WHAT IS THE SYNOD ON SYNODALITY?

Pope Francis has asked the entire world to participate in a synod on the topic "For a Synodal Church: Communion, Participation, Mission." A synodal Church, in announcing the Gospel, "journeys together." How is this "journeying together" happening today in our diocese? What steps does the Spirit invite us to take in order to grow in our "journeying together"? You may be invited to participate in listening sessions at your local parish, or you may wish to give your input online. Participation in a synod should always involve prayer, listening, discussion, and above all, discerning the way that the Holy Spirit is guiding us. Hopefully these questions and answers can help you as you prepare your input. Informational articles can be found in Church on the Synod.

Gospel Summary & Question of the Week Read Sunday's Gospel, Lk 1:1-4, 4:14-21

3rd Sunday in Ordinary Time - Cycle C

Gospel Summary:

Human history reveals many periods where people lost a sense of God's transcendence. It may even be argued that human beings have been wandering and lost more than they have been at home and focused. Human nature being what it is, we struggle with who God really is — the God of our salvation history or the "gods" of human constructs. Relying on our own designs and pursuits, we forget that we really are meant to listen to One upon whom the Spirit of the Lord rests, Jesus Christ, and not to ourselves. That same history that reveals our fickleness and infidelity also reveals God's constancy and faithfulness. God always finds us.

As people wander and fumble to find their way, God is there bringing them back to holiness and giving them the assurance of His presence. We have to allow God's Word, God's life, to touch us and change us. It can make us more flexible and attentive to the sacred in all facets of life so that every day is one that is holy. Every day is a time when fulfillment is possible for one's soul. Jesus stood before those gathered in the synagogue as the fulfillment of words of promise that were echoed long ago. God doesn't forget. He always comes for us.

Now it is time to remember to go to God. Sometimes our lives are so confused and tangled that it is difficult to see the Word and hand of God. But when we realize, deep within, the depth of friendship God offers to us it really has the power to turn sadness to joy. The promise is fulfilled. Going frequently to God's Word, allowing ourselves to be enriched and rejuvenated, and pondering the certainly of God's fidelity and promise permanently transforms us. We will be more aware of the sacred and the holy and less invested in things that pull us away.

Dear Parishioners,

This week I will mark the 35th annimillion versary of a very scary day. I was on Partier one of our rural roads in Crawford County, cresting a hill. It was a typical

winter day - snow was flying, a dusting on the ground, roads not good but not too bad. Believe it or not, I was going under the speed limit. As I got to the top of the hill, a tractor-trailer was sitting at the hill's bottom, across the highway, sideways. I knew instantly I was in trouble. I started to pump the brakes. On the third pump, I pressed as hard as I could and held. I aimed for the front tire of the truck, hoping to ease the impact. The thud was deafening. The front of the car was smashed like an accordion. From what I recall, I believe I passed out. But only momentarily. I opened my eves in disbelief that I was alive! I started to feel my body to see if anything was broken, which it was not. Slowly, a trickle of blood fell down my face - it turned out to be a bloody nose that didn't last long. My knees and legs were pretty sore, so it was a little difficult to get out of the car, but I managed to do so fairly quickly. As I did, the combination of the cold weather, the shock, and the scare made me tremble. But I knew, thank God, that other than having a mess on my hands, I was fortunate - blessed. I discovered that this poor truck driver made this maneuver every day, pulling out of his driveway as best as he could on this narrow road, having nearly to jackknife to get his day on the road started. His wife stood out there, trying to direct traffic to keep everyone safe. On this day, that thoughtful gesture was no help! There were a few lasting impacts. First, the car was totaled, and sat in a junk yard for a long time. Every time I passed by it, I was reminded of that terribly scary yet blessed moment. Second, I was black and blue in the face, with puffy eyes, for more than a week - the school children loved that look! Third, I drove with much more caution for a long time. And fourth, I realized at a fairly young age, how fragile life was, and Who is in charge, and I uttered thankful praise as often as I reflected on that January day. It's interesting, though, isn't it, how time warps those "big moments" in life. They fade, and so do their effects. I have still chosen to drive carelessly from time to time. And, I have forgotten, at times, how blessed I am just to be alive. So it's good to mark the anniversary and share it with you, because it is re-awakening its effects in me. You've probably had similar experiences - acci-dents, health issues, bounce-back moments, from which you learned life lessons and spiritual lessons. In these winter days, reflect on them. Re-learn their value. Let their effects come back to you. Give thanks and praise to God of Life and redemption. His purpose for you is still unfolding. So, please, be careful.

A WEEK OF FEASTING

There are a number of feasts on the daily calendar this week. Monday we honor "the other" St. Francis, the Frenchman, Francis de Sales. Unlike many church people of his time, he focused on the gentle nature of the love of God in Christ. He was renowned for his compassion. He started a religious order, the Salesians, particularly hoping to influence children and young people through faith-based education. On Tuesday, we mark the conversion of St. Paul. This is truly a moment that turned the world around. For, without Paul's vision of and response to the Living Lord, Christianity would not have blossomed and taken hold in the larger world as it did. There are three accounts of this moment in the New Testament, reminding us of the Lord's call not only to Paul but to each of us. The next day, Wednesday, we celebrate two of the "disciples of Paul," Timothy and Titus. He brought them to faith and then entrusted servant-leadership to them. He also wrote to them encouraging and challenging words in letters that are also in the New Testament. On Friday, the most wellknown scholar of our tradition, Thomas Aquinas, is our saint for the day. A priest of the Dominican order, this brilliant man described much of our faith using Aristotelian discourse and logic. This helped make sense of many of the mysteries of our faith. But he was also quite a poet. Today, we still sing many of the lyrics that he put together in hymns at Church. As each day approaches, perhaps you can look up a bit more about these holy people. They still teach us. They still inspire us. They still pray for us and with us. Perhaps your own spiritual life can be enhanced by learning something about these and other saints, gifts from God for all of us.

MASS REMINDERS

Please extend these basic courtesies while with us for Mass -

We ask you to stay until Mass is complete. Even though the Presider sends us forth sometimes with the words, "The Mass is ended..." it is not ended until both the ministers have completed their recession from the Sanctuary and the closing hymn is finished.

Also, please reserve the back left section of the Church, near the St. Jude statue, for those who need to keep social distance. Even if Church happens to look crowded, please find other seating (there's room for 800). We need to respect and accommodate those who have specific personal and health needs.
