## Pastoral Scene

Dear Parishioners, Friends and Visitors,

The Church celebrates the Feast of the Epiphany or also called Theophany. The feast brings to completion the preparation began with the season of Advent. The liturgical prayers for the Mass of the day also contain references to two other manifestations or theophanies; namely the baptism of the Lord and the first miracle of Jesus at the marriage feast of Cana. The unfolding of redemption is presented through the events of Christ's life seeing as we celebrate, with solemn rite, the unfolding of God's love for his people. Through the visit of the Magi, Christ is seen as the light to all peoples. From the early times of the Church, the call to evangelize, that is, to spread the message of the Good News of Christ, the Son of God and the Son of Mary to the world, finds its beginning in the feast of the Epiphany.

The original celebration of the feast on January 6 is often referred to as "little Christmas." The tradition in the Western Church particularly in Eastern Europe is to bless incense and chalk which is taken to the homes of the faithful. The priest or head of the family then prays a blessing on the home, after which, he marks the top of the main door with the letters: **K+M+B+2020**. The letters refer to **K**asper **M**elchior and **B**althasar, the traditional names given to the Magi. In many parts of the world, today is the day of gift giving.

In the Eastern Christian Church the feast is celebrated as one feast with the Baptism of the Lord which for us in the West will be celebrated next Sunday. The focus on the Baptism of the Lord has placed in their Liturgy, the blessing of water, as a reminder of Christ's baptism in the Jordan. The faithful then take the blessed water to their homes. The different traditions, in both the Christian East and West, point out the theology that has evolved through the centuries.

For us the days of Christmas will end a week from Monday when we will celebrate the Baptism of the Lord. It is important to continue the spirit of the Season, particularly in our words and actions. The added dimension of the call for evangelization and to be truly adult in living our faith completes this segment of the Liturgical Year.

**The Importance of Sunday in the Catholic Church**

Throughout the history of Christianity, Sunday has held a place of special importance. Early Christians celebrated Sunday, the first day of the week, as the Day that Jesus rose from the Dead. Because of the prominence of this day in Christian belief, they would gather together for Prayer and the Eucharist. As time went on, Sunday became the day of worship for the whole of Christianity.

For much of our American experience, Sunday was held in high esteem by our nation. Attending Church services on that day was as paramount to being a religious person. Not only did our citizens attend Church on that day, but for many it was a day for families to get together for a family meal. "Blue Laws" were established, in many places, forbidding non-essential stores to be open on Sundays so that people could follow through on their obligations to worship God.

In the recent years, the respect that our nation had for Sunday has been diminishing. The Blue Laws were rescinded, stores began to open their doors for shopping, and many families began to look upon Sunday solely as a day of relaxation, and not as a day of worship. The solemnity of Sunday has been losing ground, and fewer people see the importance of setting aside a day to build their relationship with God.

As Catholics, we need to take another look at our Faith in reference to the way we observe Sundays. If we find time to earn a living, find time for entertainment, find time to relax, why can't we find time to give God His due on one day out of the week? If you want to know what type of Catholic you are, take a good look at the way you attend Mass on weekends. Is it a part of your routine, or is it just an afterthought when you want to feel good about yourself?

Your relationship with God in your community is very important, because it helps to define who you are as a person. Our week should start with Sunday Mass. It is our way of telling God how much He means to us.

**Wishing you a few "happy New Years"**

Not too long ago I was asked why January 1<sup>st</sup> was chosen as the first day of the brand new year. Since I had no real idea for the choice of this date, I thought it would be wise to research the answer. In doing so, I found a few more 'new year' dates that we can celebrate as well.

New Year's Day was celebrated on January 1 for the first time in history in 45 B.C. when the Julian calendar took effect. Soon after becoming Roman dictator, Julius Caesar decided that the traditional Roman calendar was in dire need of reform and created this new format.

You see, up until his reign, the calendar had just ten months, beginning with March. The early Roman calendar designated March 1 as the New Year. ..The earliest recording of a New Year celebration is believed to have been in Mesopotamia, in 2000 B.C. and was celebrated at the time of the vernal equinox, in mid-March.

In pre-Christian Rome under the Julian calendar, the day was dedicated to Janus, god of gateways and beginnings, for whom the month of January is also named. When the Gregorian calendar was created, January 1<sup>st</sup> has remained as the first day of the year from that time onward.

