




1st Reading - Nehemiah 8:2-4a,, 5-6, 8-10

A Reading from the Book of Nehemiah

Ezra the priest brought the law before the assembly, which consisted of men, women, and those children old enough to understand. Standing at one end of the open place that was before the Water Gate, he read out of the book from daybreak till midday, in the presence of the men, the women, and those children old enough to understand; and all the people listened attentively to the book of the law. Ezra the scribe stood on a wooden platform that had been made for the occasion. He opened the scroll so that all the people might see it for he was standing higher up than any of the people —; and, as he opened it, all the people rose. Ezra blessed the LORD, the great God, and all the people, their hands raised high, answered, "Amen, amen!" Then they bowed down and prostrated themselves before the LORD, their faces to the ground. Ezra read plainly from the book of the law of God, interpreting it so that all could understand what was read. Then Nehemiah, that is, His Excellency, and Ezra the priest-scribe and the Levites who were instructing the people said to all the people: "Today is holy to the LORD your God. Do not be sad, and do not weep"— for all the people were weeping as they heard the words of the law. He said further: "Go, eat rich foods and drink sweet drinks, and allot portions to those who had nothing prepared; for today is holy to our LORD. Do not be saddened this day, for rejoicing in the LORD must be your strength!"


Apostle's Creed



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

from the Pastor

Greetings friends in Christ. As we reflected on last week's readings, the Spirit is calling us as One Body in Christ to discern our gifts and



The meaning of today's liturgy is subtle and manylayered. We need background to understand what's happening in today's First Reading. Babylon having been defeated, King Cyrus of Persia decreed that the exiled Jews could return home to Jerusalem. They rebuilt their ruined temple (see Ezra 6:15-17) and under Nehemiah finished rebuilding the city walls (see Nehemiah 6:15). The stage was set for the renewal of the covenant and the re-establishment of the Law of Moses as the people's rule of life. That's what's going on in today's First Reading, as Ezra reads and interprets (see Nehemiah 8:8) the Law and the people respond with a great "Amen!" Israel, as we sing in today's Psalm, is rededicating itself to God and His Law. The scene seems like the Isaiah prophecy that Jesus reads from in today's Gospel. Read all of Isaiah 61. The "glad tidings" Isaiah brings include these promises: the liberation of prisoners (61:1); the rebuilding of Jerusalem, or Zion (61:3-4; see also Isaiah 60:10); the restoration of Israel as a kingdom of priests (61:6; Exodus 19:6); and the forging of an everlasting covenant (61:8; Isaiah 55:3). It sounds a lot like the First Reading. Jesus, in turn, declares that Isaiah's prophecy is fulfilled in Him. The Gospel scene, too, recalls the First Reading. Like Ezra, Jesus stands before the people, is handed a scroll, unrolls it, then reads and interprets it (compare Luke 4:16-17, 21 and Nehemiah 8:2-6, 8-10). We witness in today's Liturgy the creation of a new people of God. Ezra started reading at dawn of the first day of the Jewish new year (see Leviticus 23:24). Jesus also proclaims a "sabbath," a great year of Jubilee, a deliverance from slavery to sin, a release from the debts we owe to God (see Leviticus 25:10). The people greeted Ezra "as one man." And, as today's Epistle teaches, in the Spirit the new people of God-the Church-is made "one body" with Him (Dr Scott Hahn)

Helping others is Self-Help

A recent newspaper article titled, "How to be Your Own Life Coach," stated: "You can't always count on friends or family members for constant support—especially now, when everyone seems buffeted by uncertainty. Carve-out space in the morning to set priorities for the day. Then reflect on accomplishments in the evening and celebrate them."

This self-help guru might have inspired some readers more versed in scripture to roll their eyes and turn the page. But then came her list of targeted goal-centered accomplishments. On it was "helping someone solve a problem."

"A good coach will always remind a client that most setbacks are temporary," the article concluded. "So remind yourself that this too shall pass."

Could this New-Age guru have veered into some old-school scripture about the gift of hope? "This too shall pass" resonates what Paul told the Corinthians about our calling to comfort others and bring the Holy Spirit to them (2Corinthians: 7-10):

"We hold this treasure in earthen vessels, that the surpassing power may be of God and not from us. ... always carrying about in the body the dying of Jesus, so that the life of Jesus may also be manifested in our body."

