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THE HYPOSTATIC UNION AND THE QUALITY OF "MERCY"

To use an analogy from chemistry, mercy is a "compound" concept. It has its origin only from God. It can be exercised by human beings EXCLUSIVELY as a condition of the heart of one who believes in God. Divine Mercy is "benevolence" straight from God and it originates only from God. If a person has no concept of God, he or she cannot exhibit genuine "mercy."

Compassion is a human emotional quality that allows one to feel what the other must be feeling, and thus I have empathy for the other guy. Theoretically, an atheist can feel compassion and even act on it. But the most sincere compassion we have ever felt is only one element in the equation of "mercy." Now it is true that we owe our very existence to God the Creator, and thus we can say "compassion" also comes from God. Nevertheless, compassion is a distinctly human characteristic.

Forgiveness (the other element of the compound) originates only from God. The essence of forgiveness is "lenience to the guilty." All forgiveness has its origin in God. True forgiveness is revealed to us only in Jesus Christ. Many religions of the world have no concept of (or word for) "forgiveness." For us, Jesus Christ is the revelation of divine forgiveness.

The teaching of the Church regarding Jesus Christ, the Son of God (Divine) and the Son of Man (human messiah), is what theologians refer to as the "hypostatic union;" namely that Jesus is fully human and fully divine. This is why we pray the chaplet of Divine Mercy before an image of Jesus with red (blood) and white (water) rays projecting from his wounded side. True mercy originates in Jesus Christ. Because he is fully human and fully divine, Jesus combines human compassion with divine forgiveness and becomes the revelation of Divine Mercy. Thus because we receive the body and blood, soul and divinity of Jesus Christ in the mystery of the Sacrament of the Most Holy Eucharist, we are not only the recipients of Divine Mercy; but we become the transmitters of Divine Mercy in spiritual and corporal works of mercy. We both receive and transmit Jesus Christ who is the revelation of Divine Mercy.

Do you agree with me that societal reference to the very term "mercy" has become rare in our contemporary society? Why is this? What has been lost or is missing? For me, the simple answer is God! Secular humanism has told us that we can experience the human emotion of "compassion," and such human feelings can inspire us to moments when we exhibit charity. Why? Because charity sometimes feels good! If feeling good is the goal in life, one can easily abandon all reason and logic in favor of hedonistic indulgence. Take God out of the equation and before long you have a world of people exhibiting charity whenever it satisfies the human emotional need. It is not motivated by virtue, but rather is an investment in emotional completeness.

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Secular humanism's attempt to substitute human compassion for Divine Mercy is like comparing a coin made from a chunk of brass to a 24 k gold coin. They appear to be similar, but that is where the comparison ends.

If one has never whispered the prayer, "Lord have mercy on me a sinner;" the subject person has never experienced humility that comes from having received "Divine Mercy." There is no substitute or alternative element that will make the equation work without the divine; just as there is no substitute for genuine mercy. You can't make coffee without the beans. You can't find real "mercy" without the Son of God, Jesus Christ.

What is Sin and What Do I Do About It? (Part 2)

Sin is Failing to Love

In the previous article, we examined the desired relationship between God and humanity: "I will be their God and they shall be my people." We found that sin fractures, and can even break, this relationship. The question for us in this article is: What is Sin? We will look at concepts of sin in both the Old and New Covenants.

1. What is a Covenant?

Let us first understand the word "covenant" and what it implies. There is an "Old" Covenant (which pertained to the Jewish people living before the birth of Christ), to which we as Christians *are not* obligated (Hebrews 8:13; 10:9b). There is a "New" Covenant, to which we, as baptized persons, *are* obligated. A covenant, in its most basic form has two parts: God makes a promise to a person or a people, and requires that person or people to obey certain laws or principles if that promise is to be fulfilled.

There are several ways to draw contrasts between the two Covenants:

- 1) The Old Covenant is represented by the Old Testament (Genesis – Malachi), and especially by the 10 Commandments as God delivered them to the Israelites through Moses. The sacrificial system of the Temple with its priests (found in Leviticus) was central to the Old Covenant. The New Covenant is represented by the New Testament (Matthew – Revelation), and especially by the Sermon on the Mount which Jesus spoke to the Church. The celebration of the Eucharist and the other six Sacraments is central to the New Covenant.
- 2) The Old Covenant looked forward to the coming of the Messiah and prophesied of him. The New Covenant is a relationship between the Church and Jesus Christ, the Messiah, and the Son of God, who has come.
- 3) One became a member of the Old Covenant by circumcision; one becomes a member of the New Covenant through the Sacrament of Baptism. The Old Covenant was enacted through sacrifice: "Gather my loyal ones to me, those who made a covenant with me by sacrifice" (Psalm 50:5). The New Covenant is enacted through the Death of Jesus Christ, the Sacrifice we celebrate, re-enact, and participate in through the Mass.

