LITURGICAL NOTES

Entrance: <u>You are righteous</u>, <u>O Lord</u>, <u>and right is your judgment</u>; deal with this servant of yours according to your mercy.

Offertory: I prayed to my God, I, Daniel, and I said: "Hearken, O Lord, unto the prayers of your servant, and cause your face to shine upon your s anctuary; look with forgiveness upon this nation over whom your name has been invoked, O God."

Communion: Make vows unto the Lord your God, and accomplish them, all you who gather around him to present offerings; to the awesome God who takes away the life of princes; he is greatly feared by all the kings of the earth. Today's readings highlight the virtue of detachment. Without it we cannot enter the kingdom. Interestingly, our Lord's parables in the Gospel highlight the necessity of deliberation, of intentionally renouncing our claims on our lives and possessions and placing them at the service of God. We see this echoed in the Communion Antiphon: "Make vows unto the Lord your God, and accomplish them". In taking up our daily cross, we see both God's justice and mercy at work: suffering purifies us by teaching us to rely on God alone. How far above our ways are God's ways! "You are righteous, O Lord, and right is your judgment". The spiritual masters teach us that crosses that occur as part of our daily circumstances are often more fruitful than those that we seek because we learn docility by accepting whatever comes our way. With trust let us embrace daily hardships as a gift from God to help us grow closer to Him. "Jesus, lead the way through our life's long day, when at times the way is cheerless, help us follow, calm and fearless; guide us by your hand to the promised land."

FROM THE DIRECTOR OF LITURGY AND MUSIC

On the Liturgy

Part V

Daniel Kirkland

Last week I wrote about some basic gestures in the Liturgy and how they direct our attention to the action of the Liturgy and foster interior dispositions of worship. Reverence was identified as the root of all fruitful gestures lest we find ourselves engaging in empty ritualism. This week we will briefly investigate some aspects of *sacred space* and how church architecture is supposed to accommodate liturgical action, which ultimately directs us to heaven.

In addition to creating a space suitable for worship, church buildings themselves often had something to teach about what was taking place within their walls. When entering most traditionally constructed churches, the most obvious feature is that there is often a sense of progressive ascension. We ascend the outside steps to enter the church. As we move towards the altar, there is even more ascension with steps elevating the altar and, depending on the church, elevating further the tabernacle, which houses the Blessed Sacrament. This upward movement is often highlighted by the architecture of the building itself. Gothic churches like Notre Dame de Paris are characterized by towering pillars and soaring, pointed arches or buttresses, immediately drawing the eye upwards. Our own parish is neo-Romanesque in style, which is characterized by rounded arches and thick walls. Like the gothic style, it has a wonderfully vertical dimension that seems to lift us up (and it creates a great acoustical space!).

Another feature of church architecture is the separation of the nave (where the laity worship) and the sanctuary. This is to highlight the difference in roles within worship. The baptistry was often placed at the front of churches to represent baptism as the means by which we become grafted to Christ's Mystical Body (the Church), enabling us to enter the church and offer worship to God in a priestly manner within the nave. This is the *universal* priesthood of the Faithful.. From the very beginning, the apostles and their successors have chosen certain men to continue their specific work in the *ministerial priesthood*, which entailed governing the Church and transmitting the Sacraments. The sanctuary is where the ministerial priests, set aside as it were, offer their worship; the Faithful participate in this worship from the nave. Since the Eucharist is made present in the sanctuary, barriers were erected after the manner of the Temple in Jerusalem to shroud the mysteries taking place. In the East to this day, a wall of icons with doors that close during the consecration (the *lconostasis*) separates the faithful from the awe -inspiring moment when Jesus Christ is made truly present in the

bread and wine. In the West, the altar rail demarcated the sanctuary, allowing the Faithful to see what was taking place (though the prayers of consecration were shrouded in relative silence). What is so wonderful about the altar rail is that it also **united** the nave and sanctuary, serving as the table at which the Feast of the Lamb took place. The heavenly mysteries were administered with the Faithful lined across the rails as if at a banquet!

One last remark on architecture - we see in churches a specific *orientation*. The altar (and tabernacle behind it where pertinent) is the central focus of the main church. At the Crucifixion, Christ was both the priest and victim, offering Himself for our salvation. Because of this, the altar has always been viewed as representing Christ and the place where His saving action takes place. The Liturgy of the Word is important for our instruction, but ultimately the Liturgy of the Eucharist is where the central mysteries of our Faith unfold. From very early on, then, we see the altar and crucifix in a place of central prominence in the church. Just as important is the location of the altar, i.e., Liturgical East. The priest and people worshiped facing the East, or *ad orientem*, where the sun rose, seeing in this Christ, the Sun of righteousness, coming "forth like a bridegroom leaving his chamber" (Ps. 19). Facing east was so important that churches like the Vatican have altars facing eastward, though the church itself is facing the west. So it was not actually foreign to celebrate Mass facing the people (versus populum)! This was rare in the broader Western Church, though, and the majority of Roman Catholics worshiped in the same direction as the priest with all oriented toward Christ. Pope Emeritus Bendict XVI had this to say about ad orientem worship: "A common turning to the east during the Eucharistic Prayer remains essential. This is not a case of doing something accidental, but of what is essential. Looking at the priest has no importance. What matters is looking together at the Lord. It is not now a question of dialogue but of common worship, of setting off toward the One who is to come. What corresponds with the reality of what is happening is not the closed circle but the common movement forward, expressed in a common direction for prayer" (The Spirit of the Liturgy).

Let us strive to turn our hearts toward Christ as we worship Him in our beautiful parish where heaven and earth meet in a joyful embrace!
