

Dear Parishioners and Friends of the Cathedral,

Once again this year, as we have done for the last several years, one of the things that you will notice during Advent is that some of the Mass parts (*namely the 'Holy, Holy,' the Mystery of Faith, and the 'Lamb of God'*) will be sung/recited in Latin. For some, this might be a nostalgic trip back to how Mass was celebrated in their childhood, others may not even notice the change (*hopefully this was not the case*), and still for others, it might be a source of confusion (*after all, didn't Vatican II get rid of Latin altogether?*). Because of the possibility of greatly varied responses, I want to take a moment to briefly address why we will be singing/reciting some of the Mass parts in Latin during Advent.

First of all, it represents the desire of the Church. It is not about a conservative or liberal agenda, but about what the Church has asked us to do. Because the most common objection to using Latin in the Liturgy is that Vatican II did away with it, I am going to quote from the document on the liturgy from the Second Vatican Council: "The use of the Latin language, with due respect to particular law, is to be preserved in the Latin rites" (*Sacrosanctum Concilium*, 36). Furthermore, the council decreed that "a suitable place may be allotted to the vernacular in Masses which are celebrated with the people... nevertheless care must be taken to ensure that the faithful may also be able to say or sing together in Latin those parts of the Ordinary of the Mass which pertain to them" (*Sacrosanctum Concilium*, 54). To try to do all of the people's Mass parts at once, would be overwhelming; so we are only going to do a few of them (*and the easier ones to learn*). We will make use of these Latin Mass parts for the entirety of Advent, but then will return to English at Christmastime. The goal is not to switch to Latin, but to ensure that the call of the Second Vatican Council is realized, namely, that we are able, if need be, to sing/recite the principal Mass parts in Latin.

Second, the ability to recite the principal Mass parts in Latin serves the unity of the Church. It allows for the One, Holy, Catholic, and Apostolic Church of Jesus Christ to pray with one voice when she gathers together from disparate parts of the world. It was surely the hope of Vatican II, that when we gather for Mass with Catholics from other nations, who speak other languages, that we be able to pray with one voice around the altar, as we celebrate the sacrifice that unites us all in Christ. There is something intangible, yet deeply profound, about standing next to someone with whom I may not be able to communicate in any other way, but when it comes to that which really matters – what I believe – we can stand side by side and proclaim together the praise of the one true God. In that moment, at the high point of the Church most sacred activity, I not only know what my brother or sister is saying, but am also united with them in professing it.

So let us respond to the call of the Second Vatican Council and immerse ourselves in the prayer of the Church that endured sixteen centuries (*Latin was the exclusive language of prayer from the 4th century until the 20th in the Western Church*). And be patient, it will probably take a while, but if we strive to use the bulletin and participate, it will sink in, and before long, you'll be able to switch between Latin and English at Mass as if you were born in ancient Rome.

### 1st Sunday in Advent

**Background:** As is usual, Cycle C of the liturgical year begins where Cycle B ended. Once again, we are called to lift up our eyes from the busy-ness of our daily concerns and to put things in their final perspective as we hear part of Luke’s “eschatological discourse.” Mark assured us that Christ’s return in judgment would be like the coming of summer; Luke now tells us that, in the midst of calamities, we need to “stand up and raise (our) heads” since “our redemption is near at hand.”

#### Discussion Questions

1. What worldly cares really weigh you down? How might Christ help you bear them?
2. What signs of hope help you to raise your head and to face the future?
3. Whose love gives you the strength to carry on?
4. Who needs you to be their source of hope in this world?

**Practice:** One of the classic Advent songs is Psalm 25. Pray it slowly each day this week, and let its words of trust settle deep in you.

**Bishops’ Statement on Vaccines**

As COVID-19 vaccines are now available to recipients across the country, the chairmen of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops’ Committee on Doctrine - Bishop Kevin Rhoades, and Committee on Pro-Life Activities - Archbishop Joseph Naumann issued a statement on the new vaccines.

*“Receiving one of the COVID-19 vaccines ought to be understood as an act of charity toward the other members of our community. In this way, being vaccinated safely against COVID-19 should be considered an act of love of our neighbor and part of our moral responsibility for the common good,”* they wrote. 


