



Best wishes for the summer months as we all hopefully take time to rest and relax following a very busy catechetical and academic year! In the Church, we call these months (*until the First Sunday of Advent*) "Ordinary Time" simply because they're the numbered weeks outside the holy seasons of Advent, Christmas, Lent, and Easter. In reality, for all Christians, these years, these millennia are all the "Time of the Lord," and so we might actually think of ALL time as Extraordinary Time – the "Time of the Lord Jesus." However, I'll leave that idea for some future *Notes from the Pastor*.

Live in the Light of the Lord

For 90 days, we observed and celebrated the holy Seasons of Lent and Easter – and then we rejoiced in the Sundays of the Holy Trinity and the Body and Blood of the Lord. Now, our Sunday readings from the Bible return to our regular readings from the books of the Bible – the readings which fill the Ordinary Time of our three year A, B, C cycle of the Gospels and other biblical books.

As life would have it, our first reading this Sunday is from the Book of Genesis and its account of our first parents - called Adam and Eve. Today's account recalls for us the first sin of our first parents - the first sin which, according to Genesis, brought evil and sin into the world. In our Judeo-Christian Scriptures and in our faith, we acknowledge the continuing presence of evil and sin within our world, throughout humanity, and within our own lives too.

Thankfully, the ministry of Jesus which inaugurated the Kingdom of Almighty God - the presence of God in our world - and the death and Resurrection of Jesus have conquered sin, evil, and death. However, the Kingdom of God is NOT yet fully complete. As each of us knows all too well, there is still plenty of darkness, treachery, evil, sin, and violence in our world.

In the twenty centuries following Jesus' life, death, and Resurrection, sin and evil had to "crawl slowly" among our ancestors. For twenty centuries, sin occurred among individuals and communities. Sin and evil were experienced within the lives of individuals before spreading to communities and societies.

Unfortunately, today, sin and evil both spread very rapidly because of our modern electronic media and the Internet. In the past, sin occurred quite often in the lives of individuals. Today, sin and evil are disseminated within entire communities, nations, and societies. More than ever before, we're inundated often by the tidal wave of sin which overwhelms us because of today's technology.

As Catholic Christians, I hope that we will continue to take seriously the destructive effects of the sins that we commit. May we also clearly see the destructive effect of the evil that exists in our present society and spreads through our electronic communications.

It's truly important that all of us who are the Lord's people remember to shield ourselves, to protect ourselves from the rampant evil of this world. With the grace of God, may all of us do our utmost to avoid the temptations, the sin, and the evil that are all around us in this present age. May we be dedicated to the light and the Kingdom of God the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit so that the work of the Lord will, one day, completely prevail and lead us into the final, holy, and glorious Kingdom of God!

Best wishes for these days and for the summer months!

In these weeks of prolonged daylight, may all of you - our parish members and families - have very good weeks ahead. May this summer be a time of rest, renewal, faith, and the love of God for you and all your neighbors, friends, and loved ones. God bless!

Baptism has been a sacred religious ceremony for thousands of years, and for all Catholic Christians, it remains a sacred religious ceremony today as well. As we see in the ministry of Saint John the Baptist, *Baptism* was practiced among the people of Israel, and as we see in the Gospels and the early Church, *Baptism* is the first Ritual of Initiation for all those who called to be disciples of Jesus and members of His holy Church.

As you know, *Baptism* (and the divine grace that it shares with us) lasts a lifetime. In fact, we believe that Baptisms marks us as God's people for all eternity, and in our prayers, we ask the Lord to renew and revitalize our Baptismal Grace throughout our lifetime.

There are three most important gifts which we receive in our Baptism.

These gifts are:

- **1.)** Our being cleansed from the sin of this world (Original Sin);
- **2.)** Our receiving divine life (grace) in our souls and in our lives for the first time; and
- **3.)** Our membership among the People of God in the Catholic Church.

All of these gifts are very important to our Christian faith, life, and discipleship - and to our sharing in the eternal life and goodness of God.

May we always appreciate and give thanks for the gift of our *Baptism*! May we live in the life of the Lord every day. May the divine within us be renewed in the Eucharist and all the Sacraments - as well as in our prayer, Liturgy, service, and daily discipleship!


In this time of waiting for our final reunion, we do well to visit the resting places of our deceased loved ones and to pray for their eternal rest, and peace, and salvation!



A NOTE FROM MARYANN: A priest suggested that one way to read Scripture would be to read the readings from the Liturgy of the day and choose one sentence for prayer. You might repeat this sentence after breakfast, before answering emails, before checking your phone, and several times throughout the day.



One such sentence that might be appropriate for this type of prayer could be found in the second reading for Sunday, June 16. "*We walk by faith, not by sight*" is a phrase that we might repeat in prayer as a reminder to ourselves.

There was a Superior of a Franciscan Order who was struggling with a very difficult decision. He asked Father Solanus Casey, a member of his religious order, to pray that the Lord would send him an answer. Weeks went by and no answer came. The Superior went to Father Solanus' room and asked, "Have you been praying with me about this?" He then went back to his office. A few minutes later Father Solanus appeared at his door with tears in his eyes saying, "I have been praying. Where is your faith?" This question is one to which all of us can relate.

In these very difficult times for our country and our world, we are often asked to pray for peace. It seems like it is something we can do in the midst of events. In the times of health concerns, financial concerns, relationship concerns, we are often asked for prayers. Yet where is our faith? In the Scriptures, the disciples on the road to Emmaus have lost faith. They find it when Jesus breaks the bread and offers it to them. In Eucharist, they encounter a new faith, a new vision, a new excitement. In these difficult times in our world, let us find faith in prayer and in the Sacraments. Let us remember that we walk by faith and not by sight.

ABOUT BLESSED SOLANUS CASEY: Solanus Casey was born in 1870 in Wisconsin. He was one of 16 children. After leaving the family farm, Solanus worked as a lumberjack, hospital orderly, prison guard and street-car operator. As a street-car operator, Solanus witnessed a violent act that caused him to consider the priesthood. He applied to be a Diocesan priest but his superiors felt his limited education would make the Latin and German studies too difficult.

He was advised to apply to an order and perhaps they would ordain him. Following a time of prayer, he applied to the Franciscan Capuchin Order. They said they would ordain him, but his only ministry would be to answer the door. As a doorkeeper many people came with their heartaches and troubles. Solanus would help and guide them. Often, miracles would occur and individuals would be cured or troubles gone. His famous saying would be, "Thank God ahead of Time." Many families including my own, have been helped through the intercession of Blessed Solanus Casey. 






ST. VINCENT DE PAUL SOCIETY UPDATE

Over our past two fiscal years, we provided our friends in need with \$43,550 more in assistance than we received in donations. We knew those programs would eventually stop and we would need to help fill that void.

Both of these items have been hit hard by inflation.
