Dear Parishioners and Friends of the Cathedral,

This Thursday, the Church celebrates two men who have a distinction of having been called by Our Lord to be Apostles – Saints Simon and Jude. We will take a look at them together not only because they share a feast day, and are always listed next to each other in the lists of the 12 Apostles found in the Bible (cf. Matthew 10:3; Mark 3:18; Luke 6:15; Acts 1:13), but also because we don’t have a great deal of biographical information about them.

Simon has two nicknames ascribed to him in the scriptures – Matthew identifies him as a “Cananean” and Luke calls him a “zealot”. Both names hint at the same truth, that Simon was a man who was passionate about his identity as a member of God’s chosen people and devoted in his service of God, His people, and obedience to God’s commandments. Being a zealot would also have been in stark contrast to other Apostles, like Saint Matthew, who was a tax collector, a profession that pious and zealous Jews would have looked down upon as a sinful and impure way of life. Which goes to show that Jesus called His disciples from varied backgrounds and ways of life. That it was not social classes, economics, or labels that united them together, but the Lord Jesus Himself. Despite their differences, the Apostles lived side by side, worked to overcome their differences, and collectively busied themselves about God’s purposes. This choice of Simon by our Lord clearly is meant to offer us an example of how we are called to live with our fellow Christians with whom we might not always agree. That we are all called to be united as one in Christ, in service to His mission.

Jude, or Thaddaeus as he is sometimes identified, is again someone about whom we know very little. The New Testament letter of “Jude” is attributed to him and Saint John records in his Gospel a question that he asked of Jesus at the Last Supper. Jude asked Jesus – “Lord, how is it that you will manifest yourself to us and not to the world” (John 14:22)? In essence, Jude asks Jesus why He does not reveal Himself in the fullness of His glory to His enemies and those who do not believe. To which Jesus responds rather cryptically – “If a man loves me, he will keep my word and my Father will love him, and we will come to him and make our home with him” (John 14:23). Essentially Jesus says to him, that He is seen ultimately with the heart, that He takes up residence in the one whose heart is open to allow Him to enter in, and is ultimately manifest in the interior life of one who is so disposed.

According to tradition, both Apostles went to preach the Gospel in Mesopotamia and Persia, with Jude likely evangelizing Egypt and Mauritania, before joining Simon in Persia. According to Saint Fortunatus, the 6th century Bishop of Poitier, both were martyred in Persia. Simon was likely put to death with a saw and is often depicted in artwork with this instrument of his martyrdom, while Jude was likely crucified.

One final point of interest, and something that many probably already know about Saint Jude, is that he is the patron saint of impossible or hopeless causes. This is because in the epistle attributed to him in the New Testament, he strongly implores Christians to persevere in faith in difficult times. Over the centuries, the Church has encouraged the faithful to venerate this Apostle and asserted that those who came to him in faith in their time of need have always been given some grace, answer, or consolation.

Saints Simon and Jude, pray for us!

World Mission Sunday is this week,

October 23/24. This year's theme is “We cannot but speak about what we have seen and heard.” (Acts 4:20). World Mission Sunday gives us this important opportunity to reach out to the Mission Church, to speak about our faith, and about missionaries who proclaim the Gospel as they serve the poor. Pope Francis reminds us that “we cannot keep the Lord to ourselves” and that we respond to the missionary call through charity. Your prayers and contributions support evangelizing efforts, building the Church, and supporting priests, religious, and lay pastoral leaders in more than 1,100 mission dioceses. In the poorest communities, in areas covering half the globe, they are witnessing to Christ, even as they cope with the challenges of the global pandemic.

Bishops’ Statement on Vaccines

As COVID-19 vaccines are now available to recipients across the country, the chairmen of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops’ Committee on Doctrine - Bishop Kevin Rhoades, and Committee on Pro-Life Activities - Archbishop Joseph Naumann issued a statement on the new vaccines.

“Receiving one of the COVID-19 vaccines ought to be understood as an act of charity toward the other members of our community. In this way, being vaccinated safely against COVID-19 should be considered an act of love of our neighbor and part of our moral responsibility for the common good,” they wrote. Respect Life Month**



Respect Life Month - Each year, the Church in the United States celebrates October as Respect Life Month. This is a time that we can use to deepen our understanding of why, as Catholics, we “Respect Life” and what that looks like day-to-day. We are also in the midst of celebrating the Year of St. Joseph. So, this year, we are looking to the witness of St. Joseph as a defender of life.

This week’s subject is *Human Trafficking*:

The International Labor Office estimates that there are approximately 25 million men, women, and children subjected to labor or sex trafficking worldwide. It is important to understand how to prevent and recognize incidents of human trafficking within your own community. The USCCB strives to fulfill the Church’s commitment to combat human trafficking and fight for a fair way of life for all through outreach and engagement programs. These initiatives rely on community and faith leaders to join the movement in defending the inherent right of every human being to freedom, justice, and protection.

Today, human trafficking is pervasive throughout the world, and no one is immune to its evils or its impact, including in our country’s fifty states. Bishop Mario E. Dorsonville, auxiliary bishop of Washington, and chairman of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops’ (USCCB) Committee on Migration, released the following statement regarding the Church’s commitment to raising awareness of and eradicating human trafficking: “*Let us reflect upon our responsibilities as individuals and as a Church to make the well-being and protection of victims of human trafficking a priority. We are called by our Holy Father to take a firm stance against this terrible violation of the dignity of the human person and to do everything in our power to eradicate it.*”
