
### Pastoral Scene

### Fr George Smiga shared this reflection:

Pastor of a west coast parish became frustrated by the number of people in his community who were not coming to church on Sunday, so he formed a committee to investigate it. They eventually sent out this letter.

Dear Parishioner,

You are registered here in the parish, but we have noticed that you do not come to mass on Sunday. Thus, we have designated next Sunday as There Is No Excuse Not to Come to Church Sunday. We have

worked diligently to eliminate any excuse for not joining us for worship.

"Next Sunday cots will be provided for all who feel that Sunday is their only day to sleep in. Coffee and eye drops will be available for those who insist on staying out late on Saturday night. Steel helmets will be provided for those who claim that if they ever walk into a church the roof will fall. Sweaters will be provided for those who feel the church is too cold; fans for those who feel the church is too hot. There will be scorecards available for all who wish to keep track of the hypocrites who come to church on Sunday. We will have gift certificates for area restaurants for those who feel that they must stay home and cook. Finally, we are decorating the sanctuary with Christmas poinsettias and Easter lilies for those who have never seen the church without them."

The letter caused a good deal of discussion. But ultimately very few people decided to come back to church on a regular basis. This should not be surprising because you cannot argue, shame, or force people into accepting the value of church community.

A popular Communion Antiphon connects to the transformative Presence of Christ: Like the deer that years for running streams so my soul is thirsting for God, the living God. There are millions of souls experiencing deafness, darkness and pain. Christ's touch brought immediate healing to the man in the district of the Decapolis. Notice how personal and physical this drama is: Our focus is drawn to a hand, a finger, ears, a tongue, spitting. In Jesus, Mark shows us, God has truly come in the flesh. The Catholic Church is centered on our glorious Lord Jesus Christ in the Eucharist. Let us say with Isaiah, "Here is our God, He comes to save us." Let us be rich in faith, that we might inherit the kingdom promised to those who love Him.

Please remember to observe silence as we prepare our hearts for the Eucharist before the beginning of Mass. And to dress more appropriately as a gesture of respect while in our Lord's House.




### **Know Someone Who is Homebound**



# HER INFORMATION



### Faithful Citizenship: Dignity of the Human Person

In Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship, the Catholic bishops of the U.S. identify the four main principles of the Church's social teaching-Dignity of the Human Person, the Common Good, Solidarity, and Subsidiarity—and apply them to concrete issues. This is not to tell the faithful for whom or against whom to vote but to provide a foundation for Catholics to better evaluate policies, platforms, and candidates in light of the Gospel and the Church's moral and social teaching. This entry focuses on the Dignity of the Human Person.



Because each human person is created in the image and likeness of Cod, each one of us possesses innate and inviolable human dignity. This dignity is present in each person from the moment of their conception and throughout their lives. As Pope Francis has emphasized, human dignity is central to building a society where we are "brothers and sisters all" (Fratelli Tutti, no. 8).

We engage in the public square with a foundation of human dignity that:

- Protects the most vulnerable—children in the womb who are in danger of abortion-while also standing in radical solidarity with mothers.<sup>1</sup>
- Upholds the dignity of the elderly, disabled, or ill by strongly rejecting euthanasia and assisted suicide.
- Recognizes migrants and refugees through immigration reform that respects . human dignity, provides a path to citizenship, and addresses the root causes of migration.
- Supports the dignity of the person, created male or female, and opposes an ideology that denies the difference and reciprocity between man and woman.<sup>2</sup>
- Overcomes racism in our hearts as well as in our systems and institutions, which denies that we are all equally made in the image of God.<sup>3</sup>
- Continues seeking reform of the criminal justice system, ends the use of the death . penalty, and supports measures to reduce the threat of gun violence.<sup>4</sup>

Through our political participation, accompaniment of those in need, and the witness of our daily lives, may we support the dignity of every person created in God's image.

The God of Jacob keeps faith forever, secures justice for the oppressed, gives food to the hungry. The LORD sets captives free.



# **READINGS & SONGS**

### Second Reading James 2:1-5

My brothers and sisters, show no partiality as you adhere to the faith in our glorious Lord Jesus Christ. For if a man with gold rings and fine clothes comes into your assembly, and a poor person in shabby clothes also comes in, and you pay attention to the one wearing the fine clothes and say, "Sit here, please," while you say to the poor one, "Stand there, " or "Sit at my feet," have you not made distinctions among yourselves and become judges with evil designs?

Listen, my beloved brothers and sisters. Did not God choose those who are poor in the world to be rich in faith and heirs of the kingdom that he promised to those who love him?

Gospel Mark 7:31-37

Again Jesus left the district of Tyre and went by way of Sidon to the Sea of Galilee, into the district of the Decapolis. And people brought to him a deaf man who had a speech impediment and begged him to lay his hand on him. He took him off by himself away from the crowd. He put his finger into the man's ears and, spitting, touched his tongue; then he looked up to heaven and groaned, and said to him, "Ephphatha!"— that is, "Be opened!" — And immediately the man's ears were opened, his speech impediment was removed, and he spoke plainly. He ordered them not to tell anyone. But the more he ordered them not to, the more they proclaimed it. They were exceedingly astonished, and they said, "He has done all things well. He makes the deaf hear and the mute speak."
