Pastoral Scene

2nd Sunday in Advent 2020

The person of John the Baptist is featured this Sunday as he prepares the way for the promised one of Israel. A person quite different from Jesus but a person who is the “bridge” in bringing to the world the fulfillment of the promise found through the prophets. This week’s gospel presents the beginning of Jesus in his public ministry. It is a reminder of our own adult faith and commitment to the promised Messiah and that it deepened each year during our Advent journey to celebrating the birth of Christ.

The Virgin Mary and John the Baptist are two important figures of the Advent Season. They both exemplify qualities to be followed. Mary’s receptiveness to God’s grace as she pondered all which God had done in her life and John the Baptist who followed his call to prepare the way of the Lord. The qualities of contemplative prayer and seeking our true call in life are shown to us in these two holy people.

A very practical way of living this message is to be open to the guests who visit St. Monica Church during these days. It is true that this hospitality should be practiced all year long but particularly during the Advent and Christmas season. I have recently met people from out of State and from other countries who have found their way to our Church. They remarked about the church’s beauty both in the structure and in the people they encountered. May we continue to bring this beacon of light to all who enter this holy place.

Saturday, December 12, is the feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe. Our Lady appeared to a 57 year old Indian widower by the name of Juan Diego who lived in a small village near Mexico City. On a Saturday morning, December 9, 1531 Mary appeared to him and gave him a message for the Bishop. Three days later she appeared again this time providing him roses to be put in his cape or *tilma*. Returning to the Bishop he opened his cape and behold, not only the roses, but an image of Mary dressed in traditional Indian dress.

Because of the close link between the Church in Mexico and the Church in the United States, the feast is celebrated as she is called today: the Patroness of the Americas. She is depicted as a woman with child, she is a reminder of respecting life in all its stages. This important focus fits into our celebration of God’s life in us and the Holy Season of Advent in which we journey.


Nine Months with Christ in the Womb Reflection for Week 38



Year-End Giving

As you plan to make the most of your charitable donations in 2020, know that we gratefully accept gifts of cash and appreciated assets such as stocks or bonds. ***Even if you don't itemize your taxes, because of the new stimulus package passed by Congress, qualified charitable donations up to \$300 for individuals may be tax-deductible.*** The CARES Act legislation also temporarily suspended the limitation on qualified charitable contributions of cash, allowing for a current year deduction (for those who itemize) up to 100% of AGI. **This provision is in effect only for the 2020 tax year.** And, if you are 70 1/2 or older, you may be able to make a gift of a Qualified Charitable Distribution from your IRA that will help us in our ministry and reduce your taxable income. Talk to your advisors and IRA administrator for more information and to be sure that your IRA Qualified Charitable Distribution gift is made directly from an IRA to a qualified charity such as our parish.

Where Does God Fit In?

During the past sixty years, a system of thought has been gaining ground called "Relativism". This philosophy promotes the idea that we cannot know anything for certain, and that all knowledge is relative to the individual person who proclaims it. There is no such thing as "Absolute Truth".

Under relativism a person, or even a whole society, can believe whatever they want to believe. Our belief system then becomes dependent upon whoever has the forum at the time, because nothing is for certain.

This philosophy has even gained ground in our religious and moral ideals. Those who promote this way of thinking say that we, as a society, can determine what is right and what is wrong. We, as a society, can also change what we believe, according to the present circumstances in which we live. This has caused great harm to our way of life. Where does God fit in? Relativism ultimately leaves no room for God.

The existence of God is critical to our humanity. Since God does exist, then there must be some "ultimate truth" which we must look for if we want to live in this world. Some of this truth can be found in the natural law that God has instilled in our human hearts. We know consciously that life is important, and that it is wrong to murder another person, including the unborn. We know that it is wrong to tell a lie, to steal another person's property, or to be unfaithful in Marriage between a man and a woman. This truth can also be found in the Ten Commandments, and in Jesus' law of love. It can likewise be found in our Catholic Church when they teach what God has revealed. So ultimately "God does fit in". It is our job to look for Him.

Parish Communications

We are happy to announce that our Parish Office is now able to communicate via Constant Contact. This process will allow us to disseminate information in a more efficient and cost effective manner.

As a general rule, these communications will go out on Tuesday mornings. Because these are bulk emails, please be sure to check your junk or spam folders and adjust them accordingly.

