

LITURGICAL NOTES

Entrance: Sing to the Lord a new song, alleluia; for the Lord has accomplished wondrous deeds, alleluia; he has revealed his justice in the sight of the Gentiles, alleluia, alleluia.

Offertory: Shout joyfully to God, all the earth; shout with joy to God, all the earth; sing a psalm in honor of his name; come and hear, all you who fear God, and I will tell you what great things the Lord has done for my soul, alleluia.

Communion: I am the true vine, and you are the branches; he who abides in me and I in him, he it is who bears much fruit, alleluia, alleluia.

The Offertory Antiphon this weekend is a rare and stunning example of unbridled joy in the chant repertoire. In the English setting, the melody is a little truncated, but it still preserves the some of the sweeping gestures in the original Latin. The melody has a large compass, spanning an octave (8 notes) and a half, which is highly unusual for the generally understated style of chanting. It is positively bard-like in its telling of God's mercy towards the Psalmist with the invitation, "come and hear"! As with all the Psalms, our Lord would have prayed this text during His time on earth. How fitting to think that He might have prayed this after the resurrection. It is an invitation to us to beg for and experience the mercy of God in our broken lives and to share the transformative fruits of that experience with those around us. 

THE POWER IN HIS RESURRECTION Part V Very Rev. Joseph Mary Lukyamuzi, V.F.

"I came that they may have life and have it abundantly." John 10:10

You and I have been born into victory. You have been born to overcome the world. The resurrection really does change everything. Because Jesus lives, you also will live (Jn. 14:19). The Resurrection Brings New Life. Keep looking back at the empty tomb and see that you have been born into victory. Because Jesus lives, you already have victory over death. You will not stay in the ground forever – that chapter was closed. You and I will rise immortal. Scripture tells us that you who believe that Jesus is the Christ have been born of God. God has brought you into an entirely new way of life – not just a future life to look forward to, but a new way of life now. You have been born to overcome the world.

"Are you saved?" This is something you might hear after the doorbell rings. "What does that even mean?", you might wonder as you think of what to say in response. The door-to-door evangelist would tell you that Jesus died to forgive your sins, and if you believe the truth of that statement, you will be saved. That is an important part of salvation but by no means the full account. To be saved is not simply to have your sins forgiven or to be given a ticket to heaven; God wants more for you. Jesus gives the best explanation of

salvation: "I came that they may have life and have it abundantly" John 10:10. The Incarnation was not the fullness of life, the Resurrection provides for this.

Throughout Lent we journeyed with Christ, taking up our Cross each day through prayer, penance, and almsgiving. The goal of Lent is like the goal of salvation: to have life. Lent arose originally as a time of intense preparation for baptism for those catechumens preparing to enter the Church. The rest of the faithful began joining in to prepare to renew their baptismal promises at Easter alongside them. Lent is a time to embrace the Cross and set aside our sins so that we can enter the life of Easter with peace and joy.

The Cross certainly marks a turning point, removing the obstacle of sin that placed an infinite distance between us and God. The Cross reconciles us so that, as Paul says, we, who were once his enemies, might become friends with God. *St. Athanasius points out, however, that the Son of God came into the world for the Resurrection:* **"For by the sacrifice of His own body, He both put an end to the law, which was against us, and made a new beginning of life for us, by the hope of Resurrection which He has given us" (On the Incarnation).** In fact, the Resurrection initiates a whole new creation, raising us up from the life of the world to a life in the Spirit.

The Resurrection restored life not only to Jesus' earthly body; it also marked the beginning of a new life for all those who believe in him and become members of his mystical body, the Church. The Resurrection goes beyond one moment in time, as Jesus says that he himself is the Resurrection. To those who believe, there is no more death, even if we still have to experience a temporary passage from this world to the next: "I am the resurrection and the life; he who believes in me, though he dies, yet shall he live, and whoever lives and believes in me shall never die" John 11:25-26. The Resurrection should give us confidence that death no longer has the last word. We should not fear it, because we know that the best is yet to come! You have been born to overcome the world—to fight against sinful desires. Better yet, you now live a Christian life, which means happiness forever! Hold on to that.
