

LITURGICAL NOTES

Palm Sunday provides us with an abundance of subjects to contemplate! The liturgical texts for today are considerably varied, ranging from the jubilant "Hosanna to the Son of David" antiphon opening the blessing of the palms to the sublime meditations of St. Paul on Christ's humility to the care-laden psalm 22. Of particular note is the emphasis on abandonment in the Responsorial Psalm, the Tract Psalm before the Gospel (both the aforementioned psalm 22), and the Offertory Antiphon. The Offertory is particularly touching; one can almost hear the sobbing of the Sacred Heart: "My heart awaited reproach and misery; and I hoped for one that would grieve together with me, but there was none." Jesus, the Son of man suffered abandonment of the worst kind by taking on our sins, feeling in His soul the separation from His Father and the Holy Spirit, His heavenly family. This is the dreadful and frightening effect of mortal sin on the soul: separation from God. Our Lord suffered this horrendous abandonment so that we would never be truly abandoned. He ventured into this awful realm to save those who have fallen into the slavery of sin then, now, and in times to come. We are not alone! This abandonment is also a call to all souls pursuing holiness to console the Sacred Heart. Come spend time with Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament, especially during our Thursday holy hours (7-8pm). This is traditionally the time of the week when our Lord went into the garden to weep over the trials to come and the souls that would be lost despite everything. Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on us sinners.

FROM THE PASTOR





WORKING FOR THE FOOD WHICH DOES NOT PERISH--Our Salvation. Part VI Very Rev. Joseph Mary Lukyamuzi, V.F.

"The life I now live in the body, I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave himself for me." Galatians 2:20b.

As we continue our journey through these days of Lent, we are now approaching the critical moments in Jesus' mission- "The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified." John 23:23. We walk with our eyes fixed on the love of God for us as demonstrated in the message of the Cross, where the one perfect sacrifice of Jesus Christ was offered. What is the meaning of the cross for us? St. Paul remind us: "For the Jews request a sign, and the Greeks seek after wisdom; but we preach Christ crucified to the Jews a stumbling-block and to the Greeks foolishness, but to those who are called, both Jews and Greeks — Christ, the power of God and the wisdom of God." 1 Corinthians 1:22-24. We find life, service, relationship, total self-giving to one another in love in the message of the cross. Before Christ, the cross was an instrument of the cruelest punishment and a symbol of horror. After His sufferings, it became the **sign of the victory** of good over evil and of life over death. It became the reminder of the limitless love of God and a source of happiness. The incarnate Son of God sanctified the cross with His blood and made it the carrier of His blessings and holiness. Because of these properties, the sign of the cross became an essential component of Christian life since apostolic times, used in all Church services and private

prayers. For instance, water is blessed and becomes holy with the sign of the cross, and bread and wine are transformed into the Body and Blood of Christ; in summary, all Sacraments acquire their spiritual power through the sign of the cross. As flies cannot tolerate flame, so demons cannot stand the presence of the cross. The sign of the cross protects a Christian from accidents and misfortunes and attracts God's help to us. That is why Catholic Christians revere the cross so much, bless themselves with the sign of the cross, wear a cross on their chest and adorn their homes and churches with crosses.

The cross reveals to us the character of God: His love for lost sinners and His perfect justice meet at the cross. If we want to grow in our love for God, which is the first and greatest commandment, then we must grow to understand and appreciate of the cross, which shows us His great love. If we want to grow in godliness, we must grow in understanding the significance of the cross, which confronts the most prevalent and deceptive of all sins, namely, pride.

The cross is the place where all the wounds of sin are healed and love cherished. If you suffer from emotional problems--guilt, anxiety, depression, anger, or whatever--there is healing in the cross of Christ. If you are going through tragedy or suffering, there is comfort in abundance as you contemplate the sufferings of the spotless Savior on your behalf. Peter wrote to the slaves who were suffering unjustly under cruel masters for the following words; "He Himself bore our sins in His body on the cross, so that we might die to sin and live to righteousness for by His wounds you were healed. For you were like sheep going astray, but now you have returned to the Shepherd and Overseer of your souls..." 1 Peter 2: 24-25. The words about Christ's wound must have spoken to the hearts of these slaves who were whipped unjustly. Peter knew that meditating on the cross would produce in them a heart of overflowing gratitude to the One who bore so much on their behalf. Therefore, the centrality of the cross is crucial to our faith and to all sound doctrine. Satan hates the cross because it sealed his doom, and he is relentless in his attacks to undermine and hinder anybody who promotes the message of the cross. If he can convince Christians that they are not sinners continually in need of daily repentance and the cleansing blood of Jesus, then the world will be plunged into hatred and love disappear from the face of the earth.