The term "New Year" also applies to other new year beginnings as well.

*In the Roman Rite, the Liturgical year of the Church begins on the first Sunday after the feast of Saint Andrew whose feast is celebrated at the end of November.*

*The Chinese New Year, also known as the Lunar New Year, occurs every year on the new moon of the first lunar month, usually about the beginning of spring. Chinese New Year 2021 begins on Friday, February 12th, 2021, and its celebrations will continue for a total of 16 days. The Chinese celebrate the first seven days of the year as a public holiday. Chinese New Year in 2022 will fall on Tuesday, February 1<sup>st</sup>.*

*Even your birthday is a 'new year' celebration of your life and a day to thank God for the gift of your life and God's care for you throughout its duration!*

During 2021, I intend to celebrate all of these "new year's" days. I hope you will join me in doing so, too!

### A Different Version of the World

*“Well, I've been afraid of changing 'cause I've built my life around you. But time makes you bolder, even children get older, and I'm getting older too.”* From the song, Landslide by Stevie Nicks (1975)

A driving force in my life has been passion – the passion of knowing what I want out of life and the passion of working hard to accomplish my goals. It's true that my passions have changed or evolved over the years. However, it's always been a passion for something or someone that has driven me to become very successful in my life – and in most of my ventures. When I was just a kid, I wanted to become a professional musician. I worked at it, sought out and studied under teachers that could help me grow and advance. I sought out mentors that would guide me through the channels that I needed to navigate, and I did it.

After a time, my passions changed direction. I spent a number of years in the steel industry. For much of that time, I worked alongside my Dad – and loved every minute of it. I branched out and became an extraordinarily successful salesman for another company. Then, through a complex series of events, my passion for music reignited. I abruptly quit my steel job, and within a matter of weeks I put together a band – and that became a full-time job. Eventually, the band gave way to working in the Church, which then became my passion, in which I've been involved for almost 40 years.

Truth be told, I haven't loved every single job that I've had, or every gig that I've played, or every activity that I've undertaken, or every girlfriend that I've dated. But anyone who knows me well can attest that I was passionate about all of them. Success in life, whether it's in a career, an activity, or a relationship, can't truly happen without passion.

The passion that I'm speaking of is the driving force within one's self to be the best. I'm not talking about being the best in the world – I'm talking about being one's personal best. And what's the measure of success? In one word, Happiness.

Passion is an emotion, but more importantly, passion is an attitude. A lyric comes to mind from an old Crosby, Stills and Nash song: “If you can't be with the one you love, then love the one you're with.” It's all about attitude. At one point while I was in high school, I had what many would perceive to be the world's most boring job: I worked at the Cleveland Public Library shelving books. I would take a cart full of books, put them in order according to the Dewey Decimal System (now if that doesn't date me, nothing will) and then shelve them in proper order. To most people, watching paint dry would be more exciting. However, to a passionate person, this job was filled with challenges – and I actually enjoyed my job for the time I was there.

Right now, we're in the midst of events that are unprecedented – not in world history, but in our lifetimes. (Don't forget the old adage: “If you don't learn from history, you're doomed to repeat it.”) We hear phrases everyday like “the new normal.” Like it or not, all of us (in some way) will soon need to let go of things that we've perceived as anchors in our lives. Some of us have already let go of one thing or another. Some have lost jobs, some have lost finances, some have had to abandon careers, and some have suffered the loss of friends and loved ones. On the other hand, some have found new opportunities for career, financial, and personal growth.

In these times, we need to have faith – we need to be passionate in our devotion and in our prayer lives. If not already there, we need to become passionate about who we are and whose we are. We need to be passionate about what we can do to make things better in our lives and in the lives of those around us. This may call us to let go of some of the things that we've built our lives around (or at least look at those things in new ways) in order to grow. Remember our Lord's parable:

*“Amen, amen, I say to you, unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains just a grain of wheat; but if it dies, it produces much fruit.”* (John 12:24)

I would never presume to put words into our Lord's mouth, but for me it's not a far stretch to hear his next words as being:

*“Today this scripture passage is fulfilled in your hearing.”* (Luke 4:21)
