The purpose for the title of this article is not to sensationalize or shock. Typing the aforementioned title into almost any internet browser will result in an overabundance of opinions. Some gleefully offer affirmation of the theory or premise. Some suggest the contrary and find much reason for optimism. Still others tearfully accept the question itself as an obituary. My purpose in this article is not to suggest that I have some personal magical clairvoyance or any hierarchical authority of any kind, but simply to weigh in on the issue with my "two cents."

Let me begin by framing the question in its contemporary context, for the posing of the question is as old as Christianity itself. When we talk about the "Catholic Church" most commentators think only in secular terms of the legal institution. They want to know if the corporate legal and financial entity (colloquially known as the Catholic Church) with its franchisees is declining." Believers tend to hear the title of this article not so much as a question, but more as an indictment. As we all know however, the "Catholic Church" is comprised of twenty-four rites including but not limited to the Roman Rite, all in union with the Roman Pontiff and practicing the same seven sacraments. The Catechism taught us that there are three attributes of the Church; authority, infallibility, and indefectibility. The last means that our faith in Jesus Christ assures us that the Church cannot be killed or done away with. I believe with all my heart and soul that the Church is now and will always be guided by the Holy Spirit. Therefore, I can assure you with the certitude of the inspiration of the Holy Spirit; the Church is now, and will not be "dying."

But let's be realistic and admit that any atheist will scoff at the aforementioned reasoning; as well as any syllogism contingent upon "faith." So do we question our faith and give up trying to convince ourselves that the Church we love is not dying? Of course not! Rather, we look at those writing the Church's epitaph and pity them for accepting the "sensational" over the "probable." Since the postulation of Heisenberg's principle of indeterminacy in Quantum physics, science has told us that we cannot claim certainty; only probability. Owning the probability that there is a God, and the enormity of evidence pointing to the veracity of public opinion in Jesus time, communal faith in Jesus Christ is the only reasonable way to assure longevity. Thus the words of Gamaleil in Acts 5:35-39 remind us of the inescapable reality; "you cannot fight God and hope to win!" Therefore, we as followers of Christ in his Holy

Church, we see God's hand in the reality around us and we, the Church, are the witness to the reliability of the teaching. In other words, the very existence of the Church verifies the probability of its divine origin.

Critics will deny the aforementioned perspective with the retort that I am "wishing." But remember that wishing for a sure thing can be the genesis of "hope" and can lead us to accept the choice of practical faith.

Contemporary drug culture aside, human beings will typically choose reality over fantasy. How many people on the Titanic would trade their seat on a lifeboat for the fantasy of a "feel good" drug? When the catastrophic consequences of sin result in situations in which nothing makes sense anymore; be assured that humans will seek resolutions that have a high degree of probability. All of contemporary science, art, and technology, which seem to be most tangible in the unstable times in which we live, will fail to resolve cataclysmic misfortune. This is inevitable. Humanity, cast adrift in a sea of fantasy and the uncertainty of relativism, will seek resolution in the probable, the real; namely God. Suddenly, the idealistic cultural illusion will surrender to the reality that there is something big-ger than puny humanity. And what do you do when you are seeking sanity in the uncertainty of a mindboggling blizzard of disappointment? You go to Church!

So my syllogism becomes the following: Major premise: "Certainty is a philosophical impossibility in a relativistic world. Minor premise: There is enormous anecdotal evidence that a metaphysical reality beyond the purely tangible experiences in space and time as we know it is at least experientially "probable." Therefore, human beings are likely to continue to search for meaning in the midst of philosophical chaos. Faith will bring them to the only answer possible....Jesus Christ.

### St. Vincent de Paul

#### Your St. Vincent de Paul Donations Make a Big Impact

You might wonder what happens after you toss some dollars or a check into the St. Vincent de Paul collection baskets four times a year. Well, those few dollars made a big impact for Fairfield, Lindenwald and Fairfield Township residents in need in 2021.

The St. Vincent de Paul Society serving the Sacred Heart-St. Ann Pastoral Region helped 370 families – some multiple times – during the past year.

It's been a busy year – thanks to your continued support through monetary donations and support. We provided utility assistance to 148 families, many facing an imminent cut-off. We helped pay rent, assisted homeless people and provided food. We handed out clothing vouchers worth a total value of \$2,225 made possible by the clothing donations to the St. Vincent de Paul bin in the Sacred Heart parking lot. In a two-week period in November before Thanksgiving we helped a record 39 families in 14 days.

Vincentians from Sacred Heart and St. Ann also distributed Communions; made wellness checks (in person or by phone); delivered coats from the Knights of Columbus Council 8115 Coats for Kids program and the Giving Tree gifts you purchased and wrapped.

Our next fifth Sunday of the month collection is Jan. 29-30. Every dollar you give to our St. Vincent de Paul goes to residents here in the Sacred Heart-St. Ann Pastoral Region. Donations also can be made at any time through the church office.