Please know that your email address as well as any personal information will remain confidential. No information is divulged to a Third Party.

We would ask you to pass the word along to others in our parish family and encourage them to sign up with their email address as soon as possible. To sign up, simply go to our parish website (<http://saintmonicachurch.net>) and click on the Constant Contact sign up link. Increasing the number of people we have on board will make us continue to grow in our ability for efficient communications as well as create a positive impact to our parish finances.

Traditional mail takes about 2-4 days to be received. Constant Contact will allow you to receive information almost immediately. Using Constant Contact instead of traditional mail for large communications will create a savings of over 99% per communication. For example, on the average, sending a letter out to the entire parish costs about \$750 in postage. That same communication via Constant Contact will cost about \$7.50 - a savings of \$742.50 per mailing.

Moral Guidelines Regarding Vaccines and Covid – 19



With the prospect of the FDA approving one (or more) vaccines within the next few weeks, many questions have been raised regarding the ethical status of these vaccines, particularly questioning whether embryonic stem cells or tissue from aborted fetuses were used in their creation, and whether Catholics can morally receive such vaccines. The Diocese has released a document prepared by Fr. Koopman, a Moral Theologian from St. May Seminary. It is rather lengthy, and talks about the morality of vaccines in general, so we will print the final conclusion.

"In conclusion, at this point there appears to be no moral issues to prohibit a Catholic from receiving vaccines produced by Pfizer or Moderna. If other vaccines are released which do have recourse to material of illicit origin, Catholic moral teaching would direct Catholics to utilize the option that is least morally problematic (i.e., the vaccines that were not created via such immoral means). Providentially, these two listed vaccines satisfy that criteria."

Nine Months with Christ in the Womb

A home in our hearts and community

Relevant Scripture: Luke 2:6-7

With today's pregnancies, we often talk about a woman instinctively knowing she is about to deliver. The closer she gets to her time, it is said, she begins with nesting tendencies, doing cleaning tasks and fixing up the nursery, readying "her nest (home)" for the little one who is about to be born.

Scriptures don't tell us if Mary ever had those "nesting" instincts right before she gave birth to Jesus. We do know she was busy: Joseph was travelling with Mary, his betrothed, who was with child. (Lk 2:5) We also know that Mary wasn't at home, cleaning or fixing up a room. "... she gave birth to her firstborn son. She wrapped him in swaddling clothes and laid him in a manger, because there was no room for them in the inn." (Lk 2:7)

One detail of this marvelous birth, which later will make angels sing, shepherds visit and magi present gifts, goes almost unnoticed. This family is homeless. There was no room for them in the inn. That happens sometimes when you are traveling, you might be temporarily displaced, but home is always at the end of the journey. For Mary, Joseph and Jesus there was no immediate return home, instead they fled to Egypt to protect their son from a king crazed by jealousy who wanted to kill him.

We might not be aware of homelessness, but the Coalition on Homelessness and Housing in Ohio reported that people in families made up 38% of the total homeless population in 2013. The National Center on Family Homelessness tells us "One in 45 children experiences homelessness in America each year. That's over 1.6 million children. While homeless, they experience high rates of acute and chronic health problems. The constant barrage of stressful and traumatic experience also has profound effects on their development and ability to learn."

Who of us wouldn't have offered the spare bedroom to the Holy Family if we knew they were looking for a place to stay as they travelled through our town? Yet all families are holy, because each person is made in the image and likeness of God.

There are plenty of opportunities to help homeless families in every community. Homeless shelters can use your donations of money, goods and time to house families or to get them on their feet. Be a parish that cooks meals for the homeless shelter or offers a community meal. Help build a Habitat for Humanity home in Cincinnati and Dayton or a Catch the Building Spirit home in Dayton. Outfit a home for refugees resettled by Catholic Social Services of the Miami Valley in Dayton or by Catholic Charities Southwestern Ohio.

Throughout the next month, please keep homeless families locally and throughout the world in your prayers as you remember that Jesus, Mary and Joseph were also homeless. St. Augustine reminded us that we, too, are homeless on this journey to our eternal home. "Our heart is restless until it rests in you."

Dear Neighbors,

The rise in coronavirus infections is a serious reminder of this pandemic's strength and longevity. While many have expressed "COVID fatigue," unfortunately we can't wish away the infection.
