Dear fellow parishioners, today the Gospel is the “Annunciation”. We sometimes don’t “get” the implications from Mary’s “yes” because we focus on the holiness of the response and our salvation that came from her answer to the angel. The stigma of an unwed pregnancy is much less today. The Lord, Himself, tells us not to judge, lest we be judged the same way... and to love the sinner yet hate the sin.

These two approaches to others was something new with Jesus – think “Let the one without sin cast the first stone” as well as His times of forgiving sinners and telling everyone to forgive from their hearts. Mary’s pregnancy was a terrible scandal and she all alone had to tell her parents, Joseph and the entire village would know especially when she started to show. While Mary’s pregnancy was miraculous, still how much strength was needed to disclose the news. I have not pondered much on Joachim and Anne’s response, even though they were very loving, I still think it would have been difficult to accept such news and they knew the implications that would be part of the pregnancy including that Mary could have been stoned to death; it was the law.

Then she had to tell Joseph, I have pondered that more often. I think she may have told him just before visiting Elizabeth. I think he needed the time to ponder and reflect on the realities of what she told him. Mary needed support and Elizabeth, an older and wiser woman who was who was barren (also considered a scandal). Elizabeth herself went into seclusion during her pregnancy to avoid the wagging tongues of her village. I think these two women commiserated on their scandals – one “too old” and one “not married”. There had to be a lot of prayer and realities discussed between them so that Mary could return and face Joseph, the community and her possible fates. Remember, she did not know what Joseph would do. How hard that would have been for her.

Joseph had his own dilemmas regarding the situation, even with angelic dreams and guidance, to accept “another man’s child” regardless of Him being God’s Son or not. He had to deal with community judgment as much as Mary did. We don’t know exactly of when the angel came to him the first dream, but I think it might have been while she was away so when she returned, so he might take her into his home and maybe lessen the “obvious” scandal. A bit of humor: I had a friend who said she got pregnant on her honeymoon her mother said “mmm-hmmm”. On her nine-month anniversary, her mother told her she could have the baby any time now... she did, within a week – scandal diffused.

What difficulties follow you this holy season? Ask Elizabeth and the Holy Family for their grace. They had a lot with which to deal with as well and can commiserate with us.

Let us pray for each other. Know that you are in mine always.


