

WORSHIP TOGETHER

7th Sunday of Easter

When we think of the cartoon drawings of Heaven and Hell, we think of little beautiful angels sitting and plucking their harps and demons carrying pitchforks. C. S. Lewis offers us an alternative and challenging portrait of Heaven & Hell that ties in quite well with our readings:

He described hungry people sitting at a huge banquet loaded with delicious food. Every person had a meter-long fork and knife attached to their hands (that's about three feet long). The scene in hell was one of anger, frustration, and fighting as people scrambled to feed themselves. They could reach the food with the long knives and forks, but they were too long to feed themselves.

The conflict, screaming, and unfulfilled hunger continued for eternity--that is hell.

But the scene in Heaven was quite different. The same tables were loaded with food, and the people had the same long forks and knives attached to their hands. But instead of chaos and conflict, there was joy, laughter, and pleasant conversation. The difference? In Heaven, the diners weren't trying to feed themselves. Each person was patiently taking the food and feeding the person seated across the table. Those who strive to feed themselves live in hell, while those who reach out to others and receive from them are in Paradise.

The prayer of Jesus, which we hear in our Gospel for this weekend, His final prayer before the events of the Passion, reveals Jesus' desire for unity among those who follow Him. He is praying not only for those 12 Apostles, He's also praying for you and me, and for all people 'til the end of time – "those who will believe in Me through their (the Apostles') word." I find it comforting to know that Jesus was thinking about me 2,000 years ago. The unity of Christians is to be an effective witness to the fact that the Father sent His Son into the world. However there are many signs of disunity in our world. We need only to turn on our televisions or radios to see the effects of hate and violence, of pride and jealousy and selfishness, of disobedience to the Divine Law. In the twenty-first century, we still witness the injustice of a tiny minority of the world's population controlling the vast resources of the planet. In this rich West we consume, while others hunger for the basics of life. In this situation it is easy to see that the image of God is still unrecognized, rejected or distorted. The lack of love and the disunity is apparent even between and within the various Christian communities and Churches which also point to the tragic witness to our failure to hear and answer the prayer of Christ. And such lack of love disrupts the mission of Jesus Christ. Each of us is called to make a journey into the gift of unity, to grow in mutual love and understanding. Unity in Christ is the recognition that while we are all created in the image and likeness of God, we are also created uniquely – with particular gifts, talents and vision for the sake of the

whole Body of Christ. Being united with one another mirrors the life of the Father, the Son and the Spirit – each distinct, yet united in mutual

love.

The unity for which Christ prays is not fundamentally obedience to a set of principles or doctrines – even though laws and Commandments are important. The unity for which He prays is a relationship of mutual love with one another that reflects the relationship of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. This self-emptying love is revealed in our commitment to one another, recognizing our difference and cherishing it as precious. This rejoices in serving the other and receiving everything as gift. In this love we celebrate the wonders worked through us by the presence of the Spirit of God. Our communion/ our unity with one another can be the most powerful sign of God's presence and activity in the world today. Indeed, if we were to embrace this communion we would be experiencing Heaven on Earth. May we be generous in fostering this unity and inviting others to share in it. Here we reveal the face of God and answer most powerfully the prayer of Jesus: "May they be so completely one that the world will realize that it was You Who sent Me."
