

Dear Parishioners and Friends of the Cathedral,

On October 14th, we take a look at a rather interesting man by the name of Callistus, who lived from the second to the third century AD. One of the curious things about him is that much of the information that we have concerning his life, comes from a biography written by his enemy. He began life as a slave in an imperial Roman household, and his master appointed him as the manager of his banking business. The bank, however, failed and Callistus fled the city by ship in order to escape punishment. His master caught up with him and brought him back to Rome. He was then put on trial and sentenced to forced labor. Callistus, however, managed to convince his master to release him so that he could recover the money he had unwisely lent and invested. But shortly after being released, he was arrested for starting a brawl in a Jewish synagogue, where he went to demand back the money that he had lent. Callistus was then sent to labor in the mines of Sardinia (possibly also due to being a Christian during an era of persecution).

After laboring for some time, he was released with other Christians who were freed thanks to the negotiations between of Pope St. Victor I and the Emperor (who was largely influenced by his Christian friendly mistress). After being freed, Callistus was appointed by the Pope as the caretaker of a Christian cemetery outside the city of Rome. About nine years later, he was called back to Rome by Pope Zephyrinus and served as a trusted advisor and friend, eventually being ordained a deacon. When Zephyrinus died around AD 219, Callistus was elected Pope during a very tumultuous time – not only was it during the era of persecution, where one could be put to death just for being a Christian, but there were all manner of heresies (false beliefs concerning the faith) creeping up around the empire. But perhaps the biggest issue that raised the ire of his opponents, was how he chose to deal with those who had committed serious sins.

Among his principal adversaries was St. Hippolytus (who was a rival candidate for the papacy, and went into schism, becoming the first anti-pope in the Church's history) who thought that Callistus was far too lenient to sinners. According to Hippolytus, Pope Callistus would reconcile murderers, adulterers, those practicing contraception, and even idolaters after making a sincere confession. For people like Hippolytus, the Church was seen as a collection of already saintly people, whereas Callistus saw the Church more in terms of how Pope Francis has described it – as a 'field hospital for sinners.' Pope Callistus chose to emphasize the mercy of God, and that, if we are willing to acknowledge the grave offense that we give to God through our sins and make a good confession, God will forgive us. Saint Callistus was martyred by an anti-Christian mob around AD 222 and is the first Pope after St. Peter to be honored as a martyr by the Church. His feast day is October 14th.

Saint Callistus reminds us that God's mercy is even greater than our sins (no matter what they are or how numerous they are). We can never wander so far from God that He cannot restore us to friendship with Himself; so long as we are willing to acknowledge, in sorrow, how gravely even our smallest sins offend His infinite goodness, and ask for His mercy in the Sacrament of Penance. When is the last time you made a good confession?

4. How would our Church or society change if we were eager like Jesus?

**Practice:** Pray St. Ignatius Loyola's Prayer for Generosity every day this week, each time thinking of some different part of your life.

### Scripture Reflections for Discussion

- **“Take care that you do not despise one of these little ones; for, I tell you, in heaven their angels continually see the face of my Father in heaven.”**

**Do you ever think about your guardian angel?** Each one of us has an angel guarding over us. These angels are close to God. They watch over you and pray for you. They protect you with the Father's help. This should give you some assurance that things will be okay. The Lord is with you and he has sent an angel to be with you at every moment of the day.

**Prayer:** Lord, thank you for sending me a guardian angel to help me grow closer to you.

**Do you ever ask the angels to pray for you?** God has many, many angels working for him including your guardian angel. At the end of the world, God will send out the angels to gather together those who love the Lord. Even today the angels watch over us and pray for us as they sing praises to God in heaven. This should bring some comfort. God gives us so much to help us get to heaven.

**Prayer:** Lord, thank you for the gift of your angels that watch over me and pray for me.

**Bishops’ Statement on Vaccines**

As COVID-19 vaccines are now available to recipients across the country, the chairmen of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops’ Committee on Doctrine - Bishop Kevin Rhoades, and Committee on Pro-Life Activities - Archbishop Joseph Naumann issued a statement on the new vaccines.

“Receiving one of the COVID-19 vaccines ought to be understood as an act of charity toward the other members of our community. In this way, being vaccinated safely against COVID-19 should be considered an act of love of our neighbor and part of our moral responsibility for the common good,” they wrote. This is a time that we can use to deepen our understanding of why, as Catholics, we “Respect Life” and what that looks like day-to-day. We are also in the midst of celebrating the Year of St. Joseph. So, this year, we are looking to the witness of St. Joseph as a defender of life. This week’s subject is *The Death Penalty*:

**How to Build a Culture of Life**

Watching the news and reading the headlines, we may feel helpless seeing the heartbreaking lack of respect for human life. How do we respond? Changing the culture is a process of conversion that begins in our own hearts. When we encounter Christ, experience His love, and deepen our relationship with Him, we become more aware of our own immeasurable worth and that of others. His unchanging love is the source of our God-given dignity, which, therefore, cannot be taken away. When someone is facing great trials, we need to walk with them on their journey, intercede for them, and be open to sharing Christ’s love however He directs. We simply need to follow where He leads.

### Creed

### Synod 2021-2023

“For a Synodal Church:

#### Communion, Participation, Mission”

Bishop Malesic will celebrate an Opening Liturgy for the Synod on **Sunday, October 17, at 10:30 am** at the Cathedral of St. John the Evangelist. This will kick off the diocesan phase of the three-year synodal journey of consultations and discernment, culminating with the Assembly of Bishops in October 2023 in Rome.

A leadership team has been formed to prepare for and implement the synodal process within the diocese. Through the end of the year, all baptized Catholics will be invited participate in this process of listening, dreaming, and discerning God’s call for the Church amid the present signs of the times. The diocesan discernment will culminate in a “Pre-Synodal Meeting” early next year. For more information go to:

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
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