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2. Sin in the Old and New Covenants

In a very simplified way, sin according to the Old Covenant is a breaking of the Law, particularly the 10 Commandments (Exodus 20; Deuteronomy 5), but the Law extends far beyond this simple Code, as the end of book of Leviticus testifies to: "These are the statutes, decrees, and laws which the Lord established between himself and the Israelites through Moses on Mount Sinai" (Lev 26:46, see also 27:34). *The Catechism of the Catholic Church* has a rather long section devoted to the 10 Commandments and how the principles contained in them *still apply* to Christians, even though we are not under the Covenant of Moses (CCC, 2052 – 2550).

According to the New Covenant, Christians are filled with the Holy Spirit (Acts 2:4; 4:31), who enables them to walk in the way of Christ. The Beatitudes are a primary source of understanding this Way (Matthew 5:1-12): "They express the vocation of the faithful;...they shed light on the actions and attitudes characteristic of the Christian life; they are the paradoxical promises that sustain hope...; they proclaim the blessings and the rewards already secured...for Christ's disciples" (CCC, 1717). To sin, by New Covenant standards, is to fail to live by these Beatitudes.

There are other sources that express the life of the Christian as well. St. Paul said in the Letter to the Galatians, "Live by the Spirit and you will certainly not gratify the desire of the flesh... if you are guided by the Spirit, *you are not under the law* [the Old Covenant]... the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control...If we live by the Spirit, let us also follow the Spirit" (5:16, 18, 22-23, 25). To sin, according to the New Covenant, is to fail to live by the Spirit and bear forth these fruits.

Also, St. Peter tells us to "make every effort to supplement your faith with virtue, virtue with knowledge, knowledge with self-control, self-control with endurance, endurance with devotion, devotion with mutual affection, and mutual affection with love. If these are yours and increase in abundance, they will keep you from being idle or unfruitful... Anyone who lacks them is blind and shortsighted, forgetful of the cleansing of his past sins" (2 Peter 1:5-10). New Covenant living begins with faith in Christ and is to "increase in abundance." To sin, according to the New Covenant, is to fail to live by faith.

Christ, himself, when asked what the greatest commandment was, answered thus: "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind.' This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: 'Love your neighbor as yourself.' All the Law and the Prophets hang on these two commandments" (Matthew 22:37-40) – Love.

One may ask, what *is* love? St. Paul tells us in 1 Corinthians 13:4-8a, "Love is patient, love is kind. It is not jealous, love is not pompous, it is not inflated, it is not rude, it does not seek its own interests, it is not quick-tempered, it does not brood over injury, it does not rejoice over wrongdoing but rejoices in the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never fails."

As New Covenant people we are not under the Old Covenant Law. We are under a New Covenant of Grace - grace that empowers us by the Holy Spirit to love. We are not under *a set of rules*, but we are *inwardly motivated* by the Spirit to love. Love cannot be reduced to a set of rules. Rules are for children, training us and eventually leading us to living principles, which are for the mature (Galatians 4:1-7).

Sin, for New Covenant Christians, is failing to enact the Beatitudes in our lives, failing to demonstrate the fruits of the Spirit, and failing to "make every effort" to "increase in abundance" faith, knowledge, virtue, and devotion. In short, *sin is failing to Love*.

Giving Thanks to Those Who Give

As we enter the "giving season," the Society of St. Vincent de Paul for the Sacred Heart / St. Ann Pastoral Region wants to thank our generous contributors.

In the first six months of the global coronavirus pandemic (April-September), your St. Vincent DePaul provided more than \$35,000 in assistance to 291 people in or near Fairfield, Lindenwald and Fairfield Township. We were able to do this thanks to the amazing generosity of parishioners, including several families who contributed \$1,200 after receiving their government stimulus checks in the spring.

Half of our assistance in this six-month period was given for emergency housing payments (\$17,296). We also provided nearly \$11,000 to help 33 families struggling to pay overdue utility bills. And we gave 47 families nearly \$5,000 in gift cards to buy food/medicine/gas/school supplies.

We could do all of this because of you. Every dollar we receive from Sacred Heart and St. Ann parishioners is given to our neighbors in need. We don't get funding from the Cincinnati office which advertises on TV and radio.

Our final fifth Sunday collection of this year is Thanksgiving weekend, Nov. 28-29. However, donations can be made at any time by mailing contributions to the parish office in care of St. Vincent De Paul, or by putting a clearly marked envelope into the Sunday collection basket.

Thanks for your continued generous support, both through donations and prayers, which enables us to make a big impact on your desperate neighbors with big needs in these difficult times.