In this Sunday's second reading from First Corinthians ($\underline{1}$ Cor 12:12-30), Paul tells us ALL people were designed to form the body of Christ and to manifest the holy spirit of hope for others. This is not reserved for one group.

For in one Spirit we were all baptized into one body, whether Jews or Greeks, slaves or free persons, and we were all given to drink of one Spirit. Now the body is not a single part, but many. You are Christ's body, and individually parts of it.

This Sunday, Paul's letter is bookended by old and new-testament accounts of prophetic words spoken to bring hope—TO ALL. In the first reading (Neh 8:2-4a, 5-6, 8-10), Ezra (the priest and scribe) is addressing a congregation of tearful people hungering for hope.


"Do not be sad, and do not weep," he tells them. "Go, eat rich foods and drink sweet drinks, and allot portions to those who had nothing prepared; for today is holy to our LORD. Do not be saddened this day, for rejoicing in the LORD must be your strength!"

In Luke's gospel (<u>Lk 1:1-4; 4:14-21</u>), Jesus reads the words of Isaiah to a crowd and establishes the same effect:

The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring glad tidings to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim liberty to captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, and to proclaim a year acceptable to the Lord. Rolling up the scroll, Jesus handed it back to the attendant and sat down. He said to them, "Today this Scripture passage is fulfilled in your hearing."

Sunday's gospel reading ends there, but the full account shows that Jesus' audience thought THEY were to be the exclusive beneficiaries of Isaiah's promise as voiced by Jesus. But when Jesus implies the invitation to be among God's chosen people is open to EVERY-ONE—not just Israelites—they come close to killing Jesus.

Then they will answer and say, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or naked or ill or in prison, and not minister to your needs?' He will answer them, 'Amen, I say to you, what you did not do for one of these least ones, you did not do for me.'

Inaugural CLE 21:6 feeds teens spiritually

The first CLE 21:6 event on Jan. 8 drew about 350 high school students to John Carroll University for a day focusing on the theme of "Discipleship."

There were speakers, breakout sessions, parish download times, guided prayer, Mass, games and free time, an opportunity for confession and adoration.

Francine Costantini, diocesan director of youth ministry, said the event name was a play on Cleveland's 216 area code and also was based on Matthew 21:6, "The disciples went and did as Jesus had instructed them."

She said the students attend school together, participate in sports and other activities. "We need to feed them spiritually, also. They need Jesus," she added.

As the students and youth ministers arrived, they enjoyed warmup activities, music before the first keynote speaker, Brad Pierron, took the stage.

Pierron, missionary program director for Damascus Catholic Mission Campus in Centerburg, Ohio, discussed the importance of building a firm foundation. He described his high school experience, going from a class of 23 at a small Catholic school in Southern Ohio where he knew everyone and was a standout in athletics and other activities, to being one in a class of 7,000 at The Ohio State University.

"I needed to find my foundation," he told event attendees. "If you don't get a foundation, you just wander. A firm foundation will stay with us forever," he added, explaining the concept of discipleship.

"The art of discipleship is an art of learning to be born," he said. Mary, as Jesus' mother, was the first disciple. Discipleship is "a 'yes' to Jesus that we live out every day."

Pierron explained the Jewish education system in Jesus' time, noting there were three levels akin to elementary, middle school and high school. Only boys attended classes and only the top 10% advanced to the next level. The others returned home and learned their father's trade. Jesus completed every level and was a rabbi's rabbi, but he also learned his father's carpentry trade.

In Scripture, the first call to discipleship was always immediate, Pierron said, noting Jesus invited them to come and follow him. The first disciples were men who learned their father's trade; they were not among the most educated. "They believed they had nothing to give. But Jesus doesn't take anything from you, he transforms you, like he did with those disciples. Jesus, the rabbi, found these fishermen and told them if they gave their lives to the Lord that day, he would make them fishers of men, not just fishermen," Pierron said. "You will change the world," he told the teens. "We're all in the same boat and we all want the same thing. God loves us so much he wants us to partake in his life. Discipleship is what you were made for." Costantini said CLE 21:6 will be an annual event and planning will begin soon for the 2023 program.


