

## Our "Quiet Room"

There is a new room in our church – the Quiet Room! It is the same room as used for the Sacrament of Confession, where a large pane of tinted glass has been installed in one of the doors.

The Quiet Room provides a place for people to go when a few minutes of quiet time are needed during Mass. The Quiet Room is not meant to be a place to go to attend the whole Mass, but rather a place to use for a short period of time during Mass.

It may be used by an adult or by a child accompanied by an adult. For example, a parent may find it useful to take their child there for a short time to attend to a particular need, or an adult who is experiencing strong emotions may want to use the room for a few minutes to recompose themselves.

So, please make use of our new Quiet Room during Mass whenever you believe a few minutes there will help you!

## THE FEAST OF THE EPIPHANY

The feast of the Epiphany, which was kept in the East and in certain Western Churches before being observed in Rome, seems to have been originally a feast of the nativity; January 6, for those churches where it was kept, was the equivalent of Christmas (December 25) in the Roman Church. The feast was introduced at Rome in the second half of the sixth century and became the complement and, so to say, the crown of the Christmas festival.

Epiphany means manifestation. What the Church celebrates today is the manifestation of our Lord to the whole world; after being made known to the shepherds of Bethlehem He is revealed to the Magi who have come from the East to adore Him. Christian tradition has ever seen in the Magi the first fruits of the Gentiles; they lead in their wake all the peoples of the earth, and thus the Epiphany is an affirmation of universal salvation. St. Leo brings out this point admirably in a sermon, read at Matins, in which he shows in the adoration of the Magi the beginnings of Christian faith, the time when the great mass of the heathen sets off to follow the star which summons it to seek its Saviour.

That is the meaning, too, of the wonderful prophecy from Isaias which the liturgy appoints to be read in the first nocturn at Matins and at the Epistle of the Mass. This same thought of universal redemption the Church returns to as she sings, in the antiphon to the Magnificat at 2nd Vespers, applying the words to herself, of the union with Christ typified by the wedding feast at Cana, by the baptism of her children foreshadowed by that of Christ in the waters of the Jordan. Formerly the Epiphany was an additional day for solemn baptisms.

## New Year's Blessing Of Time

Lord, You who live outside of time, and reside in the imperishable moment, we ask Your blessing this New Year's Day upon Your gift to us of time.

Bless our clocks and time-measuring devices. You who kindly direct us to observe the passing of minutes and hours. May they make us aware of the miracle of each second of life we experience. May these our ticking servants help us not to miss that which is important, while You keep us from machine-like routine. May we ever be free from being clock watchers and instead become time-lovers.

Bless our calendars, these ordered lists of days, weeks, and months, of holidays, holy days, fasts and feasts -- all our special days of remembering. May these servants, our calendars, once reserved for the royal few, for magi and pyramid priests, now grace our homes and our lives. May they remind us of birthdays and other gift-days, as they teach us the secret that all life is meant for celebration and contemplation. Bless, Lord, this New Year, each of its 365 days and nights.

Bless us with new moons and full moons. Bless us with happy seasons and a long life. Grant to us, Lord, the New Year's gift of a year of love. Amen
