A NOTE FROM OUR PASTOR

Dear Parishioners,



Today the Church celebrates the revelation of Jesus Christ as Savior of the World (that is, His Epiphany). He was born for us and for all people to reveal the love of God for all humanity. The foreigners who traveled from the East in search of the newborn King of the Jews are referred to as wise men in one gospel account, and in another gospel they are called astrologers. Tradition has held that they were of some royal descent and referred to them as kings. Either way, there were three of them because the gospels identify the three gifts that were presented to the Christ child: gold, frankincense, and myrrh. Tradition has also given the kings their name: Caspar, Balthasar, and Melchior.

It is on the occasion of Christ's epiphany that two customs developed. In the Eastern Church, Christians exchange gifts as the Western Church does on Christmas. And, another custom is the blessing of homes. As the magi adored the Christ Child with Mary and Joseph, so a priest will bless the home of Christians with the prayer that Christ may dwell with and among the family members. For anyone interested in having their home blessed at this time of the year, just call me.

Some 20+ parishioners were recently honored for their volunteer time and efforts with fellow parishioner, Gary Plona and his team at Swagelok. These big-hearted parishioners spent many days wrapping Christmas gifts for two charitable agencies:

Front Steps Housing and Services – assists individuals to break the cycle of chronic homelessness. For 35 years they have provided affordable and safe housing and case management services. Founded by the Sisters of the Congregation of St. Joseph, Front Steps now operates a 68 unit facility on the near westside of Cleveland. They greatly appreciated

our parishioners being part of their mission: "Sharing talent & treasure with our family, faith community, and those from conception to natural death who are in need".

And then from the **Office of the Mayor for the City of East Cleveland**, a Proclamation by Mayor Brandon L. King, on behalf of the entire City of East Cleveland, recognizing our parishioners from St. Martin of Tours in Valley City for their volunteer service to the youth and families of East Cleveland. They offer this proclamation as a token of appreciation for the efforts our parishioners made in order to make a difference in the East Cleveland community.

Both citations are on display in the Gathering Area. My thanks to Gary and his team and to all the staff and parishioners who made this a joyous Christmas for so many people this year. God bless you, the volunteers, and the thousands who donated gifts.

Do you have a wish or wishes for the new year? Have you made a new year's resolution? If so, I hope your wishes come about, and, your resolution, now on day two of the new year, continues to be successful. May God bless your efforts to bring about some good in your life or in the life of the people around you.

As I've mentioned before in my column there are two parish projects I'd like to see completed in 2022. First, I'd like to pay off the mortgage from the 2002 church, hall, and office construction. If there are no major financial emergencies, we should be able to take ownership around November of this year. Our current balance is: \$116,254. Second, I'd like to purchase columbaria for the parish cemetery. A columbarium is a marble structure with any number of niches to hold the cremated remains of the departed. I am looking at columbaria with niches for individuals and for married couples. If I stay on track, this project will begin in spring or summer. My hope is that we eventually purchase five units to add the Luminous Mysteries of the Rosary, like the Joyful, Sorrowful, and Glorious Mysteries enscribed on the monuments around the cemetery pond. Well, those are my wishes for the year. Let's see what happens!

The Christmas Season concludes with the Baptism of the Lord on January 9; next Sunday. Anyone who can give us a hand bringing down the decorations and outdoor nativity set, please give the office a call.

WHY DO WE DO THAT? CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED

Question: What happens to a consecrated host if it accidentally falls to the ground?

Answer: This a very practical question because, as we all know, accidents happen, even during the most careful celebration of the liturgy. The short answer to this question is that nothing happens to the consecrated host. The Real Presence of Jesus remains in the consecrated host or any consecrated wine that might accidentally be spilled.

Another question we might ask is: How should the minsters respond if the Eucharist is dropped or spilled? If this happens, the priest, deacon, or extraordinary minister of holy Communion should immediately pick up the dropped host and consume it. If it is a case of the Precious Blood being spilled, the minister would use the purificator (and additional purificators if needed) to clean the spill and then the area should be reverently washed as soon as the Mass is over and the water poured into the sacrarium (a special sink that is located in church sacristies for reverently disposing of holy water, the water used to clean sacred vessels, etc.).

GOSPEL MEDITATION ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE


January 2, 2022 ~ The Epiphany of the Lord

In his Apostolic Exhortation, The Joy of the Gospel, Pope Francis references a thought from Pope Benedict XVI: "Being a Christian is not the result of an ethical choice or a lofty idea, but the encounter with an event, a person, which gives life a new horizon and a decisive direction." Today we celebrate an encounter with the Person of Jesus Christ! This simple but holy event in time dramatically changes human life, pointing it toward a new horizon and giving it a decisive direction. This is a message and truth that is not meant to be shared with only a select few who qualify but with the entire world. Pope Francis continues saying, "Thanks solely to this encounter or renewed encounter with God's love, which blossoms into an enriching friendship, we are liberated from our narrowness and self-absorption. We become fully human when we become more than human, when we let God bring us beyond ourselves in order to attain the fullest truth of our being."

Look around at people. Where is life heading for them? What gives them direction? Even we who are people of faith can get distracted and lose our focus. God, in all of His fullness, is revealed in Jesus Christ and we can encounter Him! God is tangible, real, vulnerable, poor, and full of wonders, surprises, and opportunities. For those who are struggling and lost, today is a day of great joy. All they have to do is reach out and touch the truth of Christ. This presence is revealed in the poor, exploited, and vulnerable ones who cry out for compassion and love. But it is also found in the faithful ones who see in the Epiphany of God a liberation from structures and systems that hurt us, a narrowness of mind and heart that constricts us, and an absorption in our self-agenda that prevents us from seeing anything other than ourselves as important.

We have been given the charge of preaching this Good News. If only we could find a way to be more effective, it might stand a chance of doing what God intended it to do. There is always tomorrow and our memory of that bright new light that shone so brilliantly that Bethlehem night pointing us to truth and reminding us that we are loved.

If you're not familiar with the movie, it follows the life of George Bailey from childhood through adulthood. A dreamer by nature, George has big plans for himself that involve world exploration and adventure — but family and community obligations keep him tethered to the same spot on the map, leading an altogether ordinary life.

One of the most memorable scenes from that movie is of George dancing with his sweetheart Mary while they sing "Buffalo Gals — Won't you come out tonight/And dance by the light of the moon?"
