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IN MY OPINION.....!

“Recently, someone asked me if (as a Catholic Priest) I would consider “conscience” to be the same as “personal opinion?” I responded in the negative. I indicated that my personal opinion is usually based on my individual feelings. Feelings are subject to alteration or change if confronted with previously unconsidered evidence. I may hold a personal opinion that is inconsistent with Aristotelian or contemporary symbolic logic. An opinion is an arbitrary confluence of emotions resulting in articulation of that which conforms to my personal preference. To paraphrase the Old Testament prophet Isaiah, “*Opinions* are like grass...they wither and wilt.” This is why today’s nihilists cite the mantra “one opinion is as good as another.”

Conscience is seeking to understand the mind and the will of God. Conscience must be based on a “higher power” lest it be categorized as nothing more than an emotional deficiency or logical indecisiveness. Catholic moral teaching requires each of us to possess and maintain a “well-formed conscience.” To be “well formed,” I must hear the teachings of Jesus Christ as articulated in sacred scripture and qualified Catholic theologians. I must seek to understand the moral teachings of the Bible and the directions of the Church’s magisterial authority. A well-formed conscience **never** says, “I have my mind made up. Don’t bother me with facts.”

Similarly, a well formed conscience is always flexible enough to seek out the immutable truth which may be hidden behind transitory preference. For example, in the 1960s I thought narrow ties and lapels; and pointed shoes were the ultimate fashion statement, and so I saved them in my cupboard. I saved these together with my flat-top hair stick and white dress socks. Fashion is collective opinion. Opinions change! Truth is immutable. Truth comes from God.

So how do we root through the “opinions” on the editorial page of the newspaper, the evening news, and the (Heaven help us) social media. Well, we must validate truth by comparing it to the Decalogue, the teachings of Christ, and the magisterial teachings of the Church. I was once confronted by a person who said, “I hear you Catholics have dropped some of the ten commandments.” I responded, “Who says so?” He shouted, “My neighbor used to be a Catholic, and he said it was true.” If you find a solid gold ring in your box of Cracker-Jack, you may discover the ring is plastic. Credibility must be founded on an unassailable foundation. Without God, there is no unassailable credibility.

To be a person of conscience, we must live the moral code we profess. Favoring God’s will with our mouths is no substitute for living God’s will in our daily lives. Therefore conscience must be perpetually instructed and practiced; not just proclaimed. This is real integrity.

What is Sin and What Do I Do About It? (Part 7)

The Study of the Scriptures during an Examination of Conscience

In Part 4 of this series, “An Examination of Conscience,” we looked at a passage of Scripture from Matthew’s Gospel about a “young man” who approached Jesus and asked, “What good must I do to gain eternal life?” (19:16). Jesus’s answer was, “Keep the Commandments” (19:17). Jesus pointed the “young man” to the Scriptures. In Part 5 of this series, “Prayer, Study, Obtaining Counsel, and Examination of Conscience,” I mentioned three actions that should be a part of any examination of conscience: prayer, study of the Scriptures, and obtaining the counsel of trusted and competent Church leaders.

In this article I will focus on how the reading and study of Scripture should play an important role in any examination of conscience. The *Catechism* has quite a bit to say about Divine Revelation (¶51-141). We begin by understanding that “it pleased God, in his goodness and wisdom, to reveal himself and to make known the mystery of his will” (¶51).

God reveals himself through Jesus Christ, the Word of God (John 1:1-18), and Christ is revealed by the Holy Spirit who spoke through the “prophets and apostles” (Ephesians 2:20). “Christ, the Son of God made man, is the Father’s one, perfect, and unsurpassable Word. In him he has said everything; there will be no other word than this one” (*Catechism* ¶65). “In times past, God spoke in partial and various ways to our ancestors through the prophets; in these last days, he spoke to us through a Son” (Hebrews 1:1-2).

What was it that God said through Jesus, his Word and his Son? “The Father’s *self-communication* [is] made through his Word in the Holy Spirit” (*Catechism* ¶79; italics mine). Therefore, the Father *speaks about himself* through the words and actions of Jesus Christ. In John 14, the Apostle Philip and Jesus have a conversation about the Father. Jesus says, “No one comes to the Father except through me. If you know me, then you will also know my Father” (14:6-7). Philip then says, “Master, show us the Father, and that will be enough” (14:8). Jesus replies to Philip, “Whoever has seen me has seen the Father. How can you say, ‘Show us the Father?’...The Father who dwells in me is doing his works” (14:9, 10). In other words, we know God the Father through Jesus Christ, the Son. Jesus “is the image of the invisible God” (Colossians 1:15; see also 2 Corinthians 4:4). Therefore, in addition to encountering Jesus in the Eucharist, we also encounter him through the testimony and teaching of the Apostles which is recorded in the New Testament.

As we examine our conscience to understand God’s will for our lives, we reflect upon the Word of God, the Scriptures, and especially the New Testament. In the writings of the Evangelists and the Letters of the Apostles, we come to better understand Jesus Christ, who is the pattern for our lives. Because Jesus is our example, he consistently called people to “follow” him (Matthew 8:22, 9:9, 10:38, 16:24, 19:21, Mark 1:20, 2:14, 10:21, Luke 5:27, 9:23, 9:59, 18:22, John 1:43, 8:12, 12:26).

