Dear fellow parishioners,

We are in a new year and beginning the first season of Ordinary Time. I said last week that during the month of January, I am going to bring to you the Prefaces and Prayers particular to the Eucharistic Prayers for Various Needs of which there are four. I used them during Advent this past year they touched my heart and spirit. I hope the words may be a personal prayer for you as well. Last week, I gave Prayer I;

today's is II: God Guides His Church Along the Way of Salvation.

...[Y]ou never forsake the works of your wisdom, but by your providence are even now at work in our midst. With mighty hand and outstretched arm, you led your people Israel through the desert. Now, as your Church makes her pilgrim journey in the world, you always accompany her by the power of the Holy Spirit and lead her along the paths of time to the eternal joy of your Kingdom, through Christ our Lord.

And so, having called us to your table, Lord, confirm us in unity, so that, together with [Francis] our Pope and ... with ... [the whole Order of] Bishops, Priests and Deacons, and your entire people, as we walk your ways with faith and hope, we may strive to bring joy and trust into the world.

These last couple of phrases I particularly feel we need to emphasize. There is a great lack of joy and trust in our country and world. I am reminded of "Ghostbusters II" and how the negative energy of New York created a negatively charged "slime" that "grew" in reaction to the negative energy growing in New York. The slime affected the people which created more negative energy... a literally vicious circle which caused even more devastation. To counter the slime the "heroes" developed a positive alternative to battle the negativity. But to completely defeat the slime and "rebirth of a demonic entity" attitudes of New Yorkers had to be united in positivity ... and Lady Liberty as the US statement of hope, was chosen and marched through the streets.

We have something better than the Statue of Liberty – Our Lord, Himself, present in the Eucharist in our very selves. We need to be the symbol by our attitudes, words and actions especially in this negatively charged time in the world and country's history. Let the Lord's influence bring about your positive alternative. Let peace find you. Let God in – even if you already have... He can still fill a whole lot more so you can bring joy and trust, like a "re-born Ebeneezer Scrooge".

I ask that you keep me in prayer – I had to put my dog, Lilo, down this week. He had lost his quality of life and I couldn't let him continue to suffer, even silently. He was my very first dog and the first Preacher's Pup for me.

Let us pray for each other this week as we begin our Ordinary Time. Know that you are in mine always.

Catholic Pro-Life Events

The National Prayer Vigil for Life will take place from January 20-21 at the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington, D.C. The January 20 Opening Mass will begin at 5:30 p.m. and will be followed by a 7-8 p.m. Holy Hour for Life, concluding the evening portion of the Vigil program. Both the Mass and Holy Hour will be televised live by EWTN. The Closing Mass on January 21 will take place once again at the Basilica at 8 a.m. and will also be televised by EWTN.

The annual diocesan respect life Mass will be celebrated on the Feast of St Francis de Sales, patron of the diocese on Monday, January 24, at 10:30 a.m. in St. Joseph Cathedral. The Greater Columbus Right to Life annual Roe remembrance will be held at the Ohio Statehouse at noon following the Mass.

Human Life Protection Act: S.B. 123 – This legislation would ban most abortions in Ohio in the event that Roe v. Wade is overturned, and states are given the power to set abortion policy. This legislation applies felony penalties to abortionists but provides immunity to mothers.

Most of us do not remember our Baptism. We were just infants. At Baptism we become God's beloved sons and daughters. We pray that God will be pleased with us when our life's journey has ended. I love watching a Baptism during Mass, especially with little ones. It makes me think of what my own must have looked like. I do not know if I cried during mine. We are to serve one another. We are brothers and sisters of Christ Jesus. How awesome!

It was quite the experience going to Israel. We visited many sites that we read about in the Gospel readings, like the Sea of Galilee, seeing the place where Jesus was born, etc. The Sea of Galilee looked a little larger than Buckeye Lake, not what I had imagined it to look like. At the River Jordan, we renewed our Baptismal Vows. Some people who were getting baptized for the first time and were actually being immersed. They had a store where you could buy a white garment to put on. It was very moving to be in the footprints of where Jesus had walked. (No, we could not see the actual footprints, but we could actually see the places we had only read about.)

What reference point do you use when making decisions? Many times, impulse takes control and decisions are made based solely on emotion and desire. We all know that these types of decisions can often get us into trouble. When a person has a confident sense of who they are and a real understanding of what is important and of value, the likelihood of kneejerk impulsive choices diminishes. Baptism gives us what we need to make well informed and purposeful decisions. By this simple gesture, God claims us as His own and provides us with the identity and purpose we need to properly live life.

It is tremendously reassuring, when we truly embrace this revelation and realize that we no longer have to wonder about the purpose of our lives or struggle to find our way. The answer of who we are in God has been given to us. We no longer have to fumble around, trip over ourselves or walk aimlessly about. Issues surrounding the sacredness of life, the meaning of death, the protection of those most vulnerable, care for the weak and the poor, offering hospitality to those in search of a home, the purpose and proper place of work, how to create a just social order, caring for creation, and understanding our roles as heralds and stewards are just a few of the wonderful gifts baptism brings. When we make decisions based on things such as these core Gospel truths we really act as Christ himself, revealing to others the new creations that we are. This is how we live our baptism.

It is difficult to walk against the tide. Yet, that is precisely what baptism calls us to do. Although we are sinners, in need of mercy and far from perfection we are called to order our life and make decisions based upon the wisdom and guidance of Almighty God. He alone is the one who can claim us as His sons and daughters. Standing up for our principles will not make us popular. But who ever said Christianity is a popularity contest? Baptism calls us to stand up for that which goes against the grain of secularism. Standing in line with other sinners, we have our anchor to steady us in the tempests of life and God is very pleased. Forge ahead. There is nothing to fear.
