



Changing Water into Wine

As we embark into the season of Ordinary Time, we once again get to revisit the life and ministry of Jesus. We get to hear the stories of His ministry all over again as we try to apply their meaning to our lives. This church year we hear the



readings from the gospel of St. Luke. Today however, we revisit the beginning of Jesus' ministry as we hear from John's gospel.

The liturgy of the Word for this week starts out reminding us of the joy the people of Israel felt as they returned to their homeland. For a long time the chosen people had been humiliated and persecuted but now the God of their Fathers was leading them back home. They refer to their relationship to God as a bride groom welcomes his bride. God refers to his people as "My Delight and Espoused." Isaiah gives us a reading that is filled with hope and promise for the people.

It is interesting that the people of Israel felt that God punished them for their sins. It was because they were not faithful to the covenant that they had to suffer. I believe that we can relate to that notion for there always seems to be that idea weaving its way through religious beliefs that God punishes people for their sins, either individually or collectively. During the hurricanes that devastated Florida, the Eastern Shore and New Orleans, and the 9/11 attacks on the World Trade Center, there were powerful voices from the religious right who claimed God was punishing the victims of these natural disasters because they had sinned. This idea certainly does not do justice to a loving God like the one we hear about in the first reading. We would all do well to emphasize the joy and rejoicing that comes into all of our lives when we experience God's saving power and love rather than blaming God for the wrongs in life.

It Is because of this hope and promise that we are able to relate to God through one another. Our second reading reminds us that we are all given gifts in various degrees to work for the betterment of society. It becomes our responsibility to work together sharing our gifts to help one another. We could never emphasize enough the importance of building up the community through the shared gifts of individual members. Even though there is an ever present notion of "individualism" permeating our society, we must always trust that there will be people of good heart and will to come forward whenever needed.

The Gospel blends the joy of the first reading with the responsibilities of the second reading to a conclusion with the miracle at Cana. The miracle of changing water into wine is probably one of the more popular miracles of Jesus, at least most people (even non-Christians) are aware of it. But, what we don't realize is how this miracle pertains to us. Wine in Jewish religious rituals meant life, blood, spirit and divinity. It was the sign of the Kingdom of God. The water symbolized life. The water jars that are part of the story represent the Old Law because jugs were used at Jewish ceremonial rites. In changing the water and making it wine Jesus is telling us that He is the new law which will give spirit and life. We are all transformed into abundance with Jesus and we are to become that wine to others. Jesus shows us how social He is and that He cares about the simple things of life. We are called to use that miracle in our own lives to share our gifts beyond measure to touch the lives of others. We are called to be social in the same way by being the presence of Jesus to others and helping to work this miracle every day.

The Church and the Synod on Synodality"

Pope Francis invites the **entire Church** to reflect on a theme that is decisive for its life and mission: "It is precisely this path of synodality which God expects of the Church of the third millennium." This journey which follows in the wake of the church's "renewal" proposed by the Second Vatican Council, is both a gift and a task: by journeying together and reflecting together on the journey that has been made, the Church will be able to learn through Her experience which process can help Her to live communion, to achieve participation, to open Herself to mission.

To understand synodality, we first need to understand what a synod is. Simply put, a synod is a meeting or assembly of church leaders. The idea of a synod has New Testament roots in Acts 15. "Synodality" refers to the way that these synods make decisions. It is a model that includes listening to a broad range of people and then discussing the issues together with the goal of hearing where the Holy Spirit is calling the church. Practically, Pope Francis has said, this means not entering the discussion with the idea that there will be "winners" who get their way and "losers" who do not but leaving agendas at the door, speaking with parrhesia (a Greek word that appears in the New Testament and means "frankness," "boldness" or "courage"), listening humbly and being open to others' ideas. In theory, no topic is off-limits, and disagreement is welcome.

After the discussions, the bishops of the synod draft a document and vote, paragraph by paragraph, to approve it. The Pope uses that document to inform his decisions following the synod.

After having said all of that...we have been asked to participate in this Synod through our Diocese. It is important to understand that every voice counts, and we need to hear yours! There is a flyer in the bulletin this week that explains how you can participate. If you have any questions or concerns, know that I am always here to listen.
