THIRTIETH SUNDAY OF ORDINARY TIME

LITURGICAL NOTES

Entrance: I have called out because you answer me, O God; incline your ear and hear my words; keep me, O Lord, like the apple of your eye; protect me under the shadow of your wings.

Offertory: I shall meditate upon your commandments which I greatly love; I will extend my hands towards your commandments which I love.

Communion: O Lord our governor, how admirable is your name in all the earth! It is interesting that the Communion Antiphon today refers to the Lord as "governor" since Jesus directed the apostles to govern through service, not "lording" their authority over others as the Gentiles do. Hence His name is admirable "in all the earth" because of the astonishing reversal of nature. Both Isaiah and St. Paul highlight this reversal in pointing out that Christ's way was to overcome suffering in His own suffering that we might not be alone in our suffering. The Pagan world ruled according to the maxim "might is right," and our Lord toppled that order in the establishment of His holy Church to lead mankind to salvation through that same example of service through suffering. Our brokenness will not be fully overcome, however, until the end of time when all things will be renewed. Our weaknesses and the weaknesses of others will stand as obstacles between us and the perfection Christ wants of us. Staying the course will require grace, and so we pray: "protect me under the shadow of your wings."

FROM THE PASTOR



God, are you really here or what? Where is my God when I am in sorrow! Part V "Casting all your anxieties on him, because he cares for you." 1 Peter 5:7

I remember my mother taking me with her to buy some foods at a huge market in Uganda. All I wanted to do was look for some items to play with. My mother was not interested in my interests - I least I thought so! She was interested in looking for foods and vegetables. Needless to say, I was bored to death. To alleviate my boredom, I would wander off on my own to find what I wanted. The next thing you know my mother would not know where I was. I did not tell her where I wanted to go; I assumed she would just know where I was. Of course, my mother panicked as she began looking all over the place for me. When she could not find me, she would go to the management of the market to announce over the public microphone, "Would Joseph please come to the entrance of the market immediately. Mom is looking for you." After hearing my name broadcasted for all to hear, I would take my time in finding my way to the entrance. My mother caught sight of me as I walked toward the gate of the market. Immediately, her fear turned into relief. But then one second later, her relief turned into anger, and the lecture began: "Where have you been? Do you know what you put me through? Don't you ever leave my sight again!" I tried to defend myself but to no avail. Needless to say, I was disciplined when I got home.

For Parents, If you've ever lost sight of a child, I'm sure you can relate to Mary and Joseph when they had lost Jesus in the temple. Scripture begins with the family of Mary, Joseph, and Jesus travelling to Jerusalem from Nazareth to celebrate Passover (Lk. 2:41). Jesus is 12 years old at the time of this particular journey. This is the age that a Jewish male moves from boyhood to manhood. He and his family would celebrate this passage to adulthood in a ceremony called Bar Mitzvah (Son of the Law). Being a Son of the Law meant that Jesus would be expected to know the difference between right and wrong. Jesus is eager to share his understanding of the Law with the teachers of the Law, so he stays at the Temple without informing his parents in much the same way that I wandered around the market without the knowledge of my mother. In the meantime, his parents have already packed up and begun the journey back to Nazareth. During their journey they notice that Jesus is missing! Mary and Joseph immediately went into a panic and rushed back to Jerusalem to search for Jesus.

Wasn't that incident painful to Mary? Of course! Our Blessed Mother in all these moments of pains kept Her silence, never a word of complaint. However, in this instance of great pain She exclaimed: **Son, why have you done this to us?** Certainly, She did not mean to reproach Jesus, but to make a loving grievance, not knowing the purpose of what had happened. What the Virgin suffered during those three long days of search we cannot fully understand. In Her other sorrows there was the presence of Jesus; in this particular sorrow, though, this presence was missing. One theologian said that perhaps the pain of Mary was intensified by this thought: **Is it my fault that Jesus has been lost?** There is no greater pain for a soul that loves than the fear of having displeased the person you love.

The Lord gave us Our Lady as a model of perfection and willed Her to suffer – indeed, to suffer very much – to make us understand that suffering is necessary and that it brings with it many spiritual goods. Patience is indispensable for following Jesus carrying the Cross. Mary's anguish gives us a lesson for our spiritual life. Jesus has many souls who truly love Him, serving Him with loyalty and willing nothing else than to please Him. From time to time, Jesus hides Himself from them; that is, He does not make His presence felt and leaves them **in spiritual aridity**. Often these souls are troubled, not feeling their initial fervor. In this they are mistaken! Jesus allows dryness even to the most chosen souls, so that one can be detached from consolation and so that they will learn from suffering. So, we say: *We grieve with you, O Mary most sorrowful. Your heart was pierced by losing your beloved son for three days.*