It is through the New Testament that we see how Jesus lived and understand the example he set for us. This is why St. Jerome could say, “Ignorance of the Scriptures is ignorance of Christ” (Office of Readings, September 30). Christ says of himself, “I am the way” (John 14:6). Therefore, we are to “follow” Christ by living as he lived. “If we say, ‘We have fellowship with him,’ while we continue to walk in darkness, we lie and do not act in truth. But if we walk in the light as he is in the light, then we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of his Son Jesus cleanses us from all sin” (1 John 1:6-7). “We walk...as he” walked.

When reading the New Testament to gain a better understanding of the way Christ would have us walk, the writings of the Evangelists take pride of place. Through the Gospels according to Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John we have a privileged view of the life of Christ. “There is no doctrine which could be better, more precious and more splendid than the text of the Gospel. Behold and retain what our Lord and Master, Christ, has taught by his words and accomplished by his deeds” (*Catechism* ¶127). “The four Gospels occupy a central place because Christ Jesus is their center” (¶139).

As we read through the New Testament books, there are several sections that may tend to stand out, directly speaking about how we should live. Christ’s “Sermon on the Mount” (Matthew 5-7) is a familiar passage. Jesus says in 5:16, “Your light must shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your heavenly Father.” In this instance, the “light” that

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“others” should see is our “deeds,” but also our attitudes. In fact, the Beatitudes (5:1-12) are often referred to as the “*be attitudes*.” As we read through these “attitudes,” we can judge ourselves as to whether or not we measure up. St. Paul says, “If we judged ourselves, we would not be under judgment” (1 Corinthians 11:31, RSV-CE).

According to the Beatitudes we are to be “meek,” hungry and thirsty “for righteousness,” “merciful,” “pure in heart,” and “peacemakers.” As we examine our conscience, how do we compare to this vision of a Christian?

Another excellent passage of Scripture to use during an examination of conscience is 1 Corinthians 13:4-8. Here, St. Paul defines love by saying, “love is patient...kind...not jealous...not pompous...not inflated...not rude...not self-seeking...not quick-tempered...does not brood over injuries ... [and] bears all things. Love never fails.” Again, we can assess our lives in comparison with these verses and ask ourselves, “Do I love like this?” “Do I demonstrate this sort of love toward others?” Jesus, after all, has said that “the greatest commandment” is “love” (Matthew 22:36-40).

Another passage of Scripture that is excellent to use during an examination of conscience is Galatians 5:19-23. In this passage, St. Paul lists “the works of the flesh” (sins) to avoid and the “fruit of the Spirit” (virtues) that should be growing in our lives. Among the sins that should be avoided in 5:19-21, he mentions immorality, idolatry, hatred, selfishness, drinking bouts, and jealousy. “In contrast, the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control” (5:22-23).

We must always keep in mind that it is *not* the Holy Spirit’s role to make us feel guilty or depressed if we do not measure up to these visions of the Christian life. (That’s actually what *the devil* does.) It is the Holy Spirit’s intention to lead us into *changes*, over time, which will produce these fruits in our lives. Sometimes people quit allowing the Holy Spirit to change them. Change is demanding. People often get stuck at a certain place in their spiritual growth and cannot seem to move past that point. This can create a lingering sense of failure and can even cause people to give up on transformative spiritual experiences altogether.

However, God is patient with us and the Spirit is constantly at work in us. The Spirit is always present to us. There is a “handle” always held out to us which we can grab hold of and allow the Holy Spirit the opportunity to pull us along through the changes he wishes to produce in us. A fresh beginning is always held out to us. This is the wonder of God’s love. There is always hope and help. It is as close as the air we breathe.

“How I love your law, Lord! I study it all day long... Your word is a lamp for my feet, a light for my path” (Psalm 119:97, 105).

PARISH REGIONAL REP CLASSES GRADES 1-8

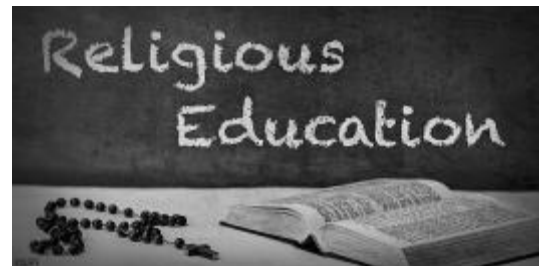

When you receive this publication, I will have been in my position approximately three months. Let me take this opportunity to introduce myself to you. I grew up in Cincinnati attending our local Catholic schools, Assumption Elementary and McAuley High School. I continued my education at Miami University for B.S. in education, Wright State University for my M.Ed., and Xavier University for my principal licensure. My husband and I have been blessed to raise two daughters who also attended local Catholic schools. The foundation they received in their faith tradition as well as the rigorous curriculum are hallmarks of our Archdiocesan education.

During my twenty-five years in Catholic education, I have had opportunities to serve as a teacher in an elementary school and as a teacher and Assistant Principal in two high schools. These past experiences have shaped the educator and person I am today.
