

Dear Parishioners and Friends of the Cathedral,

Do you want to go to heaven? Hopefully every one of us answers this question in the affirmative. How about this question – “Do you want to be a Saint?” At this, we might balk a little bit. Perhaps, we think, I am not holy enough to be a Saint, I’m just a normal guy or girl. But here’s the twist – on one level, these two questions are really the same question, because there are only saints in heaven. Now, in this regard, the Church will distinguish between capital ‘S’ Saints and little ‘s’ saints. Capital ‘S’aints are those men and women who have been declared Saints by the Church and are held up as worthy of veneration and imitation, while little ‘s’aints include all those men and women who have attained the everlasting life of heaven, but who perhaps have not been formally declared to be a ‘S’aint by the Church.

This November 1st, the Church will celebrate the Feast of All Saints, a celebration of those who are in heaven. It is not, as you will sometimes read, a celebration of all who have died (these individuals are prayed for on the Feast of All Souls – November 2nd), since we cannot know with certainty who is in heaven, who is in purgatory, or God forbid, who is in hell, outside of those who have been officially canonized by the Church. Canonization is the formal process, wherein after investigation by the Church, an individual is declared to be with God in heaven. The formal process of Canonization as we know it today, didn’t come about until around the end the first millennium. In the earliest days of the Church, those recognized as Saints were typically the martyrs and those who were already deemed to have great sanctity at the time of their death; a sort of canonization by popular acclamation. Often, people would come to the tombs of these individuals and ask for their intercession, and through the miraculous granting of their requests, they were recognized as Saints. However, the Church eventually came to realize the need to formalize this process of canonization; and so, after about the thirteenth century, no individual would be recognized as a Saint without going through this formal process.

Today, the process basically works like this. Once the person has been dead for five years (this is to ensure their reputation of holiness among the faithful is an enduring one) the local bishop can petition Rome to initiate this process. When permission is given, the person is called a ‘Servant of God.’ Next, testimonies about this person’s life and virtues are collected and their writings examined. If in the judgment of the bishop, the individual demonstrated heroic virtue, then the cause is sent over to Rome, to the congregation that deals with the causes for Saints. This congregation, after its own investigation, makes their recommendation to the Pope, who can then declare this individual ‘Venerable.’ To advance to the next stage, a miracle must be verified as proof of the intercessory power of this person. It must be established that there is no scientific explanation for the miracle in question. Once the miracle has been verified, the Pope can declare this individual ‘Blessed.’ The final step involves the verification of a second miracle. Once this has taken place, the Pope, in an act that is protected from error by the Holy Spirit, can canonize this person and declare them to be a Saint.

Our late Holy Father, John Paul II, himself recently declared a Saint, canonized more Saints than any other Pope in history. He did it to show the world the spiritual fruitfulness of the Church, and to remind us of what we are called to, and that sanctity of this sort is possible for everyone. May we never settle for mediocrity, but strive to imitate the men and women we celebrate on November 1st and become Saints ourselves.

Faith Enrichment Opportunities

31st Sunday in Ordinary Time

Background: Laws and commandments are an essential minimum; they are like the training wheels that keep us safe until we become mature in mind and heart. 3. When have you sacrificed yourself for someone else? What did you learn from this experience?
4. Jesus lived for God’s kingdom/reign all the way to the cross. Yet, we tend to compartmentalize our lives. How have you brought love, not only to family and friends, but to work or school or to the interactions of daily life?

Practice: Find a copy of St. Ignatius’s prayer *Suscipe/Take, Lord, Receive*, and pray it every day this week.

Reflection on All Saints and All Souls Day

For the Christian believer, the celebration of the first two days of November, the Solemnity of All Saints, and the Memorial of All Souls, express the two foundational principles around which revolves the liturgical year, and toward which develops the daily life perspective of the Christian. The Solemnity of All Saints responds with memory and All Souls offers hope. Memory and hope are the pillars of Christian liturgical and daily life, and are the dynamic actions through which ignorance and want are defeated.

A celebration in honor of the saints is not Western, but Eastern in origin, the Greek Church having celebrated the saints on the Sunday after Pentecost since the fourth century. It entered the West in two ways — one through the dedication of the Pantheon in Rome on May 13, 609, as the Church of St. Mary and all Martyrs, by Pope Boniface IV. The second way occurred in the following century, when Pope Gregory III dedicated a chapel to the saints in St. Peter’s Basilica on November 1. The successor of Gregory III, Gregory IV, encouraged the celebration of the saints on this day throughout the Carolingian Empire, eclipsing the May 13 date. The French church added a vigil to the celebration on October 31, the origin of what became “All Hallows Eve” or Halloween, especially in the English Christian tradition.



Respect Life Month - Each year, the Church in the United States celebrates October as Respect Life Month. This is a time that we can use to deepen our understanding of why, as Catholics, we “Respect Life” and what that looks like day-to-day. We are also in the midst of celebrating the Year of St. Joseph.

This week’s subject is *End of Life Issues*:

Advance Medical Directives: Planning for Your Future

Human life is good and to be protected. All medical decisions ought to reflect this core belief. Yet some medical and legal documents used to define a patient’s future care can be harmful. No matter how well-crafted, they can’t predict all the possible scenarios and best courses of action. In each set of circumstances, we need to judge whether a given treatment will provide real benefit to the patient, without causing harm or disproportionate burdens. The safest option is to designate a health care agent to make decisions if you become incapable of doing so. It’s best to appoint a responsible, trustworthy person who understands and shares your Catholic values, and can apply them when the need arises.


