish means that I know very little about my predecessors or our history. In my former pastorates, I could pick up the phone and talk with some, many, or all who came before me to seek information and advice. Here, I see in our sacramental ledgers the names of many, many priests whom I do not and did not know. It's just different. Secondly, many people are still confused about the differences between Benedictine commitments and diocesan priesthood. Let me just assure you: I AM NOT A MONK! Our lives, though similar, are also very different. And Catholics should know and understand these basics that are part of our heritage. When I get questions such as, "Why don't you live in the Priory?" or, "Why do some of you wear those robes?" it makes me wonder, what have we missed in our faith education and formation? May the Feast of St. Benedict be a blessing to all of us, influenced by him in some fashion. And may it remind us that the only way to know some particulars of our faith and even our parish's tradition, is to want to learn about them.

MAKING FOR BETTER LITURGY

One of our goals as we return to more typical Mass is that "full participation" in the Mass that the documents of the Church ask of us. Please pray verbally as part of our community. Please join in the singing as best as you can, using the refrains and the words that you know. PLEASE STAY UNTIL MASS IS FINISHED. The need to leave early, before Mass is finished, should be a RARE need - there should not be sections of Church empty before the completion of Mass. This is a courtesy to the Lord Himself and our faith family. The emptying of the parking lot takes about four minutes after Mass. You could spend that time praying for those in the cars ahead of you and the cars behind you.

SUMMER TRAVELS

Many people are traveling and vacationing as we come out of this past year's troubles. Enjoy and be safe. Make Sunday Mass part of your family time even as you travel. Google the nearest Catholic Church and join them for Mass. At the very least, catch the livestream of our Sunday Mass at 10 am or following on FACEBOOK, or that of another parish. It is time to put the Lord and the Sunday Eucharist back into our lives in a regular way. Please do not let activities, including shopping and children's sports, become a higher priority than the Lord and the Eternal Life into which He invites us.

PROTOCOLS

Many pandemic restrictions have been lifted, thank God. We still use and advise some caution. In particular, we continue to distribute Holy Communion by coming to you, thus trying to keep some social distance. PLEASE RESPECT THE St. Jude section of Church (back left) where pews are marked for those who NEED social distance (*not vaccinated or immune-compromised in various ways*). We continue to sanitize after every church use, so please place your kneelers to the floor any time you have been to Mass.

ADORATION

We continue our parish prayer day with Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament of Thursdays from after the 7 am Mass until Evening Prayer and Benediction at 6:30 pm. Stop by Church for a visit. Join us for closing prayer.



THERE ARE STILL SOME TIMES that need coverage. In particular, early afternoon seems problematic. If you are able to pray for 1/2 hour or an hour, especially in the early afternoon, please make the commitment to help us cover the times. Call 814-834-4701. There needs to be at least TWO people present throughout the day. So far, we have been able to have 3-4 in most time slots, allowing for someone who forgets or who must miss. We ask participants to get their own sub, calling family or friend, or someone on the sub list.

SPECIAL COLLECTION NEXT WEEKEND

Next weekend we take up the special collection for "National Needs." Our gift aids the Catholic Home Missions Appeal and the Black and Indian Missions. We take up Pope Francis on the invitation to show our solidarity with the poor of our own nation.
