





Making use of our remaining funds from the Catholic Campaign for the Church Alive!

In 2014, Bishop David Zubik and the Catholic Diocese of Pittsburgh - and all our parishes - conducted the Campaign for the Church Alive! to financially strengthen our parishes and the Diocese. Funds from this campaign have been used to eliminate debts and to complete major projects of programming and renovation. For example, from this Diocesan Campaign, our consolidated Saint Philip Parish received \$1,250,000 from the other parishes to eliminate our long-standing operating debt. In addition, our remaining churches and campuses of Saint Philip and Ascension have undergone significant repairs and renovations thanks to the generosity of our contributors.

To recap our own Campaign, the four previous parish communities (now consolidated into one Saint Philip Parish community) received:

Campaign Pledges \$1,856,000 Campaign Contributions \$1,291,000 Pledges NOT yet contributed \$ 565,000

All the repairs and projects of our consolidated Campaign Case Statement have been completed at this time. So much good has been accomplished by you, our members and families, and our staff.


At this time, Saint Philip Parish still has \$121,426 remaining in our Campaign Funds. Diocesan officials are encouraging pastors to utilize remaining funds for the good of our respective parishes. As such, I would like to add several projects to our Campaign Case Statement at this time so as to utilize our remaining Campaign funds in beneficial ways.

These are the new projects that we'd like to accomplish using these remaining Campaign funds:

- The purchase of a NEW outdoor Nativity Scene for Saint Philip
- The repair and refurbishing of the exterior doors of Saint Philip
- Evangelization efforts (including invitation postcards to the entire community);
- Tree service for both church campuses; and
- The designing and installation of needed parish signs for both church campuses.

These projects have been reviewed by our Pastoral Council and Finance Council as well as our parish staff, and these projects will make good use of our remaining Campaign funds. EPIPHANY: 20 + C + M + B + 22

On the Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord, the Church recalls that with the visit of the three Wise Men to the Holy Family, all the Gentiles would be offered salvation.

The word epiphany means: "a revealing scene or moment." During the Christmas season, we celebrate the fact that in Jesus Christ, the Son of God is revealed to us. On the Feast of the Epiphany, we celebrate the day when Jesus was revealed to the whole word, represented by the Magi, who came from distant lands. At the Feast of the Epiphany we are invited to bless our homes as a reminder of the Magi's welcoming the Christ Child and that we welcome Jesus into our home. We can bless our homes by writing in 20 + C + M + B + 22 in chalk above our entrance or door. The 22 represents the Year. The letters C, M and B represent the initials of the 3 Wise Men who were identified as Casper, Melchior, and Balthasar. The letters C, M, B also represent the first letters of the words: Christus Mansionem Benedicat which is Latin for Christ Bless this House.

The following prayers can be said:

"Though the light seems very far, darkness shall be overcome. Christ come now and bless our home."

or

"Heavenly Father, as we mark our threshold, send the angel of mercy to guard our home and repel all powers of darkness. Fill all who live in this home with holy charity and warm them with the fullness of your grace. And so, Father, may all who dwell here or grace its portals with their presence, find the joy and thoughtfulness of Mary, the God-bearer, and thus praise and thank You eternally together with Jesus, the light of the nations, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, now and forever. Amen."

EXAMPLES OF OUR FAITH St. Elizabeth Ann Seton | January 4


The patron saint of Catholic schools, St. Elizabeth Ann Seton (August 28, 1774 -January 4, 1821) was born in New York City to a prominent family of the Episcopal faith. When she turned 19, she married a wealthy businessman with whom she had five children. He later died of tuberculosis in 1803, leaving her a young widow. After discovering the Catholic faith in Italy, where her husband had died, she returned to New York and converted to Catholicism in 1805.

After several years struggling as a single mother, Elizabeth moved in 1809 to Emmitsburg, Maryland, where she founded the Sisters of Charity of St. Joseph, the first community for religious women established in the United States. She also began St. Joseph's Academy and Free School, which started a chain reaction of Catholic-based education in the United States that continues today.


St. Elizabeth Ann Seton was canonized September 14, 1975 in St. Peter's Square by Pope Paul VI and was the first citizen born in the United States to be given the title of "saint."

CLASSROOM CHRONICLES: Each week we will highlight the amazing things that are going on in our classrooms at Guardian Angel Academy.





