#### 23rd Sunday in Ordinary Time

From the time we are born into this world until we die, our human radar picks up signals about how to respond to life. What we picked up on when we were very young carries an even greater power. The messages we receive and



process tell us what we are "supposed" to do with our feelings, how to understand and cope with disappointment, anxiety, failure, death, illness, and what to expect out of life. As life unfolds for us, these radar messages kick in and resonate in us at very deep levels. Sometimes what we have learned is helpful and sometimes it is not. The stories we have been told, especially when we are young, about how life is best lived and how to negotiate its pain carry a heavy weight.

Life can be challenging and frightening. Sometimes, it really hurts to be a human being. It also can be quite unpredictable and, at times, unfair. We face our vulnerability and brokenness of all kinds: physical, emotional, and spiritual. It doesn't take much for life to quickly fall apart. What we knew to be familiar and true is gone and something we relied upon, physically, emotionally, or spiritually, can be taken away. It is hard to confront our limitations and sit with our incompleteness. Often, life hurts us so much that we find ourselves sitting in a pool of sadness, not sure what we are supposed to do. It is particularly hard when the signals we have inherited tell us that we need to be successful in what we do, and we have to avoid life's unfairness. We can feel like a failure, wondering what precisely we did to deserve this fate, or ruminate about what we did not do correctly. But it's really not about us. We are part of a bigger picture and a much more fascinating story!

If we cease doing battle with life's incompleteness and see ourselves, as God does, on a journey toward wholeness and completeness we can better accept our disappointments and stand firm. The prophets told us, and Jesus reassured us: Be strong! Fear not! Sometimes we have to update our stories and replace them with newer, more accurate ones. When we make God's story our own and tune our radar into His voice, what we hear is all about restoration, healing, and rejuvenation! This is true even when we think we have hit rock bottom and can go no further. There is always hope. Remember the words of Julian of Norwich: God made us, God loves us, and God keeps us. Now, listen to God when He says, "be opened!" Be healed and allow your stories to change.





# Learn more about the history and meaning behind this special day By Tierney McAfee

Labor Day is often thought of as summer's last hurrah. The holiday weekend usually offers a chance to spend time relaxing with friends and family and enjoying delicious grilling recipes and summery drinks. But of course there's a much deeper meaning behind Labor Day.

Labor Day is a time to pay tribute to American workers, and all of their many contributions and achievements through the years. Created by the labor movement in the late 19th century, Labor Day honors the men and women who fought tirelessly for workers' rights, especially the eight-hour work day we have now. So when your Labor Day 2021 celebration is in full swing, be sure to take some time out to reflect and pay respect to all the workers, past and present, who have made America the country it is today.

# What is the history of Labor Day?

Labor Day became a U.S. federal holiday in 1894, but by that time thirty states already officially celebrated the holiday. Labor Day was created by members of the labor movement, who organized strikes and rallies to fight for better working conditions amid the Industrial Revolution, according to the History Channel.

On September 5, 1882, New York City union leaders organized what is now considered the country's first Labor Day parade, according to National Geographic.

On this day, 10,000 workers took unpaid time off to march through the streets of New York City, in an event culminating in a picnic, fireworks, and dancing. Organizers declared the day "a general holiday for the workingmen of this city." Their idea spread across the country, and many states passed legislation recognizing the workers' holiday.

It wasn't until 1894, however, that Congress legalized the holiday following the Pullman strike, a nationwide railroad boycott that turned fatal and shined a national spotlight on workers' rights. Amid this massive unrest, Congress sought to make peace with American workers by passing an act making Labor Day a legal holiday. President Grover Cleveland officially signed it into law on June 28, 1894.

More than a century later, the true founder of Labor Day remains unknown, although many credit labor union leader Peter J. McGuire for the idea. The world may never know this detail, but now you know enough about Labor Day to truly celebrate everything it stands for.


# The Year of Saínt Joseph

Why do Catholics celebrate St. Joseph on Wednesdays?

Wednesday is the middle of the week for Christians — a day which serves as a pivot point, just as St. Joseph is in the Bible. This sense of being in the center of things can be better understood by the

image of a bridge, and Wednesday is like a bridge from one part of the week to another. It's true that St. Joseph is like a bridge for us, too - a bridge between the Old and New Testaments. Through the



little we learn about him in the Gospels, we get the impression that St. Joseph is like the patriarchial figures of the Old Testament. For example, the ancient patriarch Joseph was a man of dreams, and so is our own St. Joseph. Abraham received God's promise because he was a man of faith, and those promises are realized through the Messiah — who is being cared for faithfully by St. Joseph. Hence, St. Joseph is a figure who invites us to ponder over the patriarchs. Why? To better understand him while, like Mary, he leads us to our savior, Jesus Christ. St. Joseph knows that it is in the Messiah that the promises given to the patriarchs gain fulfillment. Thus, in this light, I think we can see why Wednesday is a fitting day to honor St. Joseph, a man who helps us travel between not only both the Old and New Testaments but also this life and eternal life with his Son.

# "FINDING HOPE IN LOSS: A SPECIAL MEMORIAL SERVICE"

On September 11, 2001, and for the past 19 months, our community has experienced loss in many forms. Friends and loved ones have gone to eternal rest, and we were not able to properly mourn. Many mourn the loss of what was once considered 'normal' daily living. Some mourn the loss of a job, home, pet, or special relationship. Your item should be able to be easily carried into the church and laid at the temporary memorial.

Those who wish, may leave their memorial item or prayer request to remain on the altar for our celebrations this weekend. Others may wish to bring their memorial item back home after the service. We will also have prayer intention cards available in the church for your memorial to be recorded and left at the altar of The Lord.
