CHILDREN 4-12.....\$ 17


CHILDREN 3 AND UNDER = FREE

Dear Parishioners,

I hope your July is going well.

As I mentioned last week, I was recently asked to do a talk for a group of people in early August. The title will be *Lessons I Learned from leading a parish/school through the Pandemic*. As I began to write the talk realities began to set in. This past year has been one of the toughest years of my priesthood and pastoring. If you add the tensions and division of the recent election and the racial struggles to my plate, you had the perfect storm. As a priest, pastor and leader in our community, I had to navigate through uncharted territories. There was no playbook of how to handle the various realities we found ourselves in each day. Over these weeks, I am reflecting on these realities and where I succeeded and where I fell short in my leadership as well as help to chart a course moving forward. I am focusing in on three areas: pandemic (7/4 bulletin), racial issues (this week) and election (politics) (7/25 bulletin). In all three areas **I want to state sincerely and genuinely that if any way my words, choices, policies, decisions, etc. offended any one or caused anyone to stop coming to church or walk away from the parish, I offer my sincere apologies!** My intention would never be such. I am old enough to know that rarely are we all going to be on the same page, but my hope and intentions are always to unite and not divide. If you find yourself in this category or know someone that is, please encourage them to reach out and setup a time to meet with me so we can dialogue, heal and hopefully restore the relationship. As a pastor/shepherd that is my number one goal!



Regarding Racial Issues:

I have tried various ways of addressing the racial tensions we are facing in our country today. Some things have worked well and some not so well. My goal from the beginning has been, with all due respect to the many initiatives in the secular world and even some within the church, is to shout our Christianity from the rooftops. While movements, ideas and even reforms all have their place in a society, I believe the role of the church is to bring the voice of Christ and His Gospel to the world! I am thinking of that song *They will know we are Christians by our Love*. I believe to be authentically Christian/Catholic we need to be all out committed to:

- All lives are sacred from conception to natural death.
- All men & women are created with equal rights and duties.
- Vulnerable people/groups need our love/support.

We are called to love each human being, no matter what their background/state in life, and rooting this commitment in the Scriptures and Tradition centered on Jesus Christ.

As a Church, we need to think so much bigger than the just racial discrimination against one group or the other. We need to set as a goal to help parishioners and the wider community know that **All LIVES MATTER from WOMB to TOMB PERIOD!** We must love the child within the womb, the migrant, the immigrant, the death row inmate, the sick/suffering/dying, the mentally/physically challenged, the African, the Hispanic, the Asian, the Italian, the Slovenian, the American, the woman, the man, the young, middle aged and old, the poor, the vulnerable, the Catholic, the Jew, the Muslim, the drug addict, the alcoholic, etc. Obviously throughout history we have had individuals and groups of people that needed our help more than others to allow for their equality and dignity to be recognized; but the base must all be the same and point people back to the foundation of our belief that **ALL LIVES MATTER PERIOD!**

I think references to, associations with, etc. at parish (and I made the mistake of doing so, mea culpa, mea culpa...) with things like the Black Lives Matter organization/movement, white fragility, Cancel Culture, etc. these can cause even further division and, for me, can lead us to even further discriminatory behaviors/attitudes. In many cases, these tend to focus a movement on an entire group of people. For example, in 2002, when the terrible sexual abuse scandal broke in the church (that still plagues us today!) there were many people that lumped all priests and bishops together as pedophiles and protectors of pedophiles. This simply was not true. There were individuals that violated their sacred oaths and duties and brought grave evil against others. There were even some practices and systems that need to and are still being examined and changed so this sort of things does not happen in the future. If there are individuals that wrong others or discriminate, then we need to hold them accountable. If there are practices and systems that need some reform or change, then let us do that. However, we cannot lump our beliefs/assumptions/attitudes against a whole group of people. It is very dangerous and can lead to a whole new set of problems.



The challenge, and what we as parish can and will focus on, is to come to help people come to know that every person ever created, created now, or will be created is equal in the eyes of God and therefore in the eyes of each of us. This equality comes with rights and duties that can never be compromised. We will align ourselves not with any secular movement but the Gospel of Jesus Christ!

**Jesus and His Ways and Truth will lead us to a life-giving message/ministry and parish response. I believe that we will accomplish the same goal we just need to change the way we get there to hopefully open more hearts and minds.**

### LUKE BROWN'S REFLECTION

*In my line of work, I have met many people who describe experiences of counseling that were not productive or helpful and that left the person thinking that counseling was a waste of time. Whether it is an individual, couple, or a parent bringing a child, some people leave with a bad experience that makes them want to write off the entire counseling field as unhelpful. I am not writing this to criticize those experiences or to place blame on people who were seeking help and found none. Counseling is a field full of diverse counselors that do not always hit the mark when people come to them seeking healing and guidance. We as counselors can have very different approaches to helping people and some are not the right fit for the person seeking help. It is worth mentioning as well that we are human and can have bad days where we feel burnt out, tired, or overwhelmed, which inevitably impacts our ability to be working at 100%. When people have had this experience, I often encourage them to give counseling another try. Finding the right counselor can be difficult, but it is possible. If you have a bad experience with a counselor, you have several options. You can give them a little bit more time, ask the counselor for a referral, or keep looking on your own for a different counselor. Websites like [psychologytoday.com](http://psychologytoday.com) and [catholictherapists.com](http://catholictherapists.com) can give you an idea of the counselor's approach to see if they are the right fit for you. Counseling can open many doors to healing and greater wellbeing. It is important to not let one bad experience prevent you from gaining all that counseling has to offer.*
