



Answer: We prefer the term, "Providence," which refers to God's governance of the universe. God did not set up the world and





THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

The Lord be with you! As we continue discussing confession as it relates to the sacrament, we need to differentiate the beginning of sorrow from its mature form. When we are sorrowful for our sins because of love of God, we have begun to forget ourselves in the best sense of Christian freedom.

Question 785. Which are the chief qualities of a good Confession?

Answer. The chief qualities of a good Confession are three: it must be humble, sincere, and entire.

Question 786. When is our Confession humble?

Answer. Our Confession is humble when we accuse ourselves of our sins, with a deep sense of shame and sorrow for having offended God.

Question 787. When is our Confession sincere?

A. Our Confession is sincere when we tell our sins honestly and truthfully, neither exaggerating nor excusing them.

Question 788. Why is it wrong to accuse ourselves of sins we have not committed?

Answer. It is wrong to accuse ourselves of sins we have not committed, because, by our so doing, the priest cannot know the true state of our souls, as he must do before giving us absolution.

My commentary.

Starting with Question 786, we need to acknowledge that shame is essentially social. We feel shame when others look down upon us as unworthy of their respect. God never shames us because He always sees in us both the goodness of our being and the goodness that can be ours through grace - in other words, He sees His Son in us. Shame is not the same as regret, which is our desire to have done something differently and is consequently internal.

Unfortunately, it seems that the *Baltimore Catechism* has conflated shame with regret. It is actually unhelpful to be embarrassed by our sins because it means that we have a distorted conception of ourselves. Do not misunderstand: we should not be happy about committing sins. When we sin in an extremely grievous manner that we have not done before, great regret would only be natural. To feel like God has rejected us - which is what shame would do - is actually wrong and contrary to our religion. God never turns away from us; we turn away from Him.

The more our sorrow comes from our love of God, however, the less it is about ourselves. Paradoxically, in this moment of confronting what we have done wrong, we learn that to God sin is an evil to be obliterated from space and time. When He forgives a sin, it ceases to have existed for Him. The sins consequences remain but it does not. We imitate God by forgetting what we have done as something that defines us and instead long to possess and share the love of God.

Our last two questions remain a concern even today but not in the way one might imagine. Today's problem is people confessing sins committed against them. As any priest today has experienced, many penitents have become very good at over explaining why they have sinned. In their desire to give proper context to what happened, they accidentally begin to list all the wrongs that they have suffered. This practice actually makes it more difficult for the priest, who has to figure out where the sins begin and end. It does not usually matter why you got mad - traffic, the Browns, a family member - what matters was the sin of anger.

True humility consists in seeing ourselves honestly and still loving ourselves as God would have us. Pretending to be better or worse than we are only makes the changes we need to make more difficult. When we confess our sins honestly and without sincerely, we discover the freedom that God wants us to have both now and for all eternity.
