St. Paul Parish 2021-2022 Third Quarter Financial Report

Our Parishioners of St. Paul Parish,

We continue to make great strides in the financial health of St. Paul Parish and School. This is a result of a very successful Festival, active PTO and Booster Organizations, generous donations of our Parish community, federal grant funding and the prayers of our community. Please help us continue with this momentum as we move forward with plans to get our facilities in good physical health while maintaining and improving the financial standing of the Parish.

The members of the Finance Committee and parish administration met on April 26, 2022 to review the third guarter financial reports. The committee would like to make the following observations regarding the financials:

- 1. The midyear bottom line: +\$130,625. Both contributions and 2021 DPAA rebates are better than budget projections.
- 2. One contributing factor to the bottom line is the special funding that the preschool is receiving in response to COVID-19. Preschool's payroll has been paid through these funds, freeing up preschool tuition income for much needed future capital expenses (windows, roof and window AC units). Also being planned is preschool playground improvements. The new fence, to be installed in summer 2022, has already been paid. These expenses will either be reported by the end of fiscal year or next fiscal year.
- 3. This report contains an unbudgeted capital expense: replacing a portion of the school roof. As of this report, the parish has paid \$31,114 for two sections. Estimates to replace the remainder of the school roof is being obtained. All funds raised from the 2022 National Day of Giving in February, \$33,341, are earmarked for the school roof. Additional donations were also specified for the school roof bringing a total of \$44,041 available.
- 4. Concern for the parish's aging facilities is an ongoing conversation. The parish administration is researching the estimated costs for these capital improvements. If you can help, through either business connections or resources, please contact Business Manager Judine Hooker at businessoffice@stpaulnky.org.
- 5. The number of families enrolling in WeShare for online giving continues to grow. If you would like to make online contributions, please use the following link: https://saintpaulflorence.weshareonline.org/
- 6. Specified donations and services continue to make a difference in providing the tools/improvements the school and parish need to be successful. A special thank you to all our donors for their generosity of time, treasure, and talents.
- 7. A special thank you to the St. Paul School PTO and Boosters. Their contributions to the parish continue to be more than is seen on this report. The PTO is contributing toward school workbooks and school staff professional development. The Boosters make sure the extracurricular school sports and activities have what they need. Both organizations continue to provide resources, both monetarily, equipment and time.
- 8. As of 3/31/22, St. Paul Parish received 2021 DPAA rebates totaling \$88,962. Thank you! The 2022 DPAA campaign is underway. To make an online 2022 DPAA pledge, please go to https://covdio.org/ and scroll down to the Donate Now button. Be sure to identify St. Paul Church as your parish. You may also send DPAA donations in an envelope with the Sunday collections or via mail.
- 9. In addition to the DPAA, other opportunities are available for parishioner participation to further the work of the parish's mission of worship and education. These include Secure Our Future, St. Paul Boosters events and St. Paul PTO fundraising activities. Look for more communications on these upcoming opportunities and how you can participate.
- 10. The school and preschool are continuing to take advantage of federal and state grant opportunities that are available in response to COVID-19. Through the Emergency Assistance to Nonpublic Schools 2 (EANS2), the school will be asking the state to procure additional technology, staffing, curriculum, outdoor classroom items, etc. Preschool has grants awarded for payroll, fixed expenses and cleaning that allowed preschool to use tuition for classroom and playground improvements. All these funds and expenses are reported as extraordinary income/expenses on this report.
- 11. Thank you to Mike Deckert for his years of service on the committee. Best wishes for you and your family.

St. Vincent de Paul News

I was serving at the Mary Rose Mission on a Thursday evening about 5 weeks ago. When I work at the Mission, I am often assigned to the backdoor. The person at the backdoor has the duty of gathering prayer requests from the guests, offering words of encouragement as they leave, and taking care of the bathrooms. It is not considered by most to be a very desirable assignment, but I take the job very seriously praying a rosary and asking the saints for intercession for each of the clients at the beginning of the shift and by making it a point to try to get the guests to open up about their needs so that we can pray for them more specifically. On this evening, I was approached by two guests, an older lady and a boy, who was about 5 years old. I struck up a conversation with the woman and learned that the little boy was her grandson and that he was living with her in her small apartment. I asked her how we could pray for her and the boy. She asked that we pray for her son, the boy's father instead. Her son was homeless and living in a car. He had applied for housing assistance and was hoping to get an apartment shortly. She said that once he got an apartment, he would still need a bed for the child, better clothes so that he could get a job, and basic furnishings for the apartment. I was really happy that I was at the door that night because, not only could I pray for her, I had the means to be of immediate assistance. I gave her the number to SVDP's call center and told her that she could have her son call as soon as he was in the apartment. SVDP could help with the bed, furnishings and clothing.

This past week, I was once again working at the back door of the Mary Rose Mission and, this time, the grandmother approached me (without her grandson). Her new prayer request was a prayer of thanksgiving. Her grandson was once again living with her son who now had an apartment and a job. She asked me to thank SVDP for helping with the bed, furniture and clothes for his new start. I have told this story to the volunteers at the Mission and at SVDP. It is so rewarding to see that, through God's Providence, our humble efforts can make a real difference in people's life.
