ALL MONTH Catholic Virginian + Christian Formation + Justice and Peace 1/23/2022 Respect Life

> The Gospel is the Good News. It shows us the path to everlasting life. But sometimes it does this not just by

showing us what to do, but also demonstrating what *not* to do. Today is a great example. Jesus preaches in Nazareth, where he grew up. The hometown crowd is expecting to hear some inspiring words, and maybe even see some miracles. But that's not what Jesus has in store for them. Instead, he challenges them, pointing to their self-centeredness and their unwillingness to open-up to God. Not the easy message they wanted to hear!

This is a moment of decision for his audience. Do they allow Jesus's hard words to change them, leading to conversion and deeper relationship with God? Or do they put up walls, and respond with anger and stubbornness?

We know how they chose. The challenge is to choose differently when we're confronted by a challenging message from Christ and His Church. One of those challenging topics in our parish today is the need to support the

Annual Diocesan Appeal. It can be easy to react to this conversation by putting up walls or tuning things out. But the parish's needs are real. What's more important than whether we give or not is whether we allow ourselves to be challenged by the invitation to contribute, allowing ourselves to lower our defenses and to prayerfully listen and discern. Try it out today, and see how the Lord prompts you.

LITURGICAL NOTES

Entrance: Let the hearts of those who seek the Lord rejoice; seek the Lord and be strengthened; seek his face for evermore.

Offertory: It is good to give thanks unto the Lord, and to sing in honor of your name, O Most High.

Communion: Let your face shine down upon your servant, deliver me in your mercy. Lord, let me not be confounded, for I have called upon you. We continue to give thanks in the liturgy for God's revelation of Himself in Jesus Christ ("It is good to give thanks unto the Lord..."). However, the Entrance and Communion Antiphons, taking a page from the Gospel where Jesus was rejected by His hometown, begin to foreshadow what is to come in Lenten days. In manifesting Himself, our Lord is both a source of consolation for those weighed down and consternation for those who do not believe. Strength of spirit will be needed to face the onslaught of unbelief and persecution from His own people, the Chosen People to whom He was sent to save and, through them, the whole world. It is fitting that the Church offers us the beautiful words, "Let your face shine down upon your servant, deliver me in your mercy, Lord," for Christ Himself would likely have prayed these words in response to the obstacles confronting His burgeoning public ministry. Why begin reflecting on Lent now, though? Prior to the liturgical reforms following the Council, there was a reason of preparation for Lent known as Septuagesima ("seventieth" [day]), which consisted of approximately three weeks of increasingly penitential readings leading up to Ash Wednesday. For now, the Church has seen it fit to suppress this season, but these Propers have been retained and passed down to us. Let us follow the example of the great saints and steel ourselves for whatever crosses we may encounter while not losing the joy of knowing that God has trodden this path already and will not abandon us. Deo gratias!

FROM THE PASTOR



Where is the Star? The Journey with the Magi. Part IV

Very Rev. Joseph Mary Lukyamuzi, V.F.

"On coming to the house, they saw the child with his mother Mary, and they bowed down and worshiped him. Then they opened their treasures and presented him with gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh." Matthew. 2:11

The Magi, driven by their spiritual hunger, begun the journey seeking the King of Kings — seeking to find Him, seeking to know Him, seeking to get close to Him, seeking to worship Him. This is the greatest goal we can ever have in life! Deep within themselves, they knew who Jesus was and recognized that he was worthy of their worship. After they inquired of Him during their encounter with Herod, the gospel says that they continued the journey following the star: "And when they come into the house, they saw the young child with Mary His mother, and fell down, and worshipped Him: and when they had opened their treasures, they presented unto Him gifts; gold, and frankincense and myrrh." After they had laid down their gifts, they bowed down and began to worship Him. Therefore, the fourth and most important of all their gifts was the gift of worship.

The wise men did not hug Him or stand in amazement of how cute He was; instead, they bent their knees in total reverence to the King of Kings. We cannot overlook that the shepherds, the wise men, and the angels all had one thing in common: they all came to Jesus to WORSHIP HIM. Luke tells us that the angels announced the birth to the shepherds and began to sing, "Glory to God in the Highest, and on earth peace, goodwill toward men." Luke 2:14 After the shepherds were told of the birth of the Messiah, they visited Him and returned praising and glorifying God. God is interested in our worship more than any material thing we can give in offering. It is Jesus who said, "But the hour is coming, and now is, when the true worshipers will worship the Father in spirit and truth; for the Father is seeking such to worship Him. God is Spirit, and those who worship Him must worship in spirit and truth." John 4:23, 24

Furthermore, God is not so much concerned about anything we can do for Him as He is about our relationship with Him. In other words, He is interested in your relationship and not your workmanship. He wants true worship and not empty lip service. He desires to have the heart of someone who is adamant on giving Him the glory He so well deserves. Revelation 5:12 says, "Worthy is the Lamb who was slain, to receive power and riches and wisdom, and strength and honor and glory and *blessing!*" John goes on to write, "And every creature which is in heaven and on the earth...and all that are in them, I heard saying: 'Blessing and honor and glory and power, Be to Him who sits on the throne'...Then the four living creatures said, 'Amen!' And the twenty-four elders fell down and worshiped Him who lives forever and ever." Revelation 5:13. 14

One person we know for sure who was not interested in worshipping the child was Herod. Upon hearing of the birth of a King, Herod immediately felt threatened and was ready to take Him out. He did not know that Jesus was not at all interested in his earthly throne. He left the right hand of His Father in heaven and came to die for the sins of men. Of Herod the gospel says, "And he sent them to Bethlehem and said, 'Go and search carefully for the young Child, and when you have found Him, bring back word to me, that I may come and worship Him also'." *Matthew 2:8* However, being warned by God in a dream, they departed without returning to the power-hungry, wicked Herod. When he realized he was deceived by the Magi, he was enraged and gave an order to kill every male child two years and under. What is your attitude in worship? Whom do you seek to worship? And how do you worship?
