




AUGLAIZE COUNTY COUNCIL ON AGING QUARTERLY NEWSLETTER

2021 ANNUAL REPORT

This report concerns Auglaize County Council on Aging activities for the past calendar year.





The Chore Service the Council provides performed 5446.75 hours of work for 190 clients in Auglaize County in 2021. Chore workers performed different services such as minor home repair, grass mowing, leaf raking, delivery of food boxes, and ramp building. Homemakers perform light housekeeping chores such as cleaning bathrooms and general cleaning, laundry, groceries and running errands. Since July, the Homemakers have performed 740.75 hours of work for 58 clients. Before they were permitted to go into client's homes, they picked up prescriptions, got groceries and helped deliver hot meals.

The Council employs two (2) Outreach Workers who explain available services to senior citizens and help them contact the programs that fit the senior's needs. They completed 1,566 assessments and follow-ups for 706 clients in 2021, plus numerous insurance requests. They continued to reach out to clients by telephone after the center closed to the public. The ACCA mails a quarterly newsletter free of charge to approximately 2,000 households. Readers learn about new programs as they become available and of changes or improvements in existing ACCA programs. Newsletter subscriptions can be obtained by contacting the Council on Aging.

There were 3,920 Hot and Transitional Meals delivered in 2021, with 1,422 meals served at the meal site. Approximately 3,720 food boxes were delivered during the year. Until the center partially opened for meal site activities in July, activities were accomplished by playing virtual bingo, holding virtual devotions daily and Wellness Wednesdays. Numerous brain stimulus papers and exercises were also assembled, and delivered to clients.

ARE YOU READY FOR SPRING WEATHER?


We're talking about the unpredictable nature of severe spring weather.

Here are some ways to help you prepare for and stay safe during some of spring's most common severe weather threats.

TORNADOS

On average, there are 1,253 tornadoes in the United States each year with the greatest risk in the Midwest and Southeast.

- Know the signs of an oncoming tornado, including rotating, funnel shaped clouds and the sound of your community's sirens.
- Get to a sturdy building and head to the basement or storm cellar. If there isn't a basement, go to a central interior room on the lowest floor (such as a hallway or closet) and stay away from windows, doors and exterior walls.





FLOODS

Floods are the most common natural disaster in the United States and can result from rain, melting snow, and overflow of dams and water systems.

- Don't attempt to walk, swim or drive through flooded roadways; it only takes six inches of water to knock you off your feet and one foot to sweep your car away.
- Stay away from bridges over fast moving water as they could be washed away without warning.
- Have necessary supplies ready in case you need to evacuate quickly—don't forget medications, items for your pet, batteries and chargers.
- Stay inside your car if it's trapped in moving water, but if waters are rising within a building, get onto the roof and signal for help.
- Always listen to authorities and return home when they say it's safe to do so. Don't touch electrical
 equipment if it's wet or if there's standing water in your home. If you can do so safely, shut off the
 electricity.

THUNDERSTORMS AND LIGHTNING

Thunderstorms injure an average of 300 people every year and cause about 80 fatalities. Lightning is a leading cause of injury and death from weather-related hazards, and even though most lightning victims survive, they often report long-term debilitating conditions.

- Check for dead, broken or low hanging tree branches in your yard, and cut and trim any that may be at risk of falling on your home.
- If you see a storm approaching or hear thunder, go inside immediately. If you're stuck in your vehicle, stay in the car, close the windows and don't touch anything metal.
- If you're stuck outside and can't get to a building, stay away from high grounds, water, tall trees that are isolated, metal objects, picnic shelters, sheds and dugouts.
- During a storm, avoid running your water or making calls using a landline as electricity can travel through plumbing and phone lines.

DO YOU KNOW THE HISTORY BEHIND MEMORIAL DAY?

Here are a few facts about the holiday:

- It honors the men and women who died while serving in the U.S. military.
- It is observed on the last Monday of May, although for may years it was observed on May 30.
- Memorial Day was originally known as Decoration Day.
- It became a federal holiday in 1971, and created a three-day weekend for federal employees.
- Memorial Day is known as the unofficial beginning of the summer season.
- Each year, a national moment of remembrance takes place at 3 p.m. local time on Memorial Day.
- In 1966, the federal government declared Waterloo, New York, as the official birthplace of Memorial Day because it hosted an annual event where residents decorated the graves of soldiers with flowers and flags. President Lyndon Johnson signed the declaration.
- Originally, Memorial Day was honored only those lost in the Civil War, but that changed during WW1.
- One of the earliest commemorations of the holiday was organized by recently freed slaves.

- The name MAY is the modern-day English adaption of the Latin word Maius, which has origins going back to the time of the ancient Greeks. They named the month May after the Greek goddess of growth.
- May used to have a very different names in Old English. Back then, the month was referred to as the "month of three milkings." Unsurprisingly, this meant that during this month, you could milk your cows up to three times per day!

INGREDIENTS:

1 box yellow cake mix

3/4 cup milk

1 teaspoon vanilla

3 eggs

1 package (3 oz. cream cheese, softened

2 cups chopped fresh rhubarb

1/2 cup all purpose flour

3/4 cup sugar

1/4 cup butter or margarine, softened

DIRECTIONS:

- 1. Heat oven to 325 degrees (for all pans). Spray bottom and sides of 13 x 9 inch pan with baking spray with flour.
- 2. In large bowl, beat cake mix, milk, vanilla, eggs and cream cheese with electric mixer on low speed 1 minute, then on medium speed 2 minutes, scraping bowl frequently: set aside.
- 3. In medium bowl, toss rhubarb and 1/4 cup of the flour. Fold rhubarb into batter; spread in pan.
- 4. In small bowl, mix remaining 1/4 cup flour, the sugar and butter until coarse crumbs form. Sprinkle over top of batter.
- 5. Bake 35 to 42 minutes or until lightly browned and toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool about 30 minutes to serve warm or cool completely, about 1 hour 30 minutes.

Can serve with a dab of Cool Whip on top. **ENJOY!**


HOT FLASHES
