

PALM SUNDAY: Christ entered in triumph into his own city, to complete his work as our Messiah to suffer, to die, and to rise again. Let us ...follow him with lively faith. With palm in hand to honor the Lord as did the children of Jerusalem so long ago, we journey with the Lord through his Paschal Mystery – his Passion, death, and resurrection.

The point of this Sunday, popularly called *Palm Sunday* but actually named *Passion Sunday*, is precisely this: that we follow Christ with lively faith into the mystery of his death and resurrection. The enthusiasm of our procession with palms has led us in a matter of minutes to hear of the “Suffering Servant” who humbled himself to death, death on a cross, and the story of God giving Himself for our salvation. Yet, what we celebrate on this day and in this week, is not the entire story. The story is complete for us only when we truly listen to it, and commit ourselves to living it daily. “United with Christ in his suffering on the cross, may we be united with him in his resurrection and new life.”

STEWARDSHIP OF DONKEYS AND SUCH: We read this Sunday that Jesus sent two disciples into town to untie someone’s donkey and bring it to him. Was Jesus telling them to steal the animal, or was he, as God, merely claiming what was his already? When someone challenges the disciples, they offer little explanation other than: “The Master has need of it and will send it back at once.” That suffices, and no one objects further. If this were your donkey – or car or money or time or any other possession, how would you respond to the explanation: “The Master has need of it”? This is the challenge of stewardship. Do we recognize that all that we steward belongs to God, and do we steward it as such? What is Jesus asking of you today?

3 WOMEN WHO CHOSE LIFE

Faith & Justice Magazine – February 2021

For women and girls facing an unwanted pregnancy, abortion may seem like the only solution. I can't afford to raise a child. I'm too young. I'll have to drop out of school. My family and friends will judge me.

Since Roe V. Wade was decided in 1973, over 57 million babies have been denied the right to life, their mothers choosing what may have seemed like an easy and logical solution. But, thanks in part to a growing number of pro-life ministries and resources, more and more women are pursuing other options. They are recognizing that their unborn child is, in fact, a precious person who deserves to live.

Read the stories of three young women (Eva, Ruth and Rebekah) who faced what was, for them, unthinkable – and made the courageous decision to choose life for their babies. This week we hear Eva's story.

EVA: As Eva Jurado and her sisters entered their teen years, their father delivered a solemn warning: "if any of you girls gets pregnant, we're done-you're gone." That was Eva's consuming thought when she found out she was pregnant at age 16. "My initial instinct was to hide it from my family," she says. She remembered a small building she often passed while walking through her Glendale, Arizona, neighborhood: Crisis Pregnancy Center. Maybe the people there could help. Walking into the center, she was greeted by a warm and welcoming advocate. The woman was sympathetic to her situation, asking questions, "making me feel like I was more than just a kid that made a dumb mistake." But Eva left with no intention of returning, and a gnawing question remained: should she have the baby, or not? The advocate didn't give up. She called the next evening, inviting Eva to return for a free ultrasound. Eva agreed... and that's when everything changed. "I just remember seeing a baby on the screen, and his arms were moving, his legs were kicking," she says. "In that moment, I knew that it was another person. It wasn't just about me anymore." She knew then that she would keep her child. But it took her a week to work up the courage to tell her parents. "One morning I called my mother into my room. I simply handed her the ultrasound pictures. She cried and left to get my dad." Eva hurried out of the house, certain she was about to be kicked out. That night she called her boyfriend, Frank, told him where she was, and asked him to pick her up. "Instead, my parents ended up driving up," she says. "I stared in disbelief as I watched my dad come out of the car. He simply put his arms around me and told me he loved me." Frankie Jr. was born that summer. "This little boy brought so much joy to everyone's life," Eva says. "It's just so unbelievable to me now that I would ever consider anything other than life for him." Frank and Eva married a year later. Frank joined the Coast Guard, and Eva earned a degree in radiologic technology, following a longtime goal to pursue a career in medicine. The couple had two more children. Today, 20 years later, Frankie Jr. is a college student and a pro-life advocate. "He loves to speak out against abortion," Eva says. She is an advocate herself, volunteering at the ministry (now named Choices Pregnancy Center) that offered her much needed support as a teen. One day a week, she counsels women and performs ultrasounds-sometimes for young girls who are "the spitting image of my story," she says. "That's the heartbeat," she tells one teen girl, pointing to movement on the screen. She sees the girls face change, and remembers how powerful an image like this was when she faced her own unplanned pregnancy. "That's where I felt my eyes and heart were opened," she says. "It's really cool."

