Notes from the Pastor

Greetings once again, and best wishes for a joyful and blessed Corpus Christi Sunday during this Jubilee Holy Year!

Celebrating Corpus Christi Sunday

Every Holy Thursday during Holy Week, we celebrate the Mass of the Lord's Supper and the establishment of the Eucharist as one of the most important and sacred gifts that Jesus has given to all of us who are His disciples. It is the Eucharist which fills us with divine life and gives us the promise of eternal life in God the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. It's the Eucharist which continues and deepens our sacred bond with the Lord and with one another in the Church of God.

Every year, on the second Sunday following Pentecost Sunday, we also celebrate the Solemnity of the Body and Blood of the Lord Jesus - known by its Latin name as "Corpus Christi Sunday." On this Sunday, we once again remember and celebrate the tremendous gift and the importance of the Eucharist for our faith, for our Christian living, and for our unity as God's People. Throughout His ministry, Jesus promised to nourish us with His very life, and He promised to give us the Bread of Eternal Life. Then, at His Last Supper, Jesus transformed the Jewish Passover into His own Supper for the benefit of His Apostles and disciples.

In the Liturgy, as the priest speaks the very words of Jesus, the Holy Spirit transforms the bread and wine into the sacramental Body and Blood of the Lord - the sacramental Body and Blood of Christ. We receive the Eucharist in Holy Communion as nourishment for our journey of life and faith with one another and with all the Lord's people. We retain the Eucharist in the church Tabernacle so as to share this Sacrament with those who are ill and homebound. In our personal prayer and Eucharistic Adoration in church, we also spend time with Jesus who is sacramentally present in the Blessed Sacrament.

May we always appreciate this sacred and incredible gift of the Lord Jesus that He still shares with all of us even twenty centuries after Jesus' first celebration of the Eucharist. May we know that it contains the divine life of the Lord that benefits us in this life and leads us to life everlasting. May we also lead back to the Lord's Supper all of our family members, relatives, and friends who've drifted away from our Sacred Liturgy – especially all the children of our parish who all too often DON'T receive the Eucharist any more after the celebration of their First Holy Communion.

The Eucharist - the Body and Blood of the Lord Jesus - is a most wonderful and sacred gift shared with us in order to keep us united us with God the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit today and always. May we appreciate the gift of the Holy Eucharist every Sunday and every day, and may we lead our fellow Catholic Christians to the Liturgy and to Holy Communion every Sunday!

Best wishes for this celebration of Corpus Christi Sunday!

Best wishes to you and to all in our Saint Philip Parish community for a joyful Corpus Christi celebration! As always, thank you very much for your continued faith, discipleship, dedication, goodness, and generosity – to our parish community, to one another, and to those in need.

As every property owner or manager knows, building and property repairs are a constant part of life. Believe it or not, the same is true for churches and parishes!

Thanks to our very fine maintenance staff, our own parish has regular maintenance and continual repairs to keep our buildings and facilities in excellent condition. For everyone's information, here are a few of our current projects.

First, following the terrible storms which passed through our area in early May, it was discovered at Saint Philip church that one of the ornamental "finial" was blown off its pedestal. Being a heavy carved stone, when it was knocked off its pedestal near the church bell tower, it crashed onto the church roof and punctured some holes into the roof. At this time, our diocesan insurance program is funding the repairs to the Saint Philip church roof.

Second, while the repairmen are on the roof making repairs, we've arranged for a complete review and inspection of the entire church roof. This is **NOT** paid for by our insurance. However, as you know, having a roof in its best condition is the first priority for maintaining any building.

Third, the rainwater from that storm and subsequent storms in May also caused damage to the school building roof due to some clogged drains. Our insurance program also covered the repairs to the school roof – as well as the damage caused by water that found its way into some of the rooms. **Finally**, the natural gas line serving the Hope House near Saint Philip church will also need to be replaced in the coming weeks.

Our repairs and maintenance continue each and every day as we work - thanks to your support - to maintain our buildings and properties in the best condition.

Next, in the coming 12-24 months, we'll need to undertake some extensive repair projects. We will need to replace the roof of the school building in order to continue its use by all of our student and adult Faith Formation programs, the Saint Vincent DePaul Conference, the Ladies of Charity, and other parish programs.

Also, we'll need to repaint the exterior and interior of Ascension church as well as the exterior of our parish office center. The bells of both churches need important repairs. We may also look to install solar panels on the flat roofs of our buildings to save on electricity bills.

To fund these important and necessary repair projects, we can withdraw funds from our parish savings. However, an alternative will be to conduct a financial campaign specifically for these expensive repairs – inviting our members and families to help with these projects rather than decreasing our savings with the diocese.

