Dear Parishioners and Friends of the Cathedral,

Heresy is one of those Catholic words that is not too often used in our everyday vocabulary. And while it may sound like a ‘scary’ word, its purpose is to help clearly articulate what is in keeping with what God has revealed to us, and what is not. It is essentially a false belief or teaching, which the Church has declared to be contrary to authentic divine revelation. Throughout the Church’s history there have been many heresies which have been given names (usually named for their progenitor), for example, ‘nestorianism’, which claims that Jesus is two persons, or ‘monothelism’, which claims that Jesus only has one will instead of two, or ‘gnosticism’, which posits that all matter is bad and that God really didn’t become a human being in Jesus Christ. What makes heresies so pernicious is that a misunderstanding about God leads to disordered living and a malformed relationship with Him. One of the most destructive heresies from the Church’s past was Arianism (named after its progenitor, Arius). In trying to grapple with the question of Jesus’ relationship to the Father, he concluded that Jesus was the most perfect creature that the Father ever created, but a creature none-the-less (i.e. Jesus is not God). Making his case from a misreading of the scriptures and his own philosophical thought, Arius’ teaching spread like wildfire across the Roman Empire in the Fourth Century, to the point that Saint Jerome remarked: “The world groaned and marveled to find that it was Arian.”

Against this heresy would arise many champions, including the Saint we celebrate this Wednesday - Saint Hilary. There is not a great deal known about his life prior to becoming the Bishop of Poitiers, but he was likely born around the year 310. He was raised as a pagan and received an extensive education in the classics of Latin and Greek literature, as well as Greek philosophy. As he grew to adulthood, Hilary quickly discarded the approach to life that many of his contemporaries had, namely, that the purpose of life was to satisfy desires. Saint Hilary felt incredible wonder at the gift of life, and was filled with a deep desire to discover the meaning of that gift. He knew that there was something different about human life, even from that of the animals, and this led him to go looking for the giver of that gift. In his search, he encountered many of the arguments that are still prevalent today: there is no God, there are many gods, creation is the result of random happenstance, etc. But Saint Hilary knew that none of these positions were correct. In his writings, he tells us that one day he chanced upon the Sacred Scriptures and his heart became captivated by such a clear understanding of God. Having discovered the truth of God’s existence and His authorship of creation, he now sought to understand why God would give him the gift of life - was it just to live and then disappear in death? But it was in the Scriptures that he also discovered that God had sent His Son (who was coeternal and consubstantial) into the world to bring eternal life to those who believed - the reason for the gift of life. Saint Hilary then converted to Christianity around the year 345. As a gentle and courteous man of great learning, he lived his newfound faith with great passion and fervor, which culminated in him being made the Bishop of Poitiers, France in 353. His election as Bishop coincided with a resurgence of the Arian heresy, which although officially condemned at the Council of Nicea in 325, none-the-less was still believed by many across the empire. As a staunch defender of the truth of Christ’s divinity, Hilary found that he stood alone against numerous bishops in southern France who held to the Arian heresy. These same bishops appealed to the Emperor, who was himself Arian, and Hilary was exiled. It was in exile that he redoubled his efforts to defend the truth of the Catholic faith and also penned his most important work: “On the Trinity.” Interestingly, Saint Hilary treated many of the heretics with great charity, believing them to be honestly mistaken about the truth. He worked closely with clergy and laity to uphold what was true in their understanding about Jesus and correct what was errant, in order to lead them to the fullness of truth. After the death of Emperor Constantius II, Hilary was able to return to his diocese, and lived to see the reaffirmation of the condemnation of Arianism in that region. He died in 367, after having heroically defended Christ and leaving behind numerous writings explaining the truth of the Catholic faith.

Today We Celebrate the Baptism of the Lord

Background: [Mark's] original audience was composed of Christians who were adult "converts," adults who had experienced repentance and the call to faith and baptism... For them it was a momentous event, not performed with a trickle of water over a forehead but with a full plunge, an event which altered their relationship with God, each other, and the world. Their sins were forgiven; they had died and risen and been reborn in the Spirit as God's sons and daughters. They would have immediately understood Mark's simple description of Jesus' own baptism. For him as well, it was a transformative moment of experiencing God's love and favor, a moment as well that called him to his mission in life.

Discussion Questions

1. When have you experienced that you too are God's beloved, the daughter or son of his favor?
2. What gets in the way of your living in the freedom of God's love?
3. Is it a message from society that gets in the way? Or from the church? Or have they helped you grow in living God's love?
4. Our faith in Jesus can bring us victory over our sinful selves. What brokenness or compulsion within you is the love of Jesus already healing?

Practice: We take for granted not only those who serve us, but even those who are close to us. Although love is shown more in deeds than in words, Jesus' life changed when the Father told him that he was beloved. For which person this week should you speak words that confirm how you love and care for them? Who needs to hear those words? ~ Excerpt from TeamRCIA



Bishops' Statement on Vaccines - As the first doses of the much-anticipated COVID-19 vaccines make their way across the country and to the first round of recipients, the chairmen of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops' Committee on Doctrine - Bishop Kevin Rhoades, and Committee on Pro-Life Activities - Archbishop Joseph Naumann issued a statement on the new vaccines.

"Receiving one of the COVID-19 vaccines ought to be understood as an act of charity toward the other members of our community. In this way, being vaccinated safely against COVID-19 should be considered an act of love of our neighbor and part of our moral responsibility for the common good," they wrote

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
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
