Dear Parishioners and Friends of the Cathedral,

Born in Poland in 1894, this Saturday’s Saint, Maximillian Kolbe, took seriously the words of our Lord who said: “No one has greater love than this, than to lay down one’s life for one’s friends” (John 15:13), and became a martyr of charity. His parents were fervent Catholics, with a deep devotion to the Blessed Mother, something he would come to adopt in his own life. As a young child, he got into the usual mischief that boys do, but after one particularly stern scolding from his mother, he went to pray and asked Mary what sort of man he would be. She appeared to him and offered him a white crown and a red crown, asking if he would be willing to accept either of them – the white meaning he would persevere in purity, and the red meaning he would become a martyr. Maximillian accepted both.

This mystical experience had a profound effect upon him, and at the age of 13 he entered the minor seminary of the Franciscans. He excelled at this studies, in particular math and physics, but rather than pursue a career in the sciences, he became a Franciscan novice in 1910. Shortly before his ordination to the priesthood in 1918, Maximillian formed the *Crusade of Mary Immaculate*. Its aim was to convert sinners, heretics, schismatics, and freemasons in particular, back to the Catholic faith, as well as spread devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary.

He developed tuberculosis, which would eventually destroy one of his lungs and weaken the other, and while he did recover from it, he was left with frail health for the rest of his life. Throughout the 1920s he worked to spread the Catholic faith throughout Poland by means of a Catholic magazine he founded called ‘*Knight of the Immaculate*’. In 1930, he moved to Japan, and in order to continue his work of spreading the Gospel and devotion to the Immaculate Mother, he founded a Japanese Catholic Press, along with a radio station. Maximillian would make several other journeys to India, Moscow, and Siberia, to further his evangelizing work before returning to Poland in 1936.

In 1939, the Nazis invaded Poland and Father Kolbe was arrested, and then released a short time later. During the period that he was not incarcerated, he organized shelters for thousands of Polish refugees, including Jews, and raised his voice in defense of the truth though the ‘*Knight of the Immaculate*’. In 1941, he was arrested again and sent to the concentration camp at Auschwitz.

While a prisoner at Auschwitz, a fellow captive in his cell block escaped one evening, and as a reprisal, ten random prisoners were chosen to die to deter future escape attempts. Among them was a polish army sergeant, who upon being chosen, begged for his life. At this Maximillian Kolbe dared to step out of line and said: “I would like to take his place, he has a wife and children.” The guard asked him sneeringly, “who are you”, to which Maximillian replied, “I am a priest.” Somewhat dumbfounded, the guard kicked the polish sergeant out of line and put Kolbe in his place. The ten condemned men were marched off to an empty cell block, and locked in the dark to starve to death.

Over the next two weeks, as the men suffered from starvation and neglect, St. Maximillian encouraged them, prayed with them, and spoke to them of the love and goodness of God, and his own devotion to Mary. Finally, the cell block was needed for new prisoners, so the Nazis injected the remaining prisoners with carbolic acid to end their lives. Kolbe was the last to die, sitting in the corner in prayer. As they approached him with the needle, he lifted his fleshless arm to accept his fate. Saint Maximillian Kolbe died on the eve of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary in 1941. He was canonized in 1982, and present at his canonization was the polish army sergeant for whom he had laid down his life.

## Faith Enrichment Opportunities

### Nineteenth Sunday of Ordinary Time

**Background:** Once again the crowd is recalcitrant, questioning how Jesus could have come “from heaven.” As the very enfleshment of the Word of God, as the person who always speaks the message of the One who sent him, he clearly does come from heaven—as does any believer who lives and speaks the Word in obedience to God’s call.

Another Exodus reference: the passage about giving his flesh for the life of the world interprets the Eucharistic Meal in light of John’s portrayal of the crucifixion as the sacrifice of the Lamb needed for the Passover meal. We are called to surrender ourselves to a love and trust that deep.

#### Discussion Questions

1. How has God drawn you to Jesus? Was it easy or hard to answer that call?
2. What nourishes you so far on your journey through life back to God?
3. How has Jesus’ promise of eternal life already affected your outlook on your life and your values?
4. Ephesians says that all who have been sealed in the Spirit are to be kind, compassionate, and forgiving. Which of these do you do best? Which do you need to work on?

**Practice:** To whom do you need to apologize? Ponder that question this week, and then ask Jesus to help you find life by doing so. ~ Adapted from TeamRCIA

**Stewardship of the Earth**



As Christians, we believe that the earth is entrusted to our faithful stewardship. We are not its owners, but its caretakers on behalf of God. How can I be a good steward? Some Recycling Facts to consider:

- The average American uses 650 pounds of paper each year – 100 million tons of wood could be saved each year if all that paper was recycled.
- Americans use 2.5 million plastic bottles every hour.
- A typical family consumes 182 gallons of soda, 29 gallons of juice, 104 gallons of milk, and 26 gallons of bottled water a year. That’s a lot of containers that can all be recycled!
- About 80% of what Americans throw away is recyclable, yet our recycling rate is only 28%.
- Every month Americans throw out enough glass bottles and jars to fill up a giant skyscraper (think: Empire State Building), but all of these jars are recyclable!
- Plastic bags and other plastic garbage thrown into the ocean kill as many as 1,000,000 sea creatures a year! Ever heard of the Great Pacific Garbage Patch? It’s twice the size of Texas and is floating somewhere between San Francisco and Hawaii. It’s also 80 percent plastic, and weighs in at 3.5 million tons.



**The Year of St. Joseph** continues through December. Sacred Scripture describes St. Joseph as "a just man" (Matthew 1:19) which can also be translated as "righteous," "upright," or, "he who is virtuous in all things." If we want to learn from St. Joseph, we must begin by imitating the virtues he practiced daily in his quiet, hidden life. One of the prescribed works, to gain the indulgence for one's self or someone in purgatory, is to "recite the Litany of St. Joseph for Christians who suffer all forms of persecution." Monthly themes are taken from St. Joseph's virtues and titles as prayed in this Litany.



**For August, the theme is: Mirror of Patience** – Patience is willingness to suffer. A patient is one who suffers a malady not by choice whereas a patient man is one who suffers volitionally rather than relinquish the vocation given him. Joseph was patient because of his love.