MRS. WOODALL'S PRESCHOOL CLASSROOM

This year the preschool students have been working very hard to develop academically and socially. Our days are filled with excitement and wonder as the students explore new concepts and ideas. We have been building our early literacy skills by making a connection between the sounds associated with each letter of the alphabet and their printed form. The children have also started learning to isolate the beginning, middle, and end sounds in spoken words, blend and segment syllables, and create compound words by combining two smaller words. The children are building a strong foundation that will allow them to be strong readers in the future. The preschool students have also been busy learning early math skills. They have worked to understand that numbers help us answer questions about time, size, and amount. They have practiced writing numbers, identifying printed numbers, and counting various-sized groups. They have also started exploring how to read, identify, and complete AB patterns using manipulatives and our classroom SMART Board. Recently, we practiced using our math skills during a game of Christmas Bingo that was sponsored by the PTG. In religion, the preschoolers have built their relationship with God and our faith through Bible stories and prayer. They have learned to recite the Hail Mary and Guardian Angel prayers. Throughout the season of Advent, the children are working to be patient as we learn about the true meaning of Christmas and wait to celebrate Jesus' birth. Each week we "light" a candle on the Advent wreaths we created that are hanging outside of our classroom. We even enjoyed a surprise visit from St. Nicholas in celebration of his feast day. There is never a dull moment in preschool, and we look forward to continuing this adventure together as we move through the school year.


TEACHER SPOTLIGHTS: Each week we will spotlight one of our outstanding teachers at Guardian Angel Academy.

MR. ROY FISCHER - 7TH GRADE

I am proud to say that I have spent nearly my entire academic career within the Catholic school system! I attended St. Philip School, as my mother and grandfather had done before before me.



graduating from Our Lady of the Sacred Heart High School. I started college at CCAC, transferred to Carlow University for my Bachelors, and finished with a graduate degree from Duquesne University. My wife and I had our wedding at St. Philip, like my grandparents, and even had the students of St. Philip sing in the choir for our ceremony, like my grandparents! Tradition plays a key role in my life, probably a testament to my passion of teaching history to the 7th and 8th graders at Guardian Angel Academy. This will be my 8th year teaching at a Catholic school. Within my classroom, I incorporate religion into my lessons, discussing morality and the corporal works of mercy as it pertains to history. It is the duty of my class to educate our children of the rights and responsibilities of citizenship. It is also our job to remember that these presidents, soldiers, and legendary figures are all humans, with the same fears, hopes and desires as you and I. People cannot be reduced to numbers and statistics. To deny this is to deny the people of the past their humanity.



THE LIGHT OF THE MOON: If you own a television that has been turned on at any point in the last month or so, chances are you've caught at least a scene or two of the 1946 classic film "It's a Wonderful Life."

If you're not familiar with the movie, it follows the life of George Bailey from childhood through adulthood. A dreamer by nature, George has big plans for himself that involve world exploration and adventure — but familyA and community obligations keep him tethered to the same spot on the map, leading an altogether ordinary life.

One of the most memorable scenes from that movie is of George dancing with his sweetheart Mary while they sing "Buffalo Gals — Won't you come out tonight/ And dance by the light of the moon?"

That lyric always catches my ear. Of course, the moon doesn't have any light of its own. All the moon has is the ability to reflect the light that shines upon it.

The same holds for us, doesn't it? Our stewardship is purely a reflection of the grace granted to us by another. "Upon you the LORD shines," writes Isaiah, "and over you appears his glory." Every good action we will ever take begins in the mind of God. The fact that we have the honor of carrying it out on His behalf is a beautiful gift. It is God that makes our ordinary lives extraordinary.

In the end of the movie, George Bailey realizes that he had a far greater life because, instead of being the hero of his own story, he allowed himself to reflect goodness onto others.




GOSPEL MEDITATION: ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

THE EPIPHANY OF THE LORD: In his Apostolic Exhortation, The Joy of the Gospel, Pope Francis references a thought from Pope Benedict XVI: "Being a Christian is not the result of an ethical choice or a lofty idea, but the encounter with an event, a person, which gives life a new horizon and a decisive direction." Today we celebrate an encounter with the Person of Jesus Christ! This simple but holy event in

time dramatically changes human life, pointing it toward a new horizon and giving it a decisive direction. This is a message and truth that is not meant to be shared with only a select few who qualify but with the entire world. Pope Francis continues saying, "Thanks solely to this encounter or renewed encounter with God's love, which blossoms into an enriching friendship, we are liberated from our narrowness and self-absorption. We become fully human when we become more than human, when we let God bring us beyond ourselves in order to attain the fullest truth of our being."

Look around at people. Where is life heading for them? What gives them direction? Even we who are people of faith can get distracted and lose our focus. God, in all of His fullness, is revealed in Jesus Christ and we can encounter Him! God is tangible, real, vulnerable, poor, and full of wonders, surprises, and opportunities. For those who are struggling and lost, today is a day of great joy. All they have to do is reach out and touch the truth of Christ. This presence is revealed in the poor, exploited, and vulnerable ones who cry out for compassion and love. But it is also found in the faithful ones who see in the Epiphany of God a liberation from structures and systems that hurt us, a narrowness of mind and heart that constricts us, and an absorption in our self-agenda that prevents us from seeing anything other than ourselves as important.

We have been given the charge of preaching this Good News. If only we could find a way to be more effective, it might stand a chance of doing what God intended it to do. There is always tomorrow and our memory of that bright new light that shone so brilliantly that Bethlehem night pointing us to truth and reminding us that we are loved.