Holy Week is upon us. We start with **Palm Sunday**. Jesus was welcomed with the acclamation, "Hosanna" - a word referring to the one who has come to save Israel. The people lined the streets and laid palm branches and even their own cloaks to create a makeshift carpet for the Messiah.

Of course it all changes within five days. How fickle is the human heart.

Here is the schema of the coming week:

Wednesday of this week is sometimes called **Spy Wednesday** because it is believed this is the day when Judas made the final arrangements to betray Jesus.

Holy Thursday 7:00 pm On this night, Jesus offered Holy Mass for the first time. He also ordained the apostles. The Church received her first priests. After the Last Supper, Jesus and the apostles went to the garden of Gethsemane. Here he prayed most ardently. Then Judas arrived with the soldiers and betrayed Jesus with a kiss - a friendly greeting used to conceal a wicked act. This is the way satan operates.. He disguises something evil as if it were a good.

Good Friday 3:00pm On this day we contemplate the last three hours of Jesus' life. There are many phrases which are worth remembering. He spoke seven times while He was on the cross. These phrases are sometimes called the seven last words of Jesus. St. Theresa of Kolkota was especially moved by his cry, "I Thirst." And not to be forgotten is his promise to the good thief, "Surely, this day you will be with me in paradise." Ven Fulton Sheen called him the thief who stole heaven.

Holy Saturday 8:30pm On this night we are like the closest followers of Jesus wondering what would come next after the crucifixion. We comfort ourselves with beautiful readings from scripture and accompanying psalms. Please pray for all of those throughout the world who will be joining the Church this evening.

Please pray especially for our own converts as they begin their Catholic lives this night: Nora Hageman, Harmony Boise, and Jeffery Hughes.

Easter Sunday This is the greatest feast day of the year for Christians. Jesus kept his promise of rising from the dead. And if he kept this promise, then He will keep his other ones as well such as "He who eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life, and I will raise him up on the last day." John 6:54



Many struggle with Jesus. Some who consider themselves faithful hail him in their churches but still struggle to figure out what to do with him on our streets. The message is somehow more palatable when it echoes pious renderings and sentiments and involves singing hosannas during worship. It becomes a bit trickier when it gets to the part about changing the way we conduct the business of our lives, becoming more sensitive to the disadvantaged, poor, and marginalized, and living as servants of our Loving Creator. Ultimately, it is a struggle between wanting to be God ourselves and letting God be God as God is. That's why it's so easy to become hypocritical. We, like those who hailed Christ as he arrived in Jerusalem and sent Christ to the cross to die, also talk out of both sides of our mouths. We entertain what suits us at the time and walk away from the rest.

Many neglect God's beautiful creation because they prefer what humans have made instead. Progress isn't seen in preserving and enhancing what God has made but replacing it with something we believe is better and more useful. The earth, flowers, and animals are all expendable if they stand in the way of the "more"

we want to achieve. We seek to remove as many obstacles and hurdles as possible in search of the easiest, quickest, and most efficient path we can find. We have created drugs and laws that preserve our free choice, even though it may mean setting aside God's vision and example. Why suffer when we can easily be put to rest? Why endure insult or injury when we can retaliate, eliminate or subdue? Why accept life when it is acceptable to choose otherwise? We want to be God and resist accepting the fact that our real Creator has already given us the blueprints for the life we need to live in the Beatitudes and in the example of his Passion. We don't like being stewards and managers and really want the power to do as we wish and desire. We want to create our own way.

Where has the true, effective Christian voice been through all of the wars and violence, prejudice and unjust conquests, abuse of human beings and attempted extinctions of nationalities, the establishments of procedures and protocols that serve only a few and not the many and all of the injustices and exploitations that are a part of our human history? A few courageous prophets have stood up and out throughout all of the comings and goings of our human journey with many receiving the same fate as the Crucified One we hail this week. Some still walk among us as shining stars showing us how it really can be. How would Jesus' journey have ended if he lived life as we do? Unless we encounter the good with the bad, the just with the unjust, the grace with the sin, the glory with the cross, the death with the life we most certainly risk rendering God obsolete. After all, haven't we already convinced ourselves that we can do better?