More information on these matters will be shared with our members and families in the coming months. Again, thank you so very much for your understanding – and for your support in maintaining the life and properties of our very fine Saint Philip Catholic Parish!



REFLECTIONS FROM MARYANN: June is the month where we reflect upon the Sacred Heart. In his book, <u>5 Things with Father</u> <u>Bill</u>, Father William Byrne reflects upon the Sacred Heart. He notes the following:

In the past, if you had a May wedding, the bridesmaids wore blue to

honor the Blessed Mother. If you had a June wedding, the bridesmaids wore red to honor the Sacred Heart of Jesus. Such was the custom not long ago. I think the Sacred Heart of Jesus has faded a bit from Catholic consciousness. Devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus, a human heart that is inflamed with divine love, is a powerful meditation. I offer you five ways to reflect on the Sacred Heart of Jesus.

- **1. A sacred sonogram.** Imagine if sonograms had existed at the time of Jesus. Just a little more than a week after the Annunciation, when Mary said yes to becoming the mother of God, we would have seen something amazing on that screen, a little beating heart. That tiny pulse, undetectable to the human ear but resounding in heaven, meant that our God has a heart.
- **2. What John didn't hear, but the angels did.** At the Last Supper, John the Beloved laid his head on Jesus' chest. Jesus knew that Judas, one of His chosen apostles, was going to betray Him. What John did not hear but again echoed in heaven was the sound of a breaking heart. The Sacred Heart is as human as yours and mine. It is a sign of the true humanity of Jesus. His heart quickened when He laughed with a loved one, and it ached with sorrow when He experienced betrayal. Think how truly His heart feels your joys and sorrows.
- **3. See blessings, not bitterness.** The Sacred Heart of Jesus was wounded and from that wound came blood and water. From His suffering, blessings flowed, the waters of Baptism and the blood of the Eucharist. From our pains and hurts, what flows? Grudges, blame, and anger? Or mercy, compassion, and forgiveness? Don't wait for suffering before you turn to Christ on the Cross; but begin to pray now so that when you are put to the test, blessings and not bitterness will flow from your wounded side.
- **4. Some wounds never heal.** When the soldier thrust the lance into Jesus' side, He was already dead. As Thomas learned, those wounds never healed. He was able to feel the marks of the crucifixion and put his hand into Jesus' side. The water and blood, Baptism and Eucharist, have never ceased to flow from the side of Christ. His mercy is without end. After you receive Communion at Mass, recall His overwhelming, never-ending generosity. Pray that just as His love flows from the Cross into you and me, that love may flow from you and me into the world.
- **5. Like unto thine.** The Sacred Heart of Jesus, a human heart, opened the gates of heaven for each of us. In Jesus, humanity entered into union with God. That could only happen when God became a man. As He took a human Heart, He invites us into His divinity. When you think of the Sacred heart, pray this invocation, old and yet so new: *Jesus, meek and humble of heart, make my heart like unto Thine. Heart of Jesus, burning with love for me, inflame my heart with love of Thee. Amen.*

SUMMER PRAYER PRACTICES: Embrace the season by slowing down and exploring new ways to pray. Start with the *Five Finger Examen Prayer*:

- **1. Be Still.** Our thumb reminds us of what is important. Notice your breath, try to still your mind, and be present to God and to yourself.
- **2. Be grateful.** As our index finger points things out to people, reflect on your day and point out everything you're grateful for.
- **3. Notice.** Our middle finger is usually the longest and the one that stands out. What stood out to you today? Where have you felt happy today? Sad? Frustrated? Where were there challenges today? Any victories?
- **4. Ask for Help.** Our ring fingers are where we put our wedding rings and special rings. Think about your responsibilities and promises you have made to special people. What do you need God's help with? Is there anything you need to say sorry for?

5. Look ahead. Our pinky finger is our smallest one. Sometimes a small change can make a big difference. Think about tomorrow. What do you hope for? Are there little changes you can make?

ST. VINCENT DE PAUL SOCIETY UPDATE

For families that struggle with food insecurity, the summer can be a stressful time. Figuring out where the money will come from to provide breakfast and lunch for kids who usually get fed those meals at school for free can be difficult. Luckily, there are some summer meal resources for children in the area.

The City of Pittsburgh's Summer Food Service Program (also known as GrubUp!) serves meals to children up to age 18, and people with intellectual disabilities up to age 21, during the summer months at sites throughout the City. There are three sites in our area, at the Salvation Army on Broadhead Road, at The Open Door on Stratmore Street, and at the Jasmine Nyree Center on Ashlvn Street in Sheraden. The Salvation Army serves breakfast and a hot lunch Monday through Friday. The Open Door serves breakfast and a cold lunch Monday through Friday. The Jasmine Nyree Center serves breakfast and a hot lunch Monday through Friday. 
